Through the courtesy of Miss Juliet T. Goodrich, owner of the Snow Shoe Hill Sams, we have for you a report of the winnings of the Sams at the International Kennel Club Show at Chicago March 31 and April 1, and folks—**Ch. Bunky Junior of Lucky Dee Scores Again**

There was an outstanding entry of 48 Sams for Mr. Anton Korbel to judge (eight absent). Winners of Firsts in the classes in most cases had stiff competition. First in American-bred dogs was taken by William H. and Barbara Lawman's Saint Barbillio of Top Acres, a 3½-year-old son of Destiny of Top Acres and Jill of the Snow Clouds. Open dog class had an entry of 10, with the blue for first going to Mrs. Robert Swanson's young Karzok of Encino (Ch. Kunto of Encino ex Wanda of Kobe), bred by our California owner of the Encino Kennels, Mrs. Margaret (Billy) Tucker. Harzok, not yet 2 years of age, went on to take Winners Dog and Best of Winners. He was handled by Virginia Hardin. Reserve winner was Robert A. and Louise Kauffman's Jet Pilot of Newclaire (Ch. Lucky Lew of Lewclaire ex Ch. Silver Mist of Wychwood).

In bitches the Bred by Exhibitor winner (no competition in this class) was Thomas Schneider's Ell-Tee Barika (Ch. Elkenglo's Jola and Ch. Lu's Lulo Luloto). American-bred bitches winner was Miss Juliet Goodrich's Hanook of Snow Shoe Hill (Ch. Lucky Day of Snow Shoe Hill ex Vallki of Snow Shoe Hill)—br. wner. First in Open bitches (seven competing, was Mrs. Charles E. Dubb's Christie Carol of Frieland (Ch. Pattee Duff of Sammar ex Mitzie's

Sissy). This 3-year-old went on to place as WINNERS bitch, with Miss Goodrich's Nanook as Reserve. There were 14 competing in the Specials class, with BEST OF BREED going to the B. P. Dawes Ch. Bunky Junior of Lucky Dee (Calif.); with Best Opposite sex going to Mrs. Laura Poiriers' Ch. Mishpa Arctic Sue, C.D. (Ch. Snow Blizzard of Newclaire, C.D., ex Admiral's Snow Queen of Lorelei).

It will be remembered that Bunky Junior had a few weeks before taken the Best of Breed win and second in the Working group at the Sam Club Specialty show at Seattle, Wash. This 2½-year-old, Ch. Bunky Junior, is a son of Ch. Bunky of Lucky Dee, out of Yasmin of Top Acres, bred by Frank and Helen Edwards. Bunky is by Lucky Labon Nahum ex Ch. Faustina Fauna. Yasmin of Top Acres is by Ch. Martingate Snowland Taz, owned by Mrs. Elma Miller of N. Y., out of Mrs. Ruth Bates Young's Ch. Sparkle Plenty of Arbee, of Ohio.

Our thanks to Marie Mueller of Seattle for the following report on the Specialty held at Seattle. The awards appeared in April.

"The Sixth National Specialty Show of the Samoyed Club of America was held in Seattle at the Armory on February 25, 1956. Thirty-five sparkling white Sams in a long row of benches beautifully decorated in forest green and silver, made a very impressive sight. The sides and backs of the benches were covered with green plastic, a skirt of the same material hung from the bench to the floor, and the floor of the bench itself was comfortably padded with matching green terry cloth. Tops and sides of the benches were decorated with a fretting of silver icicles. A most prominent spot was given the Sams, facing the judging rings.

Before the benches were displays of sleds, harnesses of various types, wagons and other vehicles used in the exhibition. Samoyed wool and cloth and articles of clothing made from it. These were of great interest to the public. A distinguished visitor who spent much time at the Sammy benches was Leonhard Seppala. Though he no longer races, he sometimes accompanies the dog teams into the mountains, and can't resist the lure offered by the sight of a dog sled.

Highlight of the show was the exhibition given afternoon and evening and repeated the following day on the same schedule for visitors on Sunday when three of the Groups were judged. There were two one-dog sleds, a buckboard, two-wheel wicker carts, two wagons with youthful passengers, an Indian drag with a deer carcass on it, a train of pack dogs carrying camping supplies, and one with first aid supplies, and a five-dog team pulling a racing sled in which rode a lovely young lady wearing a beautiful coat of Sammy wool (courtesy of Hazel Dawes).

Contrary to their previous understanding, the Sammy exhibitors learned when the premium lists were distributed, that their exhibition was

scheduled for an evening performance as well as an afternoon one. This came at exactly the time planned for the Specialty banquet. For this reason the dinner was cancelled, and instead the Seattle area exhibitors and the local club served a buffet dinner to all Sam exhibitors and club members and their families. Two baked hams and a perpetually filled coffee urn were supplied by the club, and the members brought salads, casserole dishes, condiments and desserts, and the spread was topped with a huge beautifully decorated birthday cake for the Specialty.

The exhibition which the club gave at this Specialty was televised, and many people attended the show on Sunday, having seen the exhibition on TV Saturday evening.

The Bremerton, Wash., show held March 25 was an unbentched affair. Top placements were: Amer-bred dog class (3 entries)—Sammy Acres Keno (Ch. Polar Star's Prince David ex Connee Puna of Nichi) owned by B. P. and Barbara Kennedy. Open dogs class (9 entered) was Dorothy Kolb's Siberian Nick (Kikmik of Oceanside ex Connee Puna of Nichi), who went on to place as Winners Dog and Best of Winners (5 points).

Senior puppy bitch was Leordan Taku Glacier (Kolb's Siberian Nick ex Flicka of Samack), owner, Lorelei M. Jordan. American-bred bitches class—Snaufflicka Skylarkin (Kolb's Siberian Nick ex Flicka of Samack), owned by Gayle Stuart and Nell Collins. Open bitch, 5 entries, Ken-Dor's White Sandra (Ch. Stormy Weather ex Ch. Dushka of Cedarwood), owned by Goldie Klein and Marie Mueller. Sandra went on to place as Winners bitch (5 points). Best of Breed (3 Specials in class) was Kolb's Siberian Nick. Best Opposite, Ken-Dor's White Sandra. The judge was Mr. Walter Reeves of Ontario, Canada.

Reserve bitch was Mrs. Beverly Ward's Kuleka of Encino (Ch. Kunto of Encino ex Kobe Ko Tom Ka of Encino). Best opposite sex was Baskov's Ch. Nova Queen of Samoyland (Ch. Spark of Altai ex Ch. Dushkas Metel), bred by Dr. Bezanson of Nova Scotia.

Mrs. Beverly Ward writes: "We were pleasantly surprised with a visit at the show by Miss Ruth Kilbourn and Mr. Warren Shelly. Mrs. Anne Smith visited at judging time, and it was good to see that her recovery is about complete. DOG OF THE AGES

The Year 1935—Chapter XXI

Registrations were upped this year to 131, and included two imports, Shack and the Great Ice Crystal of the Arctic. Nine championships were gained, five by dogs and four by bitches, and a Samoyed headed a Working group in California. The import, Shack, came in to Captain Joseph H. Crozier of Westminster, Maryland, but was apparently kept as a pet, never being shown. Bred by that veteran breeder, Mrs. L. Speke of England, Shack was by Kayak ex Katja. Kayak was by Siberian Keeno ex Wolva of Farningham, and Katja was by Mustan ex Nadine. Shack was bred once, with one pup registered, called Tamerlane, out of Vilma Milyuhof, a daughter of Riga of Norka.

Ice Crystal was destined to become one of our greatest bitches—when here slightly over a year, her record showed 15 best of breed wins. Many more honors came to Crystal later, and she was, as a veteran, said by the judge to have been the best Samoyed in the show at Morris and Essex (this was in 1945 to the best of our knowledge). Ice Crystal had not been entered in the finals, only in the Veterans' class, but stood out as a winner. Crystal was a daughter of Ch. Loga of the Arctic out of Arctic Dawn. She came in bred to Leader of the Arctic, and bore her litter in May, 1935. In England, she was the dam of Ch. Silver Glow of the Arctic and granddam of the English born American champions Sport

and Sprint of the Arctic—also of Mrs. Mason's imported Silver Spark of the Arctic. Prior to leaving England, she had two Challenge certificates and two reserve certificates. Crystal of the great granddam of Champions Nalda and Novik of Snowland, and of Nadine of Snowland (and incidentally the dam of our own Lensen of Snowland by Ch. Moscow of Farningham of Snowland). Loved and admired by her owners of Snowland Kennels (Mrs. Helen S. Harris and daughter Faith), Crystal spent much of her life piloting the blind Pedlar of the Arctic whom she made her especial charge, and she was the only dog in the kennel whom Pedlar seemed close to.

Among the year's registrations were Prytko, bred by R. E. Brott, by Tangara ex Samco's Pavlowa of Norka, later owned by Mrs. A. L. MacBain, who took her to her championship in 1939. Prince Kofski (owned by Mr. and Mrs. S. K. Ruick of Indianapolis, Ind.), was bred by Jos C. Linn, and was by Icy King ex Siberlan Zeld. Tarquin II, by Tarquin ex Sonya, Monsignor Keegan's outstanding dog, became a champion in 1936 when under 2 years of age. He sired Monsignor's later winner, Ch. Prince Igor II. Other registrations of this year were Lasky belle of Darya, who became a 1939 champion, was by Siberian Kingson ex the imported Wizbang Lasbybelle and owned by Mrs. Ada I. Yencer; also Mrs. Mason's Czar Nicholas Lebanov, by Beresof ex Mitzi Aura Laska, to become a 1940 champion, and Leoff of Stolzenfels, so of Bokar ex Patricia of Stolzenfels, who became a 1936 champion.

In 1935, Mr. Miles R. Vernon was president of the Samoyed Club; Mr. Louis Smirnow, secretary and treasurer; Mrs. McDowell and Mr. Brott, vice-presidents. Mr. Eddy was correspondent until September, when Mrs. Quereaux returned to the job.

In January, 1935, Mr. Eddy in the Gazette column quoted a description from the N. Y. Evening Sun by Dr. Meyer as follows: "The general impression of strength and the easy movement of body are a natural result of a well-proportioned dog. The Samoyed has that nicety of form which indicates a perfect balance of the respective bodily structures and one can easily visualize this dog functioning in a very desirable manner."

The March issue of Western Kennel World carried a column cut of the lovely Pedlar of the Arctic and Sabarka of Farningham sent us with a story by Mrs. Helen Harris—a delightful story of how Snowland obtained its

very first Samoyed. This issue also carried the story of Westminster show sent us by Mrs. Quereaux with an entry of 25 Sammies with Ch. Moguiski Best of Breed, owned by Norka Kennel.

Among Sams pictured in 1935 besides the two "Snowlanders" already mentioned, were a puppy picture of Karan's Snow Sprite, a six-week-old puppy, a son of R. E. Brott's Vodka and sired by Sam III; Vodka being a daughter of Mrs. Horace Mann's Ch. Gorka out of White Sprite of the Arctic. There, too, was the first showing of two Snowland-bred puppies in Mrs. Helen Harris' first ad, which was happily continued in the interest of boosting our breed for many years to come. August presented a picture of Ch. Gorka's Sneg (Ch. Gorka ex Orka of Farningham). And then December brought us our first real Sammy Christmas Annual, with a beautiful Sam on the cover (Pedlar of the Arctic)—a full page of pictures from Snowland, two pages of news items and a head study of the Pacific Coast's very first Sam to take first in a Working Group—Mrs. McDowell's Ch. Snow Frost of the Arctic, whose weight, incidentally was placed at 58 pounds—a good medium sized Sam. More of Snow Frost later.

Champions of the year were the Norka Kennels' Bruson, son of Bru of Yurak and Snow Cloud of Yurak, and double grandson of Ch. Tobolsk; Norka's Pascova, daughter of Tiger Boy of Norka and Norka of Donerna, later to belong to Monsignor Keegan; Mrs. Jennie Williams' Tanya of Stolzenfels, litter sister of the later Champion Leoff of Stolzenfels, and daughter of Bokar and Patricia of Stolzenfels; Bokar, a son of that French Bakou who had to earn his registration through a championship; French and Russian records having been lost during the first World War. Another to make her championship was the bitch Gorka's Sneg, owned by Samuel H. Sutton; Mrs. MacBain's Tangara, Snow Frost of the Arctic ex Yancey's Daughter, Tarzan of Frothingham, shown almost exclusively in New England, a son of Ivanski and Siberian Icy Queen Mona, and owned by Mrs. Ruthmund; Yorza, son of Ch. Gorka ex Sprite of the Arctic, who remained with Mrs. Mann for many years, to become her last Samoyed; Ilak of Surfwood, another New Englander, by Snow Ivan of Farningham ex Katusha, and Tanya, a daughter of Russof Elenor ex Lady Sonya.

During the year there were two of Tiger Boy's progeny registered; nine of Icy King's, five of Antarctic Rollo and eight of Snow Frost of the Arctic—all others were divided among many different sires all over the country. A

great litter of Storm Cloud ex the imported Morina of Tairmir, born May 9, 1935, included Vida of Snowland, Tucha and Booran (the latter to come to California).

Some Show News of 1935

Boston with 5 points, gave Winners Dog to Bruson. Best of Breed was Ch. Norka's Moguiski; Winners Bitch, Norka's Pascova.

Canton, Ohio, with Mr. Hopton judge, gave Best of Breed to Mr. Roach's Khanda Barin of Kara Sea, who went on to fourth place in the Working Group.

Cleveland, in March, under Mr. McQuown, gave Best of Breed to Tangara, and Winners Bitch to Vodka. A five-point show was Cambridge in May with Mr. Murr giving Best of Breed to Ilak of Surfwood.

Morris and Essex, also in May, had Sams judged by Mr. C. G. Hopton, who gave Best of Breed to Mr. Jeckel's Duke of Norka. Winners Dog and Best of Winners was Norka's Ch. Norka's Moguiski. Winners Bitch was Gorka's Sneg.

The only other show of the year meriting special attention was at Oakland, Calif., the summer show of the Oakland Kennel Club held at Neptune Beach on September 8, where Mrs. J. C. McDowell's Snow Frost of the Arctic went to Best under Judge J. F. Dupon and then on to head the Working Group under the same judge. It was a 4-point show for dogs with winners taken by Elsie's Nikaloff, owned by Mrs. E. M. Reynolds. A two-point show for bitches with Mrs. McDowell's Frost's Freesia going Winners. This was a small show in numbers, but it aided our breed in serving to bring publicity and to show that some judges were not afraid to put up a dog of a "small" in numbers breed.

Among champions in England in 1935 (with influence on our Sams here to a great degree),

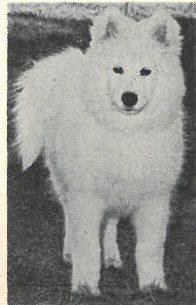

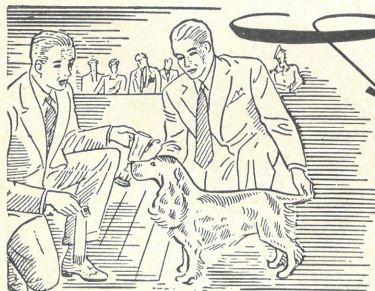
