Awaiting the Swallows' Return

Spring 1987

BARN SWALLOWS (Hirundo rustica)

This Spring I expect the return of a pair of Barn Swallows that will nest in the rafters of the 18th century barn that houses the Sanctuary office and Museum. Last year this "pair" formed following the arrival of a single Barn Swallow that flew in through the front door. It was joined a few days later by 3 others. Since both sexes look alike, I couldn't tell at first which were male or female. After a day or two of comtion I started to observe a pattern in their activity. It looked as though one of the swallows had been singled out (this I assumed to be the female) and the other 3 (which I assumed to be males) took turns pursuing her, each demonstrating incredible skills in aeronautical acrobatics. Within days, only 2 swallows remained.


Once the pair was formed, they wasted no time building a nest. Every 2-3 minutes the couple flew in and out through the five inch opening I left on the second story window to fetch mud and straw.

When the eggs were laid, both partners took 15 minute shifts incubating them. During their breaks they went out to feed. At night the female stayed on the nest while the male perched nearby.

The pair's work really began on the second week when the eggs began to hatch. For three weeks they flew in and out through the window fetching insects for their young. I couldn't see how many young they had. They usually have 4-6. For the first 12 days they also carried away the young's fecal eacks. When the young grew big enough to reach over the side, I avoided walking directly under the nest.

When the fledglings made the big leap out of the nest, they spent the following week running about on the second floor of the barn strengthening their muscles in preparation to fly while their parent continued to feed them. (Note: this is the stage when many well-meaning people think they have found an "orphan" bird and take it away from the care of its parents). The second floor of the barn was cordoned off to avoid disrupting them. The next thing I knew, they were gone.

Originally cliff dwellers, Barn Swallows took readily to the open barns of old New England, and were a familiar and welcome sight to farmers who benefited from their voracious appetite for horseflies, houseflies and mosquitos. They are easily distinguishable from other swallows with




BIRD WALKS






HERB WALK - An introduction to wild medicinal herbs

For those who''ll be joining us on the Whale watch, Ann will prepare us for our voyage aboard the <u>Dolphin</u> operating out of Provincetown, Ma. She'll discuss behaviors to look for and identifying features of each species.


STONE WALL MAINTENANCE DAY

Herbs are plants that can be used to enhance the taste of foods, create a pleasant summer drink or tea, aid in the healing of ailments, or provide decoration and fragrance for

a room all with relatively little effort.

A three foot square plot of earth or even a window box can provide space for several useful herbs. Once in the ground, these plants require minimum attention. Many of the cooking herbs actually flourish when the tops are pinched back for use. Other herbs are good companion plants for vegetable gardens— attracting the pollinating bees, humming—birds, and butterflies, and discouraging insect pests.

Just as the taste of native vegetables is more enjoyable than canned or frozen stock,

home grown herbs are surprisingly flavorble and aromatic.

The plants offered by the Norman Bird Sanctuary are in 3½" pots and are grown organically by Seven Arrows Herb Farm in Attelboro, MA.Each cost \$1.75 and with every 10 plants purchased, an additional plant is yours free! The order will be ready for pick-up on Saturday, May 23 from 12-3 p.m. Call us for an alternate pick-up date if you're planning to be away this holiday weekend. At the feeders

Redpolls, Rufus sided Towhees and Goldfinches appeared amongst our regular feeders

Kestrels, Sharp-shinned and Coopers Hawks have been spotted trying to catch unsuspecting feeder birds. (They have to eat too!)

The Sanctuary suggests you feed the birds up until the first few weeks of May while the exhausted spring migrants fly through and the ground thaws.

Remember to fill your feeders! The birds depend on you once you start. Gradually taper off the quantity as May gets underway.




Summer Challenge


