

Dr. Edward Gray Dies Suddenly In Berkeley

BERKELEY, November 1.—Dr. Edward Gray, physician and author, whose home is at 2731 Regent street, died this morning as he was about to board a ferry train for San Francisco. His death occurred on the street at the corner of Ellsworth and Ward streets, following a sudden attack of heart disease.

Dr. Gray had been physician and surgeon of the Pacific Mail liner San Juan, and was on his way to board the boat, which sailed today. He was 69 years of age and a native of Benicia, California, being a son of Samuel Gray, a pioneer of the State, who settled at Benicia during the gold rush of 1849.

Dr. Gray was for twelve years the resident physician at the Sonoma State Home, resigning four years ago to become ship surgeon on the San Juan. He was a graduate of Yale University with the class of 1874 and was a graduate of the College of Physicians and Surgeons of New York city, later completing his education at Vienna.

Dr. Gray was recognized as a Spanish scholar and had published several books in Spanish. He had also contributed to astronomical discoveries and had published several books on astronomy in English.

Besides his widow, he is survived by three sons, Henry Gray of Reno, Herbert Gray of San Francisco and Gerard Gray of Berkeley. A sister, Mrs. David Hart of Chicago, also survives him.
