

THE EARTHQUAKE.

Solano County the Centre of the Shock.

Vacaville, Dixon, and Fairfield Suffer Great Damages.

The earthquake of Monday night did so little damage in Vallejo that it was not dreamed by our people that this county could have been such a sufferer by it. But Vacaville, Dixon, and Fairfield were injured to the extent of thousands of dollars, although happily no lives were lost thereby.

IN VACAVILLE.

This town presents a strange appearance. There is apparently but one street in it, namely, Main street, and the south side is nothing more nor less than a row of wrecked brick structures, and the street is filled with pieces of brick and lumber, and the cracked edifices are propped up with huge beams to prevent them from falling bodily into the roadway. The north side of the street was composed in the main of wooden buildings, and except in a few instances the loss on that side is confined to chimneys, which went by the run when the memorable trembler struck the town in the small hours of the morning.

The total loss in and around Vacaville is variously estimated at from \$70,000 to \$150,000. As complete a list of the work of demolition caused by the earthquake as it is possible to get is given below:

Presbyterian church, plastering all knocked off.

J. W. Kennedy's Brunswick Hotel, similarly treated.

John Malone's one-story building thrown off its foundation.

Platt's brick block is a total loss, though the walls are still standing on the west and south. The loss of the owners is \$8,000.

George McCabe, tinner, suffers least.

The *Enterprise* office, type considerably pied, but damage not serious.

Grocery store of C. R. Madison, damaged \$500.

Crystal Bros., dry goods, not over \$500.

Notion store of S. S. Snook, damage \$100.

The postoffice is a total wreck and has moved into the store of S. S. Snook.
