Annual Report for FYE 2008

SUMMER 2008

At the close of each fiscal year it is our pleasure to report the Norman Bird Sanctuary's successes to our members, friends, and donors.

During the past year, NBS made great strides in our programs, our property, and our budget. In March 2007, the Board of Directors adopted a five-year strategic plan to guide the efforts of our organizations. We are pleased to report that during its first year of implementation we met 90% of our annual goals. We continue to follow the plan and look forward to continuing success in our pursuit.

There were many factors that led to our success in FYE 2008, including charitable contributions and special events. Our major fundraiser, Harvest Fair, raised \$81,000 (a record amount), we added a new event the NBS 5K Road Race, and broke another revenue record with the Bird Ball (\$88,000). In addition our annual appeal generated \$33,000, 82% of our goal. In total, BS received \$174,000 in contributed support and \$183,000 from special events.

Our education programs were well-attended last year, with more children participating in our programs last year than ever before. In FYE 2008 we served more than 7,000 students through our school programs alone. Summer camp and school vacation camps continue there popularity and we strive to serve more people with NBS

programs. Education programs serve double duty for NBS as integral to our mission as well as our bottom-line. NBS education programs generated \$156,000 to Support overall operations.



Visitation continued to strengthen and we estimate that more than 11,000 people visited NBS over the course of the year. General admission brought \$20,000 into NBS coffers. Membership also saw growth, as we maintained a membership of approximately 1,400 households and generated \$67,000 from membership dues.

We hope all of these accomplishments show our dedication to our mission of conservation and education. As always we say "THANK YOU" to you, our members and friends, who demonstrate your commitment to our mission by visiting us, participating in our programs, and providing generous financial support. Thank you!

Preventing Tick-Borne Diseases

As we make plans to head outdoors this summer, I wanted to highlight the steps that NBS is taking to ensure a safe and nemorable experience for all of our visitors. As you may know, tick populations have been on the rise throughout New England. While their numbers are not significantly higher here at the Sanctuary than in other areas, we want you to be safe no matter where you go. The following guidelines apply to all NBS campers and visitors, but we also suggest that you use these tips as you travel throughout parks, neighborhood yards, and the rest of the great outdoors this summer.

- Wear appropriate clothing when outdoors. Wear long sleeves, pants, and socks; light colored clothing makes the ticks easier to spot. We encourage visitors to roll up long socks or tuck pants into their socks to prevent ticks from reaching the skin. Ticks do not jump or fly and are most commonly picked up on your shoes and socks.
- Stay on the trails. Deer ticks prefer moist leaf litter and tall grasses and avoid moved lawns and the center of trails. Visitors are not allowed to venture off the trails at NBS; we ask you and your family to set this same example on walks.
- Stay off of the stone walls. Despite their name, deer ticks can be found on many animals including squirrels, some birds, and the mice that make their home in the region's stone walls. Climbing and sitting on stone walls is prohibited at NBS and should also be discouraged in other locations.
- Tick checks! We train our staff to integrate numerous tick checks into their daily teaching schedule. Checks should be conducted after hikes and before heading home. We also ask parents to check their children after camp and at bath time.
- Repel ticks. Use insect repellent on areas of your body and clothing that may come in contact with grass or brush. For maximum protection, treat your clothing with Permethrin, which kills ticks on contact. We recommend using a repellent with DEET on your skin and one with Permethrin on clothing (you can stock up on these products in the NBS gift shop.)
- Stay calm. If you find a tick, you should remove it as soon as possible with fine-tipped tweezers. Grasp the tick firmly and do not use alcohol, nail polish remover, matches, or Vaseline. Remember that infected ticks must be attached for at least 24 hours before they can transmit Lyme disease.
- Attend an NBS Camp Open House. We will be holding monthly camp open houses to highlight new procedures for our summer education programs. These meetings will be held on June 10, and July 8, at 7:00 p.m., and will include speakers on preventing tick diseases. By learning the simple steps to prevent tick-borne illnesses, you can help to educate family and friends and feel more confident spending time in the natural world.

Programs Feature Hands-on Discovery in Nature

"I feel like a real scientist writing things down about nature," enthused one Sullivan Elementary third grader during a recent NBS Exploring Ecosystems class, while a Shining Star preschooler observed, after a discovery-filled morning at the pond, that "Now my brain is bigger than a monster truck!"

With memorable moments like these occurring every day, our staff has been hard at work, engaging learners of all ages through hands-on discovery and inquiry-based programming. From January through May 2008, 1081 school children visited the Sanctuary for a field trip, and more than 539 students participated in one of our unique outreach courses. Meanwhile, during the same period, over 597 children experienced the natural world through interactive Family Nature Nights, scout and afterschool programs, vacation camps, special events, and birthday parties.

Learning about the natural world shouldn't stop with children, however, and our courses for adults and families continue to grow in popularity. With our monthly wildlife lecture series, bi-weekly Sunday morning bird walks, and seasonal birding day trips—there really is something for all stages of learning here at NBS.

As we enter the summer months, I am more excited than ever to be a part of this talented team. I was fortunate enough to join NBS in January as Director of Education and have enjoyed getting to know the Sanctuary's amazing natural resources and its wonderful members. Our education staff features a number of other new faces, including Education Coordinator Jen Klein and AmeriCorps members Stephanie Zanati and Natalie Coletti. Together, we are working to expand our popular offerings to include over 45 new school programs and an extensive variety of seasonal workshops and night courses, vacation camps, and seasonal EcoTour trips. We will also soon welcome several new education animals, including a second red-tailed hawk and an eastern screech owl. These non-releasable animals serve as our "education ambassadors," teaching school children and visitors about adaptations, wildlife biology, and conservation.

Our education webpage will feature a teacher's guide, interactive kid's corner, naturalist's blog, and many other resources. 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


