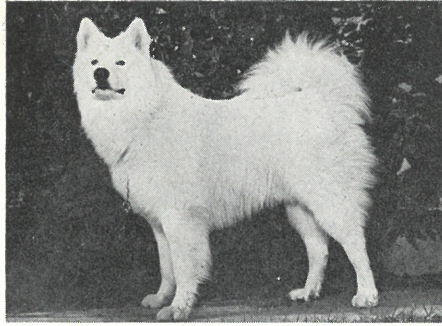
It was in the April 1947 Bulletin of the Samoyed Club of America that the following item appeared—and in line with the timeliness of the article (with shows appearing every week-end or so) we publish the item on our pages this issue. It is called:

"A Word to Every Samoyed Breeder"

For years the cry of light eyes in the breed has been raised. Lately we have seen more broken points—part pink, part black—than formerly, and many have asked if anything can be done about it. Both in England and America after each war, here and there a litter has been born with its two finest pups albinos—which would seem to indicate that some food deficiency was the cause. Years ago an old veterinarian told Miss Humphriss that he would tell her how to get rid of "amber eyes." Miss Humphriss is always the most open-handed person in the world with any aid she can give fellow breeders. She tried the prescription he gave her on an out and out blue-eyed bitch, selected purposely for the experiment, and this bitch invariably whelped dark-eyed pups. Lately, several other kennels are trying it and so far the results have been good. We do not hand it on as a guaranteed preventative of light eyes and broken points, but we do say that where it has been used, reports are good. The recipe is simple—get some ordinary every-day seaweed, dry it in the sun, grind it as fine as possible, (it is tougher than all get-out) and feed your bitches and sires a teaspoonful a day in their food the year around. The theory is that in seaweed is the iodine and iron which is otherwise lacking. The iron is needed for black points, the iodine for dark eye color.

Probably it isn't at all scientific. Some of our breeders prefer to get help tablets (sold where-

ever diabetic foods are sold) and to feed a dog a quarter tablet a day, but it is an experiment that cannot injure the dog, and if it does work, it will be of great benefit to every kennel trying it.

Note Correction Here

Before going further, may we call our readers' attention to the error in the notation under the picture of Miss Hudson's Morina of Taimir in the February issue giving Morina's age at that time as 13 months. Our 'copy' of those notes reads—"Morina of Taimir—at about 14 years of age. But of course you folks have guessed that already.

One night a couple of weeks ago our telephone pealed decisively—and as we hastened to answer it, a most excited voice on the other end greeted me with—"I've got some grand news for you." Then it came—"two beautiful little Sammy pups had arrived about 2:20 by air freight having left Mrs. Miller's Altai Kennels in Albuquerque, New Mexico about 5:30 that morning. The happy voice was owned by Mrs. Bryce Dye of Oakland. Dorothy Dye spoke of them as the "sweetest black eyed Sammies" she had ever seen. Inquiries brought the following answers—one was a male, the other a bitch—and the blood of Mrs. Miller's gorgeous Irish and American Champion Snowland Stara runs strong in their veins. The bitch pup—born the day before Christmas—is called Icy Girl. She is a daughter of Altai's Icyvor—a son of Stara out of Koraleva of Altai, who is a daughter of Ch. Zantok of Breezewood out of the late Ch. Valya of Snowland. Icy Girl's dam is none other than ZemZem of Breezewood—by Ch. Novik of Snowland out of Ch. Ec ho of Kobe, bred by Mrs. Berta M. Ruick of Breezewood.

The male, called Starzan of Altai, born December 28, is a son of Ch. Snowland Stara out of Zanova. Stara is of course by Ivanoff of Snowland, ex Snowland Stella, while Zanova is by Ch. Zantok of Breezewood out of Niarivik of Inara. It is good news to know that two pups bearing these outstanding names in their pedigrees have come to our Pacific Coast. Lots of

luck with those pups, Dot—and may all of it be Good Luck!

Mrs. Dona Jorgensen of Denair, California, writes happily of the arrival of a litter of puppies on February 5 to her Silver Penny of Malora. There are 5 pups in the litter—2 males and 3 females sired by Mr. and Mrs. Wm. P. Duhamel's Ch. Sasha II (Ch. White Way of Kobe ex Cleo.)

Another litter sired by Sasha is owned by Mr. and Mrs. Andrew Cooper of Burlingame—out of their Princess Tanya, a daughter of Ch. Starchak ex Tynda of Petsamo. These two pups are now 6 weeks old and "are regular little butterballs" says Mrs. Cooper.

Another litter expected soon will be from Snow Mist Tanya owned by Mr. and Mrs. C. L. Miller of San Francisco. Tanya (Kharkov ex Siberian Snow Sonia) has been mated to Mr. and Mrs. P. A. Stang's Sonolad of the Valley—the latter by Ladoga of the Valley ex Mielchka.

He had just completed his championship—having won it in three shows before having reached a year old. Ch. Kunto is by the Robert H. Ward's Ch. Starchak, C. D., out of Tucker's Tynda of Petsamo. More about this fellow next month—now over two years of age—when he will be offered at Stud for the first time.

Having at last found our Golden Gate marked catalogue, we are able to give you the names of the Sammy winners dog and winners bitch, and Best of Breed, as placed by Joe Dupon.

It will be noted that Mr. Dupon expressed dissatisfaction over the general size of the bitches exhibited at this show. It must be remembered that if we wish to improve our Samoy breed, we must work for the betterment of our bitches, although we must add that small size in a bitch does not mean they will produce small pups.

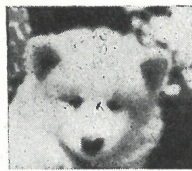

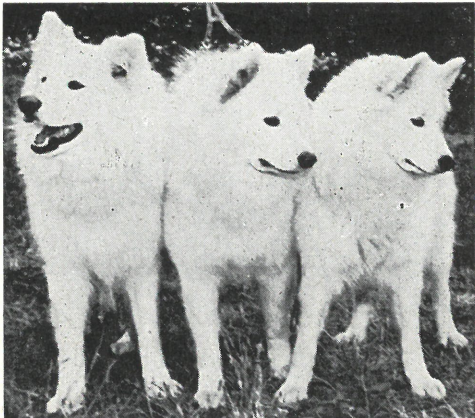

"Boston, Massachusetts Kennel Club show was small but beautifully staged by Mrs. Robert Seekins, trophy secretary," writes Mrs. Quereaux. Every dog had a wooden Sam in its booth, painted white, with black points and red tongue. A white ribbon 'leash' extended from the dog to a card bearing the owners's name and address. Mrs. Grace Brindle of So. Weymouth, Massachusetts, won Mrs. Quereaux' trophy of a subscription to Western Kennel World with her Sammy-Ed's Boris. Mrs. Brindle owns a pup named just simply—Ranger—a son of Mrs. Helene Irving's Ch. Nieko of Snowland out of her own Sammy-Ed's Jerri Mink. Mrs. Frederick Bascom's Vivotchka of Snowland (of Glens Falls, New York) was Winners Bitch and won Mrs. Lucile Miller's trophy of a Western Kennel World subscription. Mrs. Seekins' Vanya's Siberian Valeska was Reserve Winners Bitch. Best of Breed was Dr. Wm. Ivens' Ch. Snowland Taz.

A letter from Mrs. Mason of White Way Kennels in Sacramento tells us: "Before Petrof's Nick of White Way returned to Idaho he finished his championship according to AKC certificate. He was Best of Winners in the five shows entered and Best of Breed in three, in spite of being little out of condition. He was looking his best when we sent him back to Idaho. The only other show Nick has been entered in was at Chicago when 14 months old when he won the Novice group in a large entry as you know.

"I don't believe I told you about the Fresno show that was one of the most enjoyable attended in a long time. Jack Englert and Vera Jones, always very hospitable, did work hard as well as the rest of the Kennel club. Each of us were given a beautiful ceramic ash-tray with background of blue, and white Sammies in the bottom. Mine has the cutest Samoyed

puppy stretched out on his stomach—it is adorable. These were souvenirs given and done by Vera Jones and I believe Maria Englert had a hand in helping on them. Ch. Kara's King Karol II, nick-name 'Tarry' was beautiful and made a gorgeous picture with a beautiful curly head, three year old little girl. Tarry only met her two days before but she didn't annoy him a bit with her constant attention—appeared to be enjoying her mauling with much pleasure. It was worth entering at Fresno just to receive one of these lovely ash-trays. Montana is Becoming Sammy Wise. A delightful letter has reached us from Mrs.

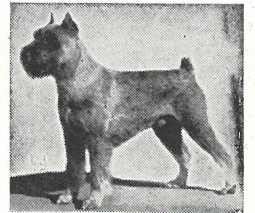
