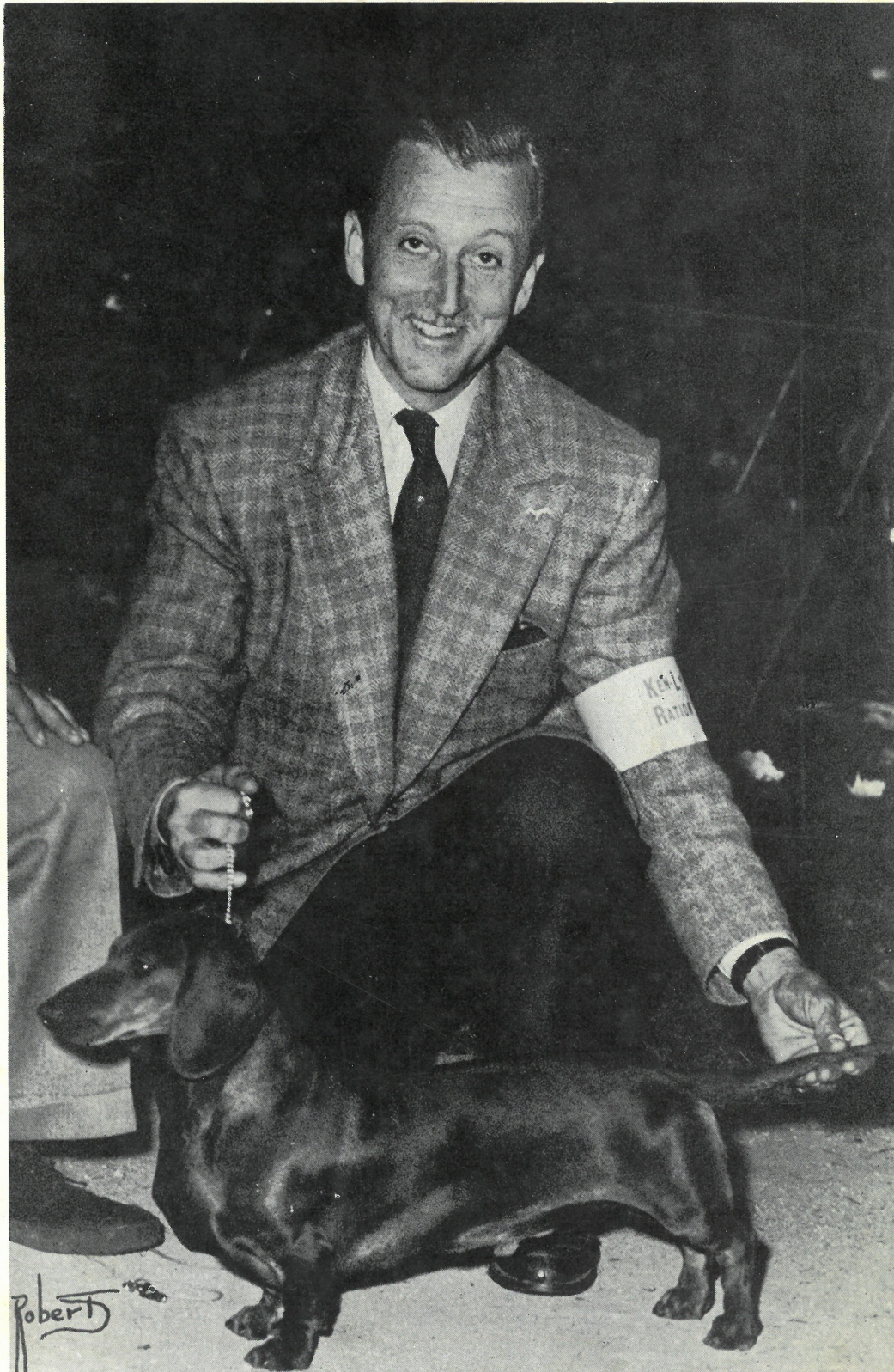

Starchak will lead four of his sons into a Christmas party. They will be pulling a dogsled piled high with packages donated by Alpha Gamma Delta senior alumnae" (of which Dolly Ward is a member).

"When the Samoyeds meet Santa Claus who will distribute the gifts (bought through the work of the alumnae) "it will be a fitting reunion. For the breed which originates in the Ural mountains of Siberia, is familiarly known as the Christmas dog."

It was so nice to again hear from Mrs. Jack Alger, now living in Spokane, Washington. The Algers hope to be taking in most of the Pacific Northwest shows. Their Frosty has been doing his bit in recent shows—was at Turlock and Fresno with Mr. Alger. Come down again, folks—and by all means make it for Oakland won't you? It's a one day show for each breed—that is, our Sams need to come ONLY on Saturday March 3.

We are sorry that due to ill health and the Doctor's orders, Mrs. Lucile L. About Ch. Gorka—our Christmas "Whats My Name" Sam. Mrs. Bess Mann of Wyoming

grand Ch. Gorka in it. Mrs. Mann's delight was doubled in receiving from Mrs. Quereaux, a page from Spratt's Year Book of all Breeds—showing the same picture of Gorka, representing our Sammy breed. This picture was sent to Spratts at their request some 20 years ago, and it is good to note that they still look upon Gorka as one of the famous American bred Sams (and a fine specimen of the breed he still remains).

Many winning Sams here on the coast carried Gorka's blood in their veins—among those still being shown today is Mrs. Hazel Dawes' Ch. Lucky Labon Nahum of Cupertino.

Looking back on the story of Gorka—we repeat the following for the benefit of some of our most recent owners of Sams; who may never have heard of the name. The item taken

from the pages of the Bulletin of the Samoyed Club of America of May 1933, reads in part:

**THE PASSING OF OUR GREATEST AMERICAN BRED—CH. GORKA**

"The news from Trenton of the death of Champion Gorka on April 25, 1933 from an undetermined cause, is a great blow to the Samoyed breed. The majestic white dog, always the most superbly coated dog in the show ring, and with a personality which attracted many many friends — was well known to the show going public. He had a gallery which believed him America's greatest Samoyed, and nothing could shake that belief. It cannot be gainsaid that he had achieved victory beyond the breed as yet unequalled by any dog of his breed.

Born July 15, 1927 out of Nona of Donerna by Ch. Yukon Mit, Gorka was always the special pet and pride of his breeder, Mrs. Horace Mann. The show ring was not considered until, to help swell the entries of her local show, Mrs. Mann entered Gorka—not quite seventeen months old in December 7-8, 1928 in Trenton show — and the novice only went to Best of Breed and beyond that to first in the working group — that group consisting among others, of dogs of the caliber of the Doberman-Big Boy of White Gate—the Collie, Laund Lady Gay of Bellhaven; the German Shepherd Dog Pia von Haus Schutting, and others of equal magnitude in the dog world. One of these dogs was a few weeks later to be Best of all breeds at the Baltimore show, but there at Trenton, the son of Mit and grandson of Barin (Ch. Donerna's Barin) carrying in his bearing and coat, a semblance of each, was first—and overnight caught the fancy of many well known dog lovers."

He was spoken of as "a highly representative Samoyed—a big dog, perfectly formed and one that carries a lot of coat of the right texture." Easily to his championship went Gorka." A big dog (we believe he weighed 60 pounds) —with style, coat, dark expressive eye, and above all, personality — Gorka, a big petted, loved spoiled puppy was admired everywhere."

**Another Lost Sam Has Been Found**

Some time ago we reported that a Sam pup owned by Albert K. Smith, Jr. of Moscow, Idaho, had been lost. Well folks, we are happy to give you the following news sent us by Mr. Smith, who had written over three hundred letters to all the police chiefs, veterinarians and kennel owners within a radius of 400 miles of Moscow, and had received friendly assistance from almost all of them. Mr. Smith tells us that he had one party under suspicion—a plumber who had been particularly interested in the dog only an hour before its disappearance. Learning that the plumber had left town, the next day for Missoula, Montana, Smith took a special trip up there a week or so later to alert police in Missoula and they were very helpful. An offer of a hundred dollar reward was made. Finally about a month later, a letter came from the police giving hope that the dog had been found. So after swearing out a warrant for the arrest of the plumber, Smith took another trip to Missoula.

It happened that the plumber had sold the pup which brought complications but after consultation with the lawyer and the purchaser, all was settled, out of court, and the plumber paid heavily for his theft. The crime in Idaho constituted grand larceny which would have brot a one to 14 year prison term but since the man was not a professional thief, it seemed that he had paid enough for his deed.
