The glycerine strips oil from the birds' feathers thus depriving them of their first line of defense against the cold. For birds who will wash in winter (starlings!) there are brooks and puddles. All birds ship at ice and snow for drinking water.

Do birds hurl themselves against your windows and die - That is because the big windows act as mirrors - the lovely view you have from your house the birds have reversed from outside. For 5 years the Bird has had an inexpensive sticky tape (made by the 3M Co.) shining on the outside of picture windows and not one bird has died because of GLASS. You will soon get used to it- not even see it. Your neighbours will think 1) you have a high powered burglar alarm, or, 2) a new way to heat the room! Cost \$10.00.

The proper management of sanitary landfills on the Island comes at the best possible season. Had it come about in the spring, new-borne every thing would have suffered from the scavenger gulls. As it is, house pets have to be fed inside. Even the dog's bone is swiped before he has one good chew!

75 Nations have met in Great Britain & signed pacts not to dump waste into the Atlantic. Next they will turn their attention to the rivers that feed into the sea. It is hoped the the Pacific people will follow the leader. We who are custodians of the Planet Earth should get cracking.
