

The respect and love entertained for him by the physicians of Bridgeport were strikingly exemplified at the time of his injury. Of the dozen physicians who heard of the accident, each one hastened at once to endeavor to be of service to the injured man. To Dr. G. L. Porter, who had been associated with Dr. Hubbard for many years, the shock was greatest of all, but grief was plainly apparent on the faces of the men accustomed to scenes of suffering when they found that hope of recovery was not to be had. To many of the physicians successfully practicing in Bridgeport to-day Dr. Hubbard had performed kindly services in their early days of practice and to-day they attribute their success in a large measure to his assistance.

Dr. Hubbard was the father of Mrs. Charles M. Everett of Rochester, Mrs. Cortland Trowbridge of New Haven, and of Sherman M. Hubbard, the patent lawyer, who died in 1892.
