## **Journal Probe Unveils** Ersher-Wax-Dipple's **Pro-Builder Position**

On the heels of Saturday's disclosure that the city council majority, in a midnight session when no citizens were in chambers to protest, rammed through a huge, 146-home project in Via Verde, complete with a fast-food restaurant that will draw 250 additional cars to city streets each day, the San Dimas Journal has made more startling findings:

The council trio has broken Southern California records for cities this size in approving scores of new housing de-velopments, including apart-ments. Many of the okays were ments. Many of the okays were over the strenuous but futile objections of residents. The Journal is now checking to see how many approvals were ren-dered in midnight sessions, when most of San Dimas has retired for the night.

At press time last night, while the count of the council majority's approvals was still mounting, the council trio that dominates City Hall decisions, in a last ditch effort to stave off an election defeat, was still claiming that its members are the true defenders of the city against growth. That claim has now been proven to be as phany as a \$2. en proven to be as phony as a \$3 bill.
Moreover, the council's own re-

cords bear out suspicions of many cords pear out suspicions of many residents that the present council majority is playing favorites, re-warding its friends, punishing its enemies, and okayunis develop-ments as if there were no tomor-

ments as it there were no tomorrow.

The Journal's discovery makes a shambles of the propaganda being loudly proclaimed by Appointed Mayor Marvin Ersher, and Councilmen Phil Wax and "Tag-Along" Terry Dipple that they have kept developers from storming the gates of City Hall. The exaggerated Ersher-Wax-Dipple line was a calculated risk for the trio, which has been in deep political trouble ever since they issued a statement last year implying that San Dimas voters didn't have sense enough to come in out of the rain.
