In the parking lot last night, I met two faithful birders who'd come at dusk to observe the woodcock courtship. They'd heard them all night, the repeated buzzing "peents" on the ground, the twittering flight, and the chirping dive. Unfortunately the failing light prevented them from seeing the wide spirals that the males do in March of each year. What these gentlemen had seen that night was a great horned owl perched in a tree by the old farmhouse.

Driving home by moonlight, I paused at the beach where silvery reflections were uncoiling along the waves. I recalled some of the other stories I'd heard of the Norman Bird Sanctuary after dark. There was the moonlight hike to Hanging Rock long ago that became a midnight crawl when the moon went behind a cloud and the group realized that no one had brought a flashlight. There was the sighting of over forty spotted salamanders in a tight-packed breeding ball, seen by flashlight in Nelson Pond during a recent rain.

There are many things that I am anxious to see. For example, crab mating season. Every June horseshoe crabs crawl *en masse* out of the sea to mate and lay their eggs. You have to watch for them at midnight during the spring tide of the full or new moon. Asking around, I haven't found anyone who has seen this locally. According to naturalist Charles Avenengo, this is like being a New Yorker and never looking at the Empire State Building. June 1-2 of this year should be the right time to watch them all along the Atlantic Coast.

American Beach Grass planting at Third Beach

Thank you so much for helping us restore the dunes at Third Beach. There is no better way to welcome in spring than spending an afternoon on Third Beach with friends, volunteers, RI AmeriCorps and colleagues planting thousands of delicate sprigs of American beach grass (Ammophilia breviligulata). This is our second year planting on the 200-yard primary dune along the shores of the Sakonnet River.

American beach grass grows naturally on the dunes that border the beach but does not grow in the rich soil of the inland marshes. The beach grass stands up well under the continuous salt spray and the summer heat on the dunes. On the hottest days, the leaves curl inward to reduce the area exposed to the sun and to conserve moisture. With its roots going down to the freshwater table below the dunes and its horizontal runners spreading out under the sand around it, the beach grass stabilizes the dunes. Visitors are warned not to climb the protective dunes or harm the beach grass. Habitat stabilization is the goal of this long term project. Rodents, mammals, insects and birds utilize this harsh area each in there own way.
