

Frederick H. Nusbickel

Frederick H. Nusbickel has been well known in agricultural pursuits in Southern California for many years. Locating in Glendora in 1910, he purchased unimproved property there which he subsequently set out to citrus, and he soon established a nursery business, in which Mr. C. M. Warren became a partner in 1919 under the name of Nusbickel and Warren. Originally located in Glendora and later moved to San Dimas and ultimately to Ventura County, the nursery handled citrus, roses and some camellias, and carload lots of stock were shipped all over the United States and to foreign countries. It ultimately became one of the largest businesses of its kind on the Pacific Coast. In 1937, Mr. Nusbickel retired from the business.

During his years of activity in Ventura County, Mr. Nusbickel developed water and land on a large scale, and at one time his holdings in that county aggregated many acres of valuable property.

In 1915, Mr. Nusbickel purchased the property where he now resides on Foothill Boulevard in the San Dimas area of the Pomona Valley. Originally, this sixty-acre piece was grain land, but Mr. Nusbickel has improved the entire property with citrus, and also erected a beautiful home place on it.

Mr. Nusbickel has held numerous important positions in various organizations in Southern California. In Glendora he formerly was a director of the Glendora Mutual Water Co. and which was instrumental in bringing water from the San Gabriel River to Glendora. For about twenty years he was a director of the San Dimas Lemon Association as well as of the San Dimas Fruit Exchange. He was a member of the Agricultural Committee of the Los Angeles Chamber of Commerce when the University of California at Los Angeles was established, and was instrumental in obtaining the first forty acres of land for the Agriculture Department of the institution. He was President of the Lemon Men's Club of California in 1938. He is a Past Master of Glendora Masonic Lodge No. 404, and during World War II he was chairman of the war bond drives in San Dimas which exceeded quotas by large margins and made a record for the entire United States for a city of this size. Mr. Nusbickel is vice-president and a member of the Advisory Board of the Bank of America branch at San Dimas.

Social affiliations include the University Club of Los Angeles and the University Club of Claremont.

Mr. Nusbickel married (first) Miss Maisa Parker, who passed away in 1932 leaving two sons, Frederick P. and David C. He married (second) Mrs. Marjorie M. Herlihy, who has a son, John. Mr. Nusbickel finds his chief diversion in bowling on the green, and he is a member of the Claremont Lawn Bowling Club.
