

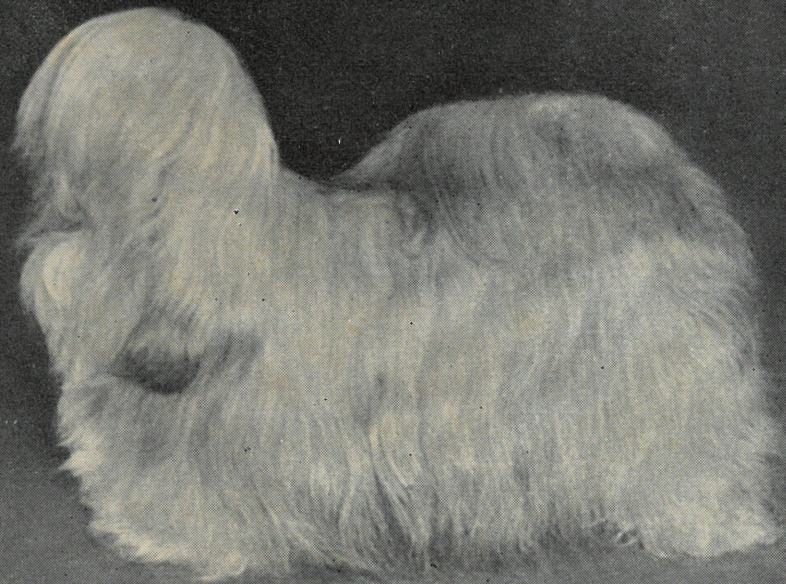

Folks, we've just had a bit of sad news from Miss Juliet T. Goodrich, owner of the Snow Shoe Hill Samoyeds of Chicago and Land O'Lakes, Wisc.

Keena Frost of Snow Show Hill passed away on July 17, after a trying illness of over 2 weeks. She would have been 12 years old in September — never completely lost her spirit, and it was hoped that she would get better, for there can never be another Sam just like her. She had never been bred, so there can never be even any of her bloodline to follow. Keena always had a most sparkling personality, full of gaiety and conversation. She was the official "greeter" at Snow Shoe Hill and is most sorely missed.

Keena was by Ch. Kandalaska ex Yena of Marne, with Byfang of Kobe as her double grandsire, and thus Ch. White Fang of Kobe and Keena of Kobe, her double grandparents. Her maternal granddam was the Canadian champion Viga, a Westminster winner of the earlier days. Ch. Viga was by Siberian Bado of Farningham and Pinky of Farningham, and so, a half sister of Mrs. Helen Harris' famous Ch. Siberian Nansen of Farningham of Snowland, and Lady May Boothby's Buck of the Glacier. Keena was a 21 inch bitch, compact, with a strong body, good solid bone and a great deal of style. She was a good showman when in the mood.

At a Morris and Essex show, while waiting to go into the ring, she suddenly gave her handler the slip, and while the judge kindly waited for her, she was finally located on a bench with some dogs of another breed, where she pretended to be sound asleep.

The high point of her career was in 1950, when she was Best of Winners at the International show in Chicago.

The lovely picture of Keena in Miss Goodrich's Tribute, shows Keena at the age of six months a beautifully styled Sammy bitch. The smaller snap showed her with the late Jack Frost of Snow Shoe Hill, with whom she loved to play. There are 6 Sams remaining at Snow Shoe Hill, with Jack Frost the ancestor of each with the exception of the imported Harmony of

White Samoyed Tops Tonawanda"

Word comes to us that Mrs. Bernice Ashdown's imported Eng. Ch. Americ of Kobe (Ch. Ivanoff of Kobe ex Raff's Stara of Kobe), from Mrs. Dorothy L. Perry's English Kennels, made his American debut at Tonawanda in June, where he went Best Samoyed, and on to Best Working Dog and then to BEST DOG IN SHOW. He has taken 5 Working Group wins, and completed his American championship with

points to spare. An unprecedented record for a Samoyed, and one that few dogs of any breed ever achieve. Never defeated by any other Working dog, Americ gained his title with stiffest competition with other group winners.

We are happy to be able to present this lovely picture of the Sam who has brought such honors to our breed. Quoting from a newspaper clipping we have read—"Spectators at Batavia's Tonawanda Valley show, saw a bit of rarity. An import, making its first American appearance went all the way from the classes to Best in Show. This was the scintillating white Samoyed, English Champion Americ of Kobe, owned by Mrs. George Ashdown of Manhasset, L. I.—and shown by Charles L. Rollins. Against him was a strong field, including three dogs that had won this group both days. "Congratulations to Mrs. Ashdown from all of us who love to see a good Sam go to the top!

ST. BERNARDS

St. Bernard dogs in the west, need special care during September, from both kennel and house pet owners. Our hot weather seems to culminate in a final blast during the early fall and is not kindly to the Big Breed. Sun baths of short duration are good for all dogs, but no living creature should be subjected to too much of it, and the Saint coats fade with the sun exposure drying up the natural oils and drying the skin. Providing shade is the most important hot weather factor of care, along with freshly filled water pans of cool not cold or iced water. Special grooming with a good brush, and working right to the skin is a daily must. Watch carefully for fleas and vermin, and common house flies are at the busiest now, too. Fly bites

on nose, ears and paws are most annoying. Good sprays and dips are available to repel insects. The shedding of old hair is almost constant in the Saint. Special care of their quarters is also a must. As an individual writer we have stressed coat care, perviously. We feel it is an important item in the care of the Biggest and the Best. Our own big rough coats are always admired at the dog shows and the deep red color also inquired about every month of the year. We have never had a "hot spot" on a Saint, at Pinewood, and with litter mates of our particular dogs fading and spotting, even we feel that it might be daily routine, altho the actual color and shading of a Saint is inherited. In answer to the many inquiries we receive at ring side, our Saints get their 2 mile daily constitutional in the evening, usually spend the hot part of the day on cool linoleum or tile floors inside a cool house temperature maintained at 68 or 70 degrees at all times. They are cleaned to the skin with a vacuum cleaner daily, sponged for soil if needed, and groomed with a good brush and rough towels once or twice a day. With 2 dogs this is easily done, and the time saved in house work balances. Dust and hair have to be picked up on the dog or on the rugs and floors and furniture. Living as closely as we do with our house pet Saints we realize our advantages, but with a larger number of dogs kenneled a daily inspection and grooming will ward off trouble before it gets a hold. Scratching is fun and exercise and a part of being a dog, but an owner who inspects an area that receives continued scratching will save a lot of time and trouble by pre-care instead of the cures for skin ailments.

Complete show reports will again appear next month.

Our own beloved pet, Monk of Montclair whose life was devoted to children, in cart rides and Girl Scout education, and the McMillan family, feel the great loss of a real gentleman, in their home.

Of brighter vitals, we announce our first litter at Pinewood Kennels, 5 healthy angels to join the clan of Saints, born to Sevarg's Dixie V Lion D'Or C.D. by the Graves newest kennel addition in stud dogs, Heilman's Mark Von Bonfield.

If this copy seems to be lacking, all of you dog people I am sure will be tolerant, as it is written on the 2nd day after whelping and a new adventure for us, in the field of St. Bernards.

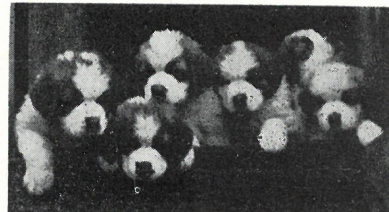
