

DEATH OF PACHECO.—Don Francisco Perez Pacheco, one of the oldest and wealthiest citizens of California, is dead. He owned large tracts of land near Martinez, and the town of Pachecoville was named after him. About forty years ago he came to Monterey from Guadalajara, Mexico. He was a poor man, and for a long time worked at his trade of wagon-making. In the course of time he became possessed of several fine ranches and large herds of cattle, which he sold at immense profits in 1849-50.—*Morning Call.*

You have got things slightly mixed, Mr. *Call.* The Pacheco who owns “large tracts of land near Martinez,” and after whom Pachecoville was named, is *not* dead—at least he looked like anything but a corpse when we saw him in our streets a day or two since. We are not aware that he was formerly a poor man, or that he ever worked at wagon-making, although he does possess land sufficient for several fine ranches and large herds of cattle. *His* name is Salvio Pacheco; the Pacheco who is dead, lived and died at Monterey.
