SAMOYEDES

We are just in receipt of another of those delightful "chatty" news bulletins published by the Samoyede Club of America through the kindness of Messrs. Miles Vernon, R. C. Lawrence and Foley, and Mrs. C. H. Quereaux; and copy here some of the highlight of the issue.

"English visitors to this country who are familiar with the Samoyede, have on numerous occasions judged at American shows, but we believe Miss Ruth Stillman of New York is the first American man or woman to be invited to judge the breed in England, and she judged at the great Club show at Richmond which corresponds to our Morris and Essex each year.

Her critique was published in the English Kennel Gazette of July, 1935, and her decisions were well placed. Challenge certificates, (corresponding to our Winners Dogs and Winners Bitches awards) went to Ch. Magnus of Kobe, and to Kosena of Koke, both of Mrs. D. L. Perry's breeding. Magnus being a grandson of Ch. Storm Cloud owned in America by Miss Elizabeth Hudson.

Miss Stillman says: "In many of the classes the general merit and the mixture of the sexes, which we seldom do in America, made the decisions very difficult.

The following observations may be of interest to my readers; eyes, on the average, were on the light side; bodies and bones of the bitches with a few exceptions, impressed me most favorably, in fact I found them superior in this respect to the dogs, I had expected to find stronger and more typical feet, the coats for this time of the year were exceptionally

good. The average of truly typical Samoyedes is far higher here than that seen at the shows in America, altho as a whole, I do not think they show as well."

In Novice dogs, Miss Stillman pointed out the possibilities of Hoar of Manetto Hill, a junior. Among the well known winners in class awards were Ch. Kara Queen, a half sister of Ch. Tiger Boy of Norka-Ch. Edelweiss, litter sister of Storm Cloud; White Fang of Kobe Ch. Snow Chief of the Arctic and Son o' Seawrack, the extically named son of Seawrack and the cream, "Silver."

Miss Stillman had a big job, and she did it well."

In regards to some of our New England shows, Mrs. Quereaux reports that Mrs. Jennie H. Williams of South Braintree, Mass. won Best of Breed with her Ch. Tanjo of Stolzenfels (reserve winners bitch at 1935 Westminster.) At Myopia Hunt Club, Aug. 23, reserve winners went to a newcomer, an 11 month old bitch owned by Mrs. Laura Boyd of Billerica, Mass., an old timer in the breed, and well known to many of the New Yorkers. Mrs. Boyd's winner was by Laika's Lucky Day out of Laika's Dinache.

The following news items also from the bulletin are of interest; Mr. R. E. Brott of Cleveland has a litter out of his Stara, sired by Mgr. Keegan's Dobyrynia.

Mrs. Helen Harris has registered her young bitch Pertrouska of Snowland. This young Samoyede was whelped last March, and is out of Starshaya and sired by Sabarka of Farningham. Starshaya in puppyhood was called "Kate Smith," and is by Ch. Storm Cloud and White Sprite of the Arctic.

Another registration is Mrs. Mary L. Barner King Barner, bred by Mrs. E. H. Burke of Uniontown, Pa., and sired by her Kingson of Burkeride.

Mrs. McDowell's latest registration is Khivais Alia Obi (Suggen of Laika ex Ch. Patricia Obi,) and Mrs. Sheldon has registered a McDowell bred dog by Snow Frost ex White Countess and has given the dog the famous name of Loga.

On her recent visit to Maryland, Mitboi, formerly owned by Mrs. Quereaux, almost had hysterics, he was so delighted to see her again. "He leads the proverbial life of Reilly, roams over 350 acres, is spoiled by doctors, nurses and patients, makes the rounds with the watchman, and parks in the center of the Administration Building entrance for a snooze and lets people walk around him. The men "shake him up" and Mittie-boy fusses and fumes and threatens awful things when he gets around to doing them, and goes straight back to be pestered some more. He's as happy as a dog can possibly be, which is very, very happy."

Mrs. Horace Mann's White Sprite and Suinu (Sonny) are her dog family now. Suinu, by White Sprite and Ch. Gorka, who is a full brother to Ch. Yorza but younger, is a gorgeous big dog, with much of the Gorka expression. Our picture of him shows him as he was a year ago. We can imagine how he appears now.

Nishni of Garrison, owned by C. E. Wheat, Jr., was best of breed at the Storm King Show on September 7th.

Mrs. McDowell reports the sale of a dog, Marook of Snow Frost, (by Ch. Snow Frost ex White Countess) to a member of the Chinese Consulate of San Francisco, and that

this Samoyede will shortly be taken to Shanghai, China.

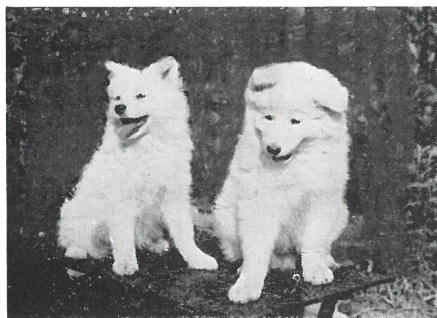
