Samoyeds

Well, folks, here's the picture sent us by the winner—Joe E. Scott—of the "What's My Name" contest.

Joe says: "The picture is of my Karina of White Way, out of Herdsman's Faith and sired by Ch. Petrof Lebanov. Her daughter, Kameha's Kathy, sired by Ch. Prince Comet, placed fourth in the American-bred bitches group at Long Beach in June.

Incidentally folks, Joe is at present at Officer's Candidate School, U. S. Naval Station in San Diego for a six week's continuation course.

One item Joe emphasizes is "that to be able to judge the breed, you have to know the general build of the dog, and all judging points—but most important, you have to know and understand the Samoyed personality. It is as complex as the human."

Folks, remember the notation regarding the bred Sammy bitch that Mrs. A. E. Mason shipped up to M. B. Marks in Fairbanks, Alaska, a few weeks ago? Now comes a letter which Mrs. Mason shares with our readers. "Trix and the puppies are getting along fine. The pups' eyes are about open and they are as fat as little seals. Trix is everything one could want in a brood bitch. She is so different from our other dog (another breed)—we can't get used to her quiet good nature (in comparison with the other which is boisterous and noisy). Trix is calm and undisturbed about things.

"Several of the dog men up here have seen her, and some have tried to buy one of the pups but they are not for sale. Trix has the action racing men like. She should be fast in harness. The Western Kennel World issues arrived and I have been reading them over and over. We sent for a copy of Puxley's 'The Samoyed,' seems to be the only one listed on the breed. (Of course folks—there is a book, 'Ranger,' which is based on a foundation of facts regarding our Samoyed breed.) One paragraph marked in the magazine mentioned the appearance of biscuit colored ears and sometimes coat. I understand that brownish tinge to the ear was all right—but had never heard of anything but a white coat. Some Samoyeds in Alaska throw red and blacks. The reds being not biscuit colored, but red like an Irish Setter,

and the blacks being all coal black.

"Both my wife and I wish to commend you on the manner in which Trix was crated and

shipped. We have never before received a dog in as excellent condition as Trix—and as well provided for on the trip."

Mrs. Mason wrote recently: "I would like to say that Mr. Mason, Aljean and I all enjoyed the marvelous show at Long Beach, and know just how much hard work and effort was put into it to get the entries they did and make it the success it was. Everyone who entered, or helped in anyway, deserved much credit—but know the Southern group deserve most of the credit because they did have the major part of the 'job,' but the success should make them feel that they are compensated. No need to say we were thrilled to win as we did. We hoped for one win and possible placements—our dogs made us quite proud of them as competition was keen."

Incidentally, Mrs. Mason's two bitches made top wins at Long Beach—Ch. Gay of White Way, close to eight years of age, was not entered in Specials as she was deemed perhaps too old for the keen competition, so—she was entered in Veteran Class, which she won, thus qualifying her for Specials—and from that she went on to place Best of Opposite Sex. Her sister, Ebersol's Ch. Snow Queen of White Way placed second in the Veteran Bitches' Class. Trooperine of White Way was Winners Bitch. Trooperine, out of Ch. Nianya of Snowland, has won in three shows out of four times shown—the first time when but a year old, under Judge Dupon. She took five points at

Long Beach in 1949, in the entry of 37 Sams, and another five at 1950 Long Beach. Trooperine has not been shown much as she has been worked in the dog team—and Lloyd Van Sickle the driver, considers her equal to any male. She is sired by Toby of White Way.

Ch. Gay of White Way has been worked very little, but her mother, Ch. Herdsman's Faith has been worked to some extent.

Mr. Mason enjoys the admiring comments caused when he loads the three veterans: Champions, Herdsman's Faith, Chattigan, and Silver (this, we believe is Herdsman's Victory Leader, now slightly over 10 years of age), in the car and drives to the office with them. They are irresistible when all put up their vigorous pleas to go along.

Chattigan is like his dad, Silver Spark of the Arctic—who was boss of the kennel, but a politician with people.

As Starzan was Best of Winners he automatically obtained two points and went to place as Best of Breed with Parke-Cliffe Snowball as Best of Opposite Sex.

Best of Breed was Mr. and Mrs. B. P. Dawes Ch. Lucky Labon Nahum (Sonolad of the Valley ex Snow Mist Tanya). Best Opposite Sex was Polaris Balaiya Doroga.
