Restoration and Sustainability

Invasive plants and animals are considered one of the top threats to maintaining biological diversity around the world. Nearly half of the plants and animals listed as federally threatened or endangered are at risk primarily because of invasive species.

In the Fields. To date we have restored 32 of the 41 acres of our old fields, shrub-lands and invasive wood lots through a partnership with the Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS). The initial contact between the Norman Bird Sanctuary (NBS) and NRCS happened in 2001 with the first work done in winter of 2004. These restorations, as with all habitat projects, are conducted with long range goals in mind and are guided by Federal and State biologists.

The vegetation covering these fields was cleared in the fall and winter months. It is estimated that 91% of the vegetation was comprised of exotic invasive species including Oriental Bittersweet, Multi Flora Rose, Norway maple and Sycamore maple. After the vegetation was cleared, the field was plowed, tilled, harrowed and left until spring. Between May I and June I, the seeding of native warm and cool season grasses was performed. An annual monitoring of the restored fields to remove any sprouting exotic invasives will help to ensure success. This is one of our community service projects involving local

high school students. Students perform a line search with shovel in hand, digging up any tenacious weeds in their paths.

NBS is a pesticide free organization (except for controlling poison ivy along the trails'



edges). With the completion of this grassland restoration project in 2010, NBS and our neighbor Sachuest Point will have over a 100 acre tract of grassland. This will provide nesting for several species of grassland birds that are experiencing declining numbers, including the Grasshopper Sparrow (Ammodramus savannarum), Eastern Meadowlark (Sturnella magna), Savannah Sparrow (Passerculus sandwichensis) and possibly the Upland Sandpiper (Bartramia longicauda). Another rare bird species that feeds and nests in some of the grasslands is the Northern Harrier (Circus cyaneus), a bird that is often seen flying low over our open fields.


Our **Wildlife Lecture Series** begins March 20, and will be held every third Thursday of the month. In March, join Wendy Edwards from the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service to learn more about piping plovers, summer nesters along Rhode Island beaches. April and May will feature speakers on threatened and endangered sea turtles and the Narragansett Bay Coyote Study.

Beginning in April, NBS will also launch a new slate of **Saturday on-site programs**. "Amazing Animals" presentations will be held weekly at 11:00 a.m., spotlighting one of our non-releasable education animals. At 1:00 p.m., guided interpretive hikes will depart from the Visitor's Center, and a craft activity station will be set up throughout the weekend.

NBS **Summer Camp**, entering its 49th year, will feature yet another fun-filled season of outdoor exploration, animals, and songs! To meet the growing demand, NBS has added extra slots for the 2008 season. Parents will be notified of their lottery results on March 14. On Third Beach. In 2006 the nine beach cottages were removed from the secondary dune and moved to sites around the island. Immediately after the removal, a 500' stretch of wooden guard rail was installed along Third Beach Rd. Currently, we are in the middle of a Third Beach Dune Restoration project through a partnership with the Costal Resources Management Council (CRMC). The goal is to move 150 yards of beach sand to the footprints of those structures. After the placement of the sand, 4000 sprigs of American Beach grass will be planted to hold the sand berm in place and complete the Third Beach Dune restoration project. The restoration will help to establish a more stable dune ecosystem. As in the past, we look forward to the return of the Piping Plover (Charadrius melodus) in the spring. When the plovers



decide on a nesting spot, we will rope off the area and signs will be displayed. We are always in need of Plover monitors, a volunteer effort that requires no previous experience. It does however require the completion of a 2 hour course given by the United States Fish and Wildlife, held at NBS on 3/20 at 7:00 pm with another class at NBS on 3/2 at 7:00 pm.

Sustainability. We are proud to announce that we are in our second winter season of operating two of our four boilers with Biodiesel B99. The third boiler is run on B20 and the Administration building runs on home heating oil. Our supplier, Newport Biodiesel, provides us with a quality product made from local recycled vegetable oil at a non-profit rate. Their biodiesel meets or exceeds the national <u>ASTM quality specification D-6751</u> and is EPA-registered. We have met with Solar Wrights of Bristol and Rhode Island Wind Power of Middletown to discuss a timeline for future partnerships to reduce the NBS carbon foot print

A reminder that the Sanctuary offers over 7 miles of designated hiking trails for passive use with limited restrictions. No dogs, horses, bikes, kites, motorized vehicles or collecting of any kind. An Amphibian Adventure: Vernal Pools at the Norman Bird Sanctuary

On wet warm nights in early spring, a fascinating natural phenomenon begins. Amphibians that spend most of the year on land migrate to vernal pools to breed. Walking through the Sanctuary on a moist, damp day in March, you may hear the quacking of the "poster-amphibian" of vernal pools- the Wood Frog (*Rana sylvatica*). Male wood frogs sit at the pool's edge calling to attract a female. Their call sounds like a repetitious hoarse quack.

Breeding takes place over a few weeks, and then they will return to the forest floor for the rest of the year. To hear wood frogs this Spring, walk towards Nelson Pond. The Sanctuary's most beautiful vernal pool will be on your right, just before the Red Fox Ridge. You may also hear wood frogs calling from the boardwalk trails, which are popular with the amphibians after heavy Spring rains.

To learn more about vernal pools and local amphibians, we encourage you to join us on our Vernal Pool Walk on Friday, March 21 at 6:30 pm (please call ahead to register, as space is limited). School groups may also enjoy our popular "Amphibian Adventure" program.


