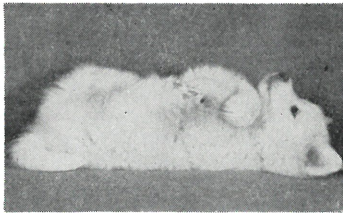

"The American Imported Samoyeds"

Continued from December Western Kennel World.

"Yurak's Trip of Farningham, who came to Mrs. Romer in 1925 and completed a championship in 1928, went out to California and following the troubles resulting from the sale of Tobolsk to California, was lost to the breed. Few of his progeny were recorded, among them being Triplane, Zahra II and Princess of Maybelle.

"The best known import of 1925 was Yukon Mit, a most influential addition to the breed. He is said to have been most stylish, the word used with reference to him was usually 'swank,' and this characteristic he passed on to his progeny. He brought in style in the same manner that the great Barin had brought coat, and Tobolsk size and strength. When mated to

Barin's daughter, Nona of Donerna, he sired the famous Ch. Gorka, who, like his sire, topped a working group in notable company, an unusual thing in those days. When mated to Nanci, another daughter of Barin, Yukon Mit sired Ch. Mitboi and Tarquin, sire in turn of the well known Ch. Tarquin II. Yukon Mit was without doubt a sire who had a strong and beneficial influence on the breed, and practically taught American owners ring form for Samoyeds. Bomba of Winkworth, half sister to the earlier imports, Olga of Farningham and Olaf of Farningham, came in this year bred to Mushinsk, a full brother of Yukon Mit, and also went to Mr. Wing's Kennels, to be joined there the same year by Titane and Snow Fay. Bomba of Winkworth's English-bred American litter consisted of Barre of Wingbrook, pet of the Pomfret School, unfortunately drowned at a youthful age, Zouroff and Frosty of Wingbrook. Titine was a beautiful bitch of small size, and left no descendants. Snow Fay was the dam of Yukon Mit II and White Rock of Wingbrook, sired by Yukon Mit. Bomba won some notable show victories, often defeating dogs for top honors.

"Jason, son of Osten, litter brother of Barin, was the next to arrive and went to Miss Alma Bennett in San Francisco. His best known son is Ch. Jack Frost of Sacramento.

"The next import of value was the fine bitch Stara of Farningham, registered in 1926, by Mrs. Michalek, and later transferred to Miss Humphriss. She left two fine daughters, Siberian Stara and the well known Icy King's Siberian Stara. In 1927 Maroosa of Farningham came in to Mrs. Romer. Maroosa, a daughter of Polar Light, came in bred to Nim of Farningham, and in the litter were Louva, Vladivostok of Creve, Polar Ice, Ch. Siberian Boy (a working group first), and Ch. Orka of Farningham, Maroosa later went to Mrs. Reid of the Norka Kennels, and was the dam of Ch. Norka's Lev and Ch. Norka's Tasia, sired by Toby of Yurak II. Anka of Farningham came in bred to Polar Sea and went to Florida. In that litter, Capensis Alexis and Capensis Kara were registered. She was followed by Fram of Farningham, who also went to Florida, but left few descendants. He was once mated to Anka, and Capensis Nona was their daughter.

"The greatest addition in 1927 was Mushinsk, full and older brother of Yukon Mit. To Mushinsk in 1928 came a high honor, for in that year he placed in the working group at Westminster. To only two other Samoyeds has this honor fallen, once to Toby of Yurak II, and once to Ch. Dobrynia, grandson of Ch. Tiger Boy of Norka and of Ch. Toby of Yurak II and Maroosa. Mushinsk was a splendid representative of the breed and a most important

import for the show ring as he was a born showman and very impressive in the ring.

"In 1928 came the lovely Northern Light of Farningham, full sister to Polar Light of Farningham, and dam in England of Siberian Marco of Farningham and Foam of the Arctic. Northern Light had an impressive ring history here, but unfortunately did not live long. The short-lived Varvara came into New England in 1928, as did the litter brothers Karol and Koski, the last named alone of the trio leaving descendants unto today. Other young imports of 1929, Nickola of Farningham, Polaricicle and Snow Bruena of Farningham, were likewise short lived and left no descendants. Snow Ivan of Farningham, who arrived in the same year, sired a number of young dogs for the Siberian Kennels, among whom were Siberian Snow Ivan and Halloran's Ivan of Hoboken. The English Desstara of Farningham, dam in England to Desreena, also came in to Miss Humphriss this year and attained a championship here. Desstara was bred to Ch. Icy King and left by this mating a number of descendants. A dog not closely related to any American dogs, save through his grandsire, Osten, was Pavel of Stansfield, who came into the Laika Kennels, but left few descendants, the most important being Laika's Naryma Belle.

"The greatest import of that year was, without a doubt, the English Ch. Tiger Boy, named here Tiger Boy of Norka, son of Ch. Kara Sea, and who shortly attained an American championship. Tiger Boy had several times been Best in Show in England; and in England, in one litter out of Susie, he has sired Surf of the Arctic, Kosca of Kobe and Riga of the Arctic; by Tchita, his sire's litter sister, he sired Shona, granddam of the 1935 American import, Stutton Jacko II. He was destined to win many show honors and to sire a long line of worthy dogs. Ch. Norka's Moguiski was one of his notable sons, as well as Ch. Duke of Norka and Norka's Kazack. Ch. Norka's Lubiniev and

Winner of Five Challenge Certificates and
Five Bests of Breed

Ch. Norka's Pascova were among his important daughters. He lived to a good old age and was one of the highlights of the imports.

"The year 1929 also saw the importation of Searchlight of Norka, an English born son of Tiger Boy by Tchita.

"The big arrival of 1930 was Storm Cloud, son of Chs. Sea Foam and Vara. This great dog quickly gained his championship and while little shown, won many honors. He left several fine sons in England, including the notable Peter of Kobe. In this country he became the sire of Ch. Tucha and of Vida of Snowland, out of the imported Morina of Taimir, a 1934 import, granddaughter of Ch. Desstart of Farningham and of Ch. Polar Light of Farningham. Through his daughter, Vida, he had a marked influence on the breed as she became the dam of Champions Nim, Nadya and Norna of Snowland, and of Nianya and Nikita of Snowland. Ch. Nadya in turn became the dam of the young Indiana owned Ch. Novik of Snowland and Ch. Nalda of Snowland, while Nianya became the dam of Ch. Chum, on the Pacific Coast, so that through these, Storm Cloud's descendants are carrying on valiantly today East and West in America; and through Peter of Kobe in England, and in America, through Ch. Nova Sonia of Kobe.

"An excellent bitch, too, arrived the same year as Ch. Storm Cloud, Nooya of Norka, litter sister of the English Ch. Winter and half sister to Donerna's Barin. Nooya left not too many offspring, but came in bred to Kara Sea and in that litter was Norka's Karasen. By Tiger Boy she was dam of Norka's Nooya Girl. Another bitch registered in 1930 was Loosha, who had been in the country since puppyhood, and was apparently registered at eight years of age in order that her son, Earnshaw's Boris might be registered. Loosha never entirely recovered from distemper suffered as a puppy.

"There were five imports in 1931, White Countess of the Arctic and Snow Frost of the Arctic traveled together to Mrs. McDowell in California; White Sprite of the Arctic, who came to Mrs. Mann in Trenton; the magnificent Barena of Farningham who went to Miss Hum-

phriss; and Zahrina, dam of Kara Sea, who went to Norka Kennels as Zahrina of Norka. Ch. Snow Frost sired Mitzi-Aura-Laska, an influential bitch, Lassen's Shalopie and Ch. Tangara and Ch. Kara Kol. White Sprite was mated several times to Ch. Gorka, a son being Ch. Yorza. She was also mated to Ch. Storm Cloud. The Scottish born Zahrina, eight years old when imported, was dam in England of Chs. Kara Set and Tchita, sired by Mustan of Farningham, and of Susie, sired by Koorali. Here in America she became the dam of Norka's Dagmar, a notable bitch sired by Ch. Norka's Lev.

"In 1932 five imports were also registered: Pedlar of the Arctic and his sire Oleg; Kara Gem, sire of the sophisticated Sniejok of Norka came in from England, while the Canadian champions Wizbang Laskeybelle and Ivanski came in from Canada to the Siberian Kennels. In 1932 Miss Hudson imported a fine bitch, White Rose, which died three weeks after arrival.

"Bakou, the French dog who came out in 1928, was registered this year. Bakou was a striking dog, on the small side, grandson of Fingal, the finest Samoyed in France, and later sired by the dog Bokar. It is a pity he was not more often a sire. Oleg sired a number, among them Tristan of Hillcrest, Wizbang Laskeybelle, a daughter of Vandyke Snowball, a litter brother to Tiger Boy, was dam to Ch. Laskeybelle of Darya, a good bitch who quickly won a championship. Ivanski left a number of descendants sired by his son, Siberian Ivanski.

"Barena was one of the finest bitches which came into this country, but unfortunately never had a litter here.

"In 1933 Victor of the Arctic came in as a pet. Glacier of the Arctic, owned in Philadelphia as a pet and never registered, also came in 1932, and three times made the trip back across the Atlantic to see the English veterinary who cared for him in his puppyhood kennels.

"Kara Gem sired a litter out of Yena of Marne, daughter of the Canadian owned import, the late Byfang of Kobe.

"Pedlar suffered blindness from distemper while quite young and while he lived until June 1942, is remembered for his ability to enjoy life despite his handicap, and to rule the

kennel in which he lived as though in full possession of his sight, rather than for his progeny of whom there were few.

"In 1934 three imports arrived, Khasi of Arev of Norka, Sabarka of Farningham known as a sled team leader and Sasha of Farningham.

"Only three arrived also in 1935, Ch. Ice Crystal of the Arctic, dam in England of Silver Glow of the Arctic, the dog Shack, who went to private owners as a pet, and Stutton Jacko II who came in from Canada. Crystal came in bred to Ch. Leader of the Arctic, but the litter did not survive.

"In 1936 there were seven new arrivals, a son and daughter of Ch. Kara Sea, Ch. Siberian Nansen of Farningham and Martyaska of Farningham; Ch. Moscow of Farningham, Siberian Laika of Farningham, Ch. Sprint of the Arctic (grandson of Ice Crystal), Vanya of Kobe, and Snow Finn of Farningham. Ch. Nansen became the sire of Ch. Nim, Nadya and Norna of Snowland and of Nianya and Nikita of Snowland. Ch. Sprint sired Ch. Novik and Ch. Nalda of Snowland, Zorina, Zoveek and the late Kona of Snowland. Ch. Moscow sired the late Lensen of Snowland (out of Ice Crystal), whose line is carrying on on the Pacific Coast. Vanya of Kobe, Siberian Laika of Snowfinn died young and had no progeny of importance.

"In 1938 the only import was a dog from Francem Inora du Grand Nord, great granddaughter of Fingal, who went to a private owner as a pet, while in 1939 there were four; Ch. Sport of the Arctic, a litter brother of Ch. Sprint and Silver Spark of the Arctic, a full brother of these two. The third was White Way of Kobe; fourth was White Phantom of the

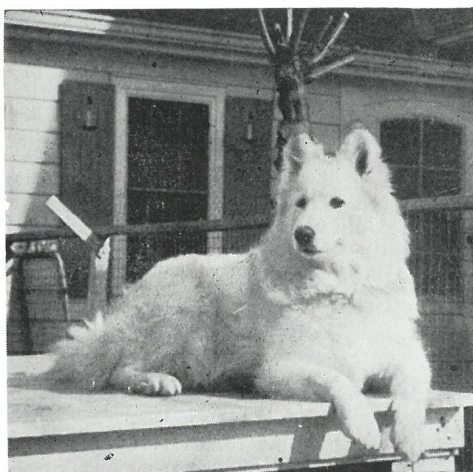

Arctic. Ch. White Way of Kobe and Silver Spark are winning show honors on the West Coast and siring notable puppies. Sport of the Arctic has sired but one litter.

"In spite of the war, there were three newcomers in 1940, the beautiful bitch, Ch. Nova Sonia of Kobe, full but not litter sister to White Way of Kobe and to the unregistered White Son of Kobe, who came in to the Armours about 1938, came safely on the now long hazardous journey from England and has already produced a notable litter. From Hong Kong, China, came a fine Kilbourne Scott bred bitch, Farningham Snow Wrangle. This bitch has also whelped a distinguished litter. The last to reach our shores was Polar Starsun of Farningham, a full brother to Farningham Snow Wrangle.

"Only time can tell us the value of these later imports as a dog's worth to the breed can best be judged by the quality of its progeny.

"The breedings of the coming years will tell the story. The importers through all these years have for the most part endeavored to bring in the best stock available, to keep the standard of the breed high and to preserve its virility. Now that all importing is at a standstill due to world conditions, it is more important than ever that today's breeders take special care to select wisely and strive to preserve the fundamental qualities of the breed."

We call attention to the new ads which appear in our section this New Year.

Mrs. Ann Marie Goelkel of New Rochelle, New York tells us that her imported Shelagh Janmayen gave birth to six exceptional puppies—four males and two females on October 4, 1950. They are English-bred, American born sons and daughters of Snowland Fyodor (American Ch. Martingate Snowland Taz ex Snowland Vivie). Snowland Shelagh Janmayen is by Snowland Sarnac ex Judith Jan Mayen.

Mrs. Goelkel also offers her imported Ch. Raff of Kobe at stud. Raff is the sire of some very fine Sams whelped by Suretta of Kobe, owned by Mrs. Charles Tucker of Encino, California.

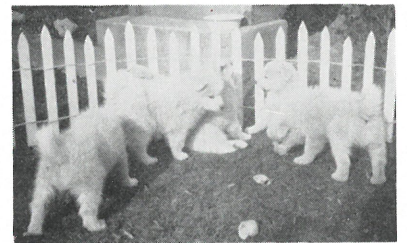

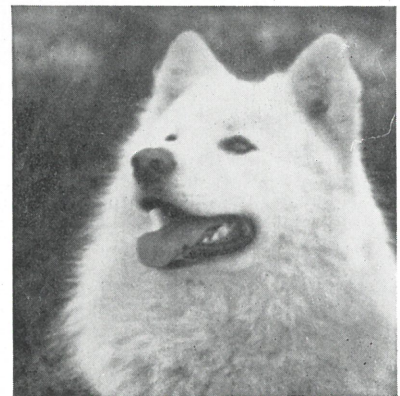
And now, folks, let's begin to plan for an outstanding entry of Sams at Oakland Show, March 3 and 4.
