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
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From the Director

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Who Made Camp 2005 So Much Fun?







If your family enrolled in a camp program at the Sanctuary this summer, you may have noticed a lot of fresh faces on our staff. Our Teacher Naturalists, with the support of parents and campers, are the driving force behind the success of our summer programs, and we were delighted to welcome a new crowd of educators for our 2005 season. Kelly Fox, Jeremy Lougee, Jen Paul, Erin Roach, and Kelly Stoos developed and implemented an environmental education curriculum for ten to twelve campers each week throughout our nine-week summer program. With backgrounds in everything from environmental policy and elementary education to marine biology and English literature, they drew on their various strengths to create outstanding outdoor experiences for all of our campers. Our Americorps team members, Meghann Deslaurier, Colleen Donovan, and Bruce Hutchings, each taught three weeks of camp. They spent their offweeks delivering educational programs to our campers and to visitors from local organizations, including Looking Upwards, the Martin Luther King Center, and the YWCA. Thank you Americorps members!

This summer, Clare Rok, who had volunteered as an Assistant Naturalist (ANt) in the past, took on the role of Assistant Educator which meant she wore an assortment of different hats, supervising teen volunteers and filling in wherever needed. Ali Dutra, former camper and ANt, oversaw a popular after-care program and worked as an office assistant to Megan Bradley. Megan herself took a break from managing all aspects of the office (including camp registration!) to teach the young children's Fledglings camp. At her side was another long-time Teacher Naturalist, Marilyn Lyell, who taught the Preschoolers with Parents program. A number of special guests also lent their expertise to our summer programming to complement our weekly camp themes. Save the Bay, Roger Williams Park and Zoo, Glen Ridge Farm and the Audubon Society of Rhode Island conducted fantastic animal programs with our campers. "Strong Woman" Julie Jennings taught us about Native American history and traditions, while Osprey Sea Kayak Adventures and Adventures in Learning worked with our older Summer Challenge groups. Gentle Yoga


