

COMMON SCENTS

With the onset of Spring, ings of our local wildlife are becoming more frequent. So too, are human/wildlife interactions, and the number of calls the Sanctuary receives regarding injured, "orphaned" and "nuisance" animals.

In the past month we have received numerous calls from people who suspect at a skunk is residing near or under ir house, and want to know how to get rid of it.

The skunk's defensive ability to spray its musk makes it an unwelcome house guest, but not a fearsome creature. The musk is a pungent, sulphur - alcohol compound that although very unpleasant, causes no permanent ill effects, even on contact with the eyes. The scent can be removed with a mildly acidic solution such as vinegar or tomato juice. calls or operate as a wildlife rehab-Use only WATER to flush the eyes.

Luckily, a skunk will spray only as a last resort, and will warn an intruder first. It will stamp its front paws, raise its tail and shuffle off backwards. If the intruder doesn't get the message then it will arch its back. turn in a U shape, with front and rear facing the target, and spray with accuracy. It can hit targets up to 15 feet away.

The striped skunk (Mephitis mephitis), is the most adaptable member of weasel family. It can be found all over the U.S. from sealevel to timberline, and in a variety of habitats except for the desert. It is a burrowing animal but will take advantage of ready made cavities such as abandoned

fox dens, woodchuck holes, culverts and in buildings. It is omnivorous, and feeds on rodents, carion, fruit, and insects (including Japanese beetles, gypsy moth caterpillars and grubworms). It in turn is preyed upon by foxes and great horned owls in this region.

If you suspect that a skunk is residing under your porch and want to remove it, first find out if it's there by sprinkling a thin layer of flour at the alleged entrance, and check for tracks soon after dark. If you see tracks leading out, block up the hole. Moth balls or flakes sprinkled around the hole may deter it from digging again. If you wish to catch and relocate it, the Sanctuary has a small number of "Have-A-Heart" traps available for a small fee.

The Sanctuary staff will be happy to assist you with any information regarding injured, "orphaned", or "nuisance" wildlife. Due to limited staff and facilities, we cannot make house ilitation center to all animals. An animal care brochure is available that has some basic "dos" and "don'ts" if you wish to learn more.



This year there will be some changes in the organization of our Summer Camp which are intended to create a more in-depth program as well as accomodate the growing demand for available spaces.

Nature Day Camp which is being offered for children entering K through learning. The week will include hikes, 4 will now have longer days, starting at 9 am. and ending at 2:30 pm. These longer days will allow campers and staff to spend more time exploring the various habitats and getting more involved with lessons and activities. This will help to enrich your child's camp experience. Nature Day Camp will be held for the full nine weeks.

(Summer Camp Continued)

Summer Challenge, which is being offered to children entering grades 5 - 7, will be held for only 3 weeks. With the longer format, it will combine the elements of all the previous Summer Challenge programs: nature study, camping, rockclimbing and adventure education.

For children ages 3 - 5, we are offering a Parents with Pre-schoolers program which will provide a special opportunity for parents of young children to share in nature exploration and fun with their kids. Each session will be held for three weeks on Tuesday and Thursday mornings.

In response to the growing demand for spaces in our camp, we must place a limit on the number of sessions a camper can initially enroll. For Nature Day Camp the limit is three sessions, and for Summer Challenge and Parents with Pre-schoolers, one each. After June 23, campers may enroll for additional weeks if spaces are still available.

This year we will not take registrations over the phone. To register, please fill out the form attached to the summer camp brochure and send it in along with your deposit.

Our 1986 summer camp promises to be a special one. We hope your child will join us and discover new secrets in nature at the Norman Bird Sanctuary!
