THE PICTURE OF THE DEAD SENATOR.

Much of the Mystery First Told of by Mrs.
Bayer-Lobo Is Explained by the Physi-
cian Who Attended the Strange Blonde
Woman During Her Illness at the
Boarding House of Mrs. Peter
Brannigan—The Story the Land-
lady Tells of the Trio.

PLACERVILLE, June 27.—Dr. Arthur T.
Piercy of this town, and until October last
a practicing physician in Benicia, identi-
fied to-day a Photograph of the late James
G. Fair as the portrait of a gentleman he
knew at Benicia as "Uncle" Scott.

He told the story of his association with
Mr. Scott in April last, verified all his
statements by reference to his case record
and account books, and completely corrob-
orated the stories published in the EXAM-
INER yesterday and to-day.

The doctor was seen at his office on Main
street this evening. Without any prelim-
inary statement from his visitor the phy-
sician was shown a photograph of James
G. Fair and asked if he remembered ever
having met anyone like him. The doctor
looked at the picture closely for some time.

"It seems to me I have seen that face be-
fore. Let me think," said he. "Well,
yes, I am almost sure I know who it is
now, though I could tell better if I saw a
full-face picture." A verbal description
of the man was then given to the doctor,
and the story told by the EXAMINER was
repeated to him.

"Now I know positively that was the
gentleman I knew in Benicia as 'Uncle
Scott.' He was a rather superior looking
man, of handsome face, full beard,
streaked with gray, deep-set eyes, over-
hanging bushy eyebrows, and broad-
shoulders. I remember now the condi-
tions under which I met him."
