Red maples have shown crimson in bud, flower leaf or stem the year round. They cause the rosy fog effect around the ridges all winter. In colourless winter the evergreens stand green-black, casting amethyst shadows on rose colour snow at sunset. There were slashes of orange where rabbits had eaten bark from fruit trees-rainbows in icicles at noon-the gleaming eyes of rabbits in ritual dances in the moonlight, reflecting lights from the house. There were cross-bred pheasants, ringnecks to NY birds, ringnecks to goldens, all with different markings and with dignity ruined by snow on their tails! Brooks ran with bubbles of air under ice; the bubbles caught, then moving on. Some redwings, robins, ducks and swans wintered with us all season. With winter over there is still plenty of food for them left. We've marvelled at tiny Niagaras formed by threads of rain seeping through rocks and freezing. Even with earmuffs on, the song sparrows were heard warming up their throats for Spring. The Great Horned Owl nested in the Sanctuary while pusseywillows gleamed in February moonlight. In sun one could see that some are pink under their silver "fur". By mid-March peepers were peeping in the marshes as the nuptial flights of woodcock took place at sunset. Down under ice all winter fresh green watercress and horsetails grew and one could see snail eggs and polliwogs. In late March, black alders began to drip their pollenladen tassels-later these seed pods will look like pine cones of microscopic size. Cinnamon ferns started to unroll their fiddleheads & under dead grass there are tiny tender growing clover. Dandelions always find a warm spot-battered and blooming! They get their name from the French who thought the leaves resembled lions teeth "Dentes des lions." In early April the spice bushes near the Pond are yellow with blooms. The Spring Azure butterfly will flutter by in mid-April. In the woods the Mourning Cloak, a taupe coloured butterfly with dots of sapphire and edges of gold, will be out of it's cocoon when wood anemonies and trout lillies are in bloom. By then we'll be slipping into summer.!

April is dues month for members. Those of you who "joined" the Friends of the Sanctuary half way through the year paid half dues. This made for a monumental bookkeeping mess.
