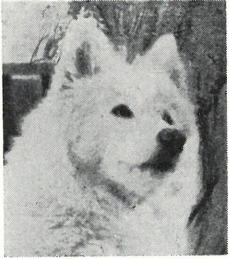

Through the courtesy of Mrs. "Jackie" Gradt of Itasca, Illinois, we have a newspaper clipping from the January 29th issue of the Chicago American.

I give it to you in full because of its value to dog owners and the voting public.

It is from Jack J. Kleinman, secretary of the Fort Dearborn German Shorthaired Pointer Club—in a newsletter to members and officials of the Club.

"Regarding the Des Plaines wild life area: Many of you have read in the papers of the intended 'Land Grab' of this fine area for industrial purposes. If this is accomplished, you know how it will directly affect this club.

"First, we will be without field trial grounds. We have had access to these grounds through the expressed permission of the Department of Conservation, whose management of this area and others in the State of Illinois, has done much to attract quality field trials. Some contend that these are the finest field trial grounds in the midwest.

"Of even greater importance to many sportsmen is the fact that the Des Plaines area provides hunting privileges to thousands of average city dwellers who do not have access to privately owned lands or to clubs.

"By the intelligent use of these wonderful areas for something other than actual hunting, we may continue to advocate the acquisition of more lands for public use. They may well be the only areas left for the average hunter in the not-too-distant future.

"The lands are so managed that propagation practices, cover control, water impoundments, game and fish management and many other projects are carried on to benefit the hunter and fisherman.

"The only recourse we have is in our voting rights in the next election!

"Write to both U. S. Senators Paul Douglas and Everett Dirksen, c/o Senate Building, Washington, D.C., and the Congressional representative in your district. Every letter counts. Do it now! Time is growing short for immediate action."

Other people, however, have told me to the contrary—stating that they have a gentle, mild disposition. Please let me have your opinion, as being familiar with the breed and their habits, as my mother was quite upset upon hearing the uncomplimentary remarks."

I have answered her letter paragraph by paragraph—and hope that she will find satisfaction and assurance in it.

I believe that the collector of garbage is one of the chief trials to a dog in the city—he's not only unavoidably noisy but he also takes things from your place, etc. I was working out in my garden a few days ago when the "collector" came by, a colored fellow who has never attempted to tease the dogs—and what's so important, he has always closed the gate when he leaves.

On that day he began a conversation in praise of our two, asking about their ages, etc., saying that he had been on this route for 13 years and had always so admired the dogs. The secret of goodwill between them? We know what day collection is made and the dogs are confined on our back porch some 15 or 20 feet from the gate and within sight of it—there is no cause for friction between them and he helps to keep it that way. It's true if I'm not somewhere nearby, one of them will bark, but it's a signal to me, nothing more. But so it is.

Taken from the Winter 1958 Bulletin of the National Samoyed Club of America, the following will be of interest to our readers.

"How to Photograph a Samoyed"

By Gene W. Bennett

"When I was asked by Helene (1958 PCD Publicity Director) to write this article, I thought it would be a nice way to spend an evening. After several evenings and as many re-writes, I found that I was still too technical for even my wife to understand, and I know she has a better than average understanding of photographic terminology. I finally came up with the following information which I hope is not too technical and yet not too vague.

"The following can be applied to photographing any breed of dog. The angles given are to minimize unwanted features, or to show a good quality to the best advantage. This article of course is dealing only with the Sammy.

"HEAD: A good head can be photographed from any angle. A front or full face angle (dog looking straight at camera) will show to the best advantage that Samoyed smile, an almond shaped eye, and the small round ear. It will lessen a long or too short a muzzle.

A side view (direct profile) will minimize a round eye, a long pointed ear, or a light eye. These, you know are undesirable features in our breed.

"BODY: A side view (profile) will show a medium length of back, a good tail set, a good rounded stifle, and a "Bellie" coat.

"A three-quarter view (three-quarters of front showing) will minimize a long back, straight stifle, and a tail that is not set well on the back.

"A front sitting position will minimize a lack of coat.

"SIZE: The average size dog should be photographed from a half crouched position. A large dog while standing. The short legged dog should be shot from a kneeling position.

"Determine first the head, body, and size angle that will show your dog to the best advantage. Remember all four feet should be pointing straight ahead.

"TRICKS TO ALERT: Show a favorite toy. Say "bye-bye" or "Pussy-cat," if this is part of their vocabulary. Try throwing a ball in the direction you want the head to look. Have someone the dog knows enter or leave the scene unexpectedly. Of course, a favorite tid-bit will sometimes keep them in a state of constant alertness.

"I won't endeavor to explain the use of cameras, with adjustable shutter speeds, lens openings, range finders, and built-in exposure meters, as the owners of these cameras should know their operation better than I.

"For the box camera or Brownie, use Kodak Verichrome Pan or Ansco All-Weather Pan for out of doors or inside flash. For color shots I would suggest using Kodak Kodacolor. Use Kodak Tri X film for outdoor shade or indoor no flash. In taking color pictures out of doors, have the dog in full sunlight. A Sammy will photograph well on a green lawn, or against a blue sky, as well as a dark building or shade in the background. On an overcast day or in the open shade, use a blue flash bulb about 10 to 12 feet. Indoors with Kodacolor, use white bulbs at about 10 feet. Never get closer than 8 feet to the subject with a box camera. Sometimes the use of flash bulbs will make the Sammy look too white, thus losing the texture of their coat. Flash is usually necessary under poor light conditions.

"Don't be discouraged at first if you don't bat 1000. It will all come in time. Remember, there isn't a perfect dog and the dogs know there isn't a perfect photographer."

LAST MINUTE WARNING!!

This note comes from Helen 2nd, that champion of the rights of all who own or love dogs—any breed!

State Senator Hollister of Santa Barbara, wants to infringe upon the rights of dog owners (few as those rights are even now)—by making it legal for anyone to kill a dog on the spot—if he considers that dog is "worrying" others!

She advises—Get a letter—a postcard or telegram to the Committee in Sacramento, Edwin Regan, Chairman, State Legislature—to Kayo, Kabitz and Kaput No. 129. She urges "Rush it before you and I are too late!"

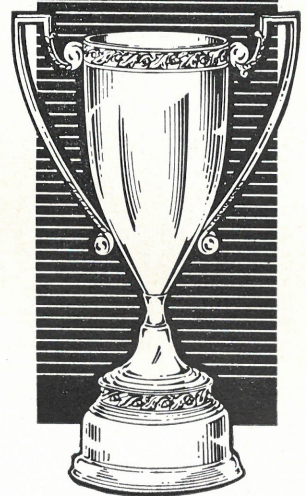

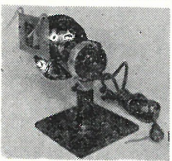
