## BRIDGEPORT'S LOSS.

The Late Dr. Robert Hubbard—Sketch  
of His Life.

The late Dr. Robert Hubbard of Bridgeport was a native of Cromwell, Conn., and was born April 26, 1827. He was the son of Jeremiah and Elizabeth Hubbard, both of whom descended from old colonial families. His father's ancestors took up their residence in Boston in 1634 and afterward emigrated to Connecticut. Jeremiah Hubbard was a sea captain, who retired in 1825 to work his farm, in which he had the assistance of young Robert until the son was close to nineteen years of age.

Dr. Hubbard's early schooling was that which could be obtained during the winter months, the rest of his time being taken up with work on the farm. At the age of seventeen he entered the academy at Cromwell. Here he prepared himself for a course in college, and in 1846 he entered Yale. After a year of study he left the university to accept a position as principal of the academy at Durham. He continued to study while at the academy with the intention of resuming his academic course at Yale, but was induced by Dr. Benjamin Fowler of Durham to take up the study of medicine. He began in Dr. Fowler's office and a year after entered the office of Dr. Nathan B. Ives of New Haven. While with Dr. Ives he attended medical lectures at Yale, and in 1851, so thorough were his methods of study, he graduated as valedictorian of his class.
