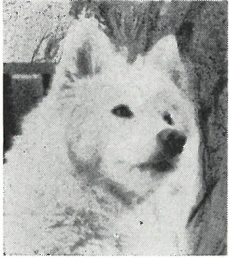

at the National Specialty held in Chicago. This year the 1959 National SCA Specialty was hosted by our Pacific Coast Division. Out to the Santa Clara show went the Eastern's "Butch." Many hearts went with him, for this is a dog which is loved for himself and one of our finest exponents of the true disposition a Sam should have. The great win did come to our Eastern entry, and the great Memorial Cup was retired by this still-young dog.

More About the Arctic Sled Dogs

At the request of several of our readers, we submit more news from Mr. Robert J. Woods, regarding the Arctic Sled Dog Club activities. "We already have 31 teams around New York State, Pennsylvania and Eastern Canada. Let's see some more get-together in other parts of Canada, Midwest and Northwest as well as anywhere in snow country where sledding conditions permit. If we can get anyone to start up in an area, we have proven that Public Demand will make it grow. Four years ago, the first sled dog race was held on Oneida Lake (near Syracuse, N.Y.) and went over good, with a spectator crowd of several hundred people. It has grown every year to the point where there were over 10,000 spectators at our race held here, the end of January of this year. On February 7th and 8th of this year we held a sled dog race at 1000 Islands, Clayton, N.Y., which was another "first," and which was well publicized by press, radio and TV, and in which the Sled Dog races drew a much bigger crowd of spectators than any other sports event that had ever been held there. The same story is true of another "first" at Barrie, Ont., Canada, in which ours was the first sled dog race that was ever held there, and it went over so big that they as well as most of the other places have asked us to come back again next year on the same dates, as an annual affair.

In these races it is customary for the Sponsor to provide Meal and Motel accommodations for each team driver and helper as well as the Chief Judges and Officials. In addition to this, they provide trophies and prizes for the contestants and pay the ASDC of A, a fee which is to cover club expenses of conducting the race. Our unit has their own public address amplifier system which is used at these races to keep the public informed as to progress of the race and to start teams. We have our own timers and officials who supervise and run the race which is much better than depending on locals who would not be familiar with procedures, etc., of such an affair. The Sponsor must provide an adequate course and location for the race. The Sponsor often prints a program of the race, in which they sell advertising, etc., to offset their expenses, yet these races are often run as a part of a Winter Carnival, to attract the public to the area.

From the By-Laws of the Arctic Sled Dog Club of America, we read the following:

OBJECT—The object of the club shall be to promote interest in the breeding, training, driving and racing of Northern Breed Sled Dogs, and to promote interest in the sport of Dog Sledding. The ASDC shall be a non-profit organization.

MEMBERSHIP—Any reputable person favorable to the objects and purposes of the club

shall be eligible for membership. Membership may be obtained by submission of applications properly completed, to an executive officer of the club, who shall bring it to a vote of the Owner-Driver committee at a regular meeting of the club. Associate, and or Junior members shall not have power to vote in the club."

Rules for running the races, and all information regarding same, will be published in another issue of WKW if our readers are interested—I shall hope to hear from you in regards to your wishes.

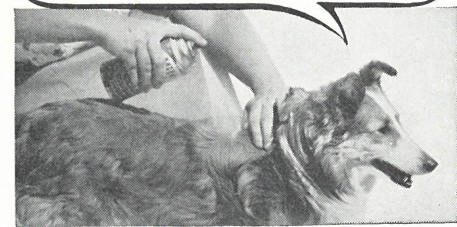
