

THE CLEAN AIR ACT

The Clean Air Act, passed by Congress in 1970, asserted that every citizen has the basic right to air lat is fit to breath.

The Environmental Protection
Agency set National Ambient Air
Quality Standards. These standards
not only tell us about the quality
of the air we breath, but protect our
health and environment. Some interests would like to compromise these
health standards by delaying deadlines
on upcoming standards, and by backtracking on ones already met. Some
interests feel that standards should
be set considering economic cost as
well as public health.

The National Clean Air Coalition representing 17 groups with a special interest in clean air believes that no dollar price can be put on human life and health. In early March the National Committee on Air Quality will make its recommendations to Congress on this act. Then Congress will begin holding hearings as the first step in the reauthorization

process.

To show your support for a strong ean Air Act consider doing the following: Write or call members of Congress. Express your concerns that the major programs in the Clean Air Act be protected and that it be bolstered to address the new air quality problems. Write a letter to the editor of your local paper. Send copies of important air quality news items, editorial comments or reports of what your local officials are saying about clean air to The National Clean Air Coalition.

LEAF TRANSFORMATIONS

The change in New England's autumn forests is one of nature's most dramatic motions. It is a kind of sunset of the season that builds to a brilliant height, then lingers until the last dull

leaf has dropped.

For the tree production comes to an end in autumn. The seed has been produced and the food stored. The leaf is the food producing organ for the tree. Already by August, with cooler nights and shorter days, a decrease in auxin production (growth regu-

lator) has slowed food production down.

A small layer of cells begins to form at the base of the petiole. This is the abcission layer along which the leaf will break from the branch. Chlorophyll, the green photosynthesizing pigment, can no longer be produced, and what remains in the leaves' chloroplasts breaks down to reveal the underlying pigments. These are carotene and anthrocyanine.

carotenes are responsible for the yellow and orange hues of the leaves. Some leaves, such as those of the paper birch, turn only yellow. Anthrocyanine is responsible for the blues and reds. Anthrocyanine is found in cell vacuoles or storage

compartments.

High sugar content, low temperatures, and bright days stimulate the production of anthrocyanine. Varying amounts of pigment and uneven distribution of pigment give the leaf its own pattern. Already there is red in many of the trees on the ridges. Some of the earliest to turn are the tupelo and red-osie dogwood, common trees in the Sanctuary.
