

VALLEJO BALL.—We copy the following account of the Vallejo Ball from the editorial correspondence of the *Union* :

“A bird’s eye glance at the party, disclosed the fact that there were sixteen ladies and one hundred and fifty gentlemen present. Among the former, were but two of the fair representatives of of Sacramento, and not more than five or six of the San Francisco ladies. The remainder were from the region round about Vallejo and Benicia. The political world was very largely represented.

Owing to the great scarcity of obtaining partners, many of the political characters adjourned to the lobbies, and there, surrounded by champagne and smoke, discussed the affairs of State.
