Thomas W. Bailey, the veteran Central Vermont passenger conductor, died last Thursday night, aged 59 years, after an illness of seven years with consumption. Three years ago he had a severe hemorrhage, since which time he has done no work, although able to be up and dressed until the Friday before he died. For more than 30 years Mr. Bailey was in the employ of the Central Vermont railroad, as local baggagemaster and conductor. In 1859 he went to California, remaining 18 months, and on his return took his former position with the railroad, where he remained until obliged to give up all work. His courage and endurance were remarkable, and he submitted patiently to the sufferings through which he was called to pass. His funeral was held last Saturday morning from his late home, on East State street, Rev. J. Edward Wright officiating. Carl L. Smith was conductor, with Stephen R. Colby, Frank Flint, and E. W. Thompson, of the Central Vermont, and E. R. Morse, of the Montpelier and Wells River railroad, as bearers. The burial was in the old cemetery near Berlin Corner. He leaves an only daughter, Minnie, A., wife of Patrick Ledden, of Montpelier.
