Life goes on! We have eggs under the incubators, for food for the summer crew-nice fresh eggs coming up! We are to have the chicks of geese, guinea hens and quail. We tried to grow quail from egg some years ago, and failed miserably. When these baby chicks are grown they will be released on the land, hopefully to multiply. One of the jobs of the NBS is to manage land for its best results. Land which our neighbours bought several years ago (to save it from developers) was badly managed for years before. Its brook has filled it with topsoil, as have old duck ponds on former farms. The result is that the field on the east side of 3rd Beach Rd. is a swamp. By the time you read this a wild duck pond will have been dredged, to drain the fields and to provide another nesting pond for wild ducks. (We had a windfall from The Tru\$t).
