

FAMILY PROGRAM

Search for the Humpback, Minke, Finback, Blue and Right Whale on a research vessel with the Center for Coastal Studies out of Provincetown, MA. During this four hour boat trip, whales will be spotted on their northern feeding grounds. Numerous seabirds will be seen as well. A Sanctuary staff member will accompany the group and drive everyone out to the cape. We will leave the Sanctuary at 8:00am so please arrive a little early. Our plan is to arrive early in Provincetown for a bite to eat before we load the boat. Our boarding time will be 1:15 and the boat will return to port about 5:30pm. For the return trip, the Sanctuary will provide snacks and refreshments. Participants should dress appropriately for the weather and we suggest bringing binoculars, cameras, field guides, and sunscreen.

Cows Don't Go To School!



Many people think that residential development will lower property taxes in their community by increasing the town's tax base. In reality, residential development actually costs communities an average of \$1.14 in services for every dollar of revenue raised. Conversley, farms and open space cost an average of only 42 cents in public services.¹ The bottom line is that residential development not only reduces open space, it also increases Aquidneck Island's tax burden.

There are alternatives to this ment. The so-called "smart growth" rapidly across the country emphasizes tected open space and residential devellower taxes, or at least taxes that rise "dumb growth" we have currently. such as Middletown and Portsmouth



regulations favorable to protecting open space rather than promoting residential subdivisions, are actually improving their fiscal stability.

To demonstrate the economic benefits of retaining open space, AILT commissioned a 1998 study of the Perry Farm property on East Main Road. Protected in perpetuity by the land trust, this 82 acre property is home to the Newport Winery and Vineyards and the proposed Newport International Golf Course. However, the property could have been developed as a 49 unit residential subdivision under Middletown's current zoning and subdivision regulations. The study shows that if the subdivision had been built, it would have cost each Middletown household about \$24.00 per year for the next 30 years in increased taxes. This would have resulted in the addition of approximately two million dollars to Middletown's tax bill. ⁴

Given the potential for other similar residential developments on the island and the astonishing increase in building permits over the last few years, then it is obvious that protecting Aquidneck Island's open space makes sound economic sense. As the American Farmland Trust tag line puts it--"Cows don't go to school!"
