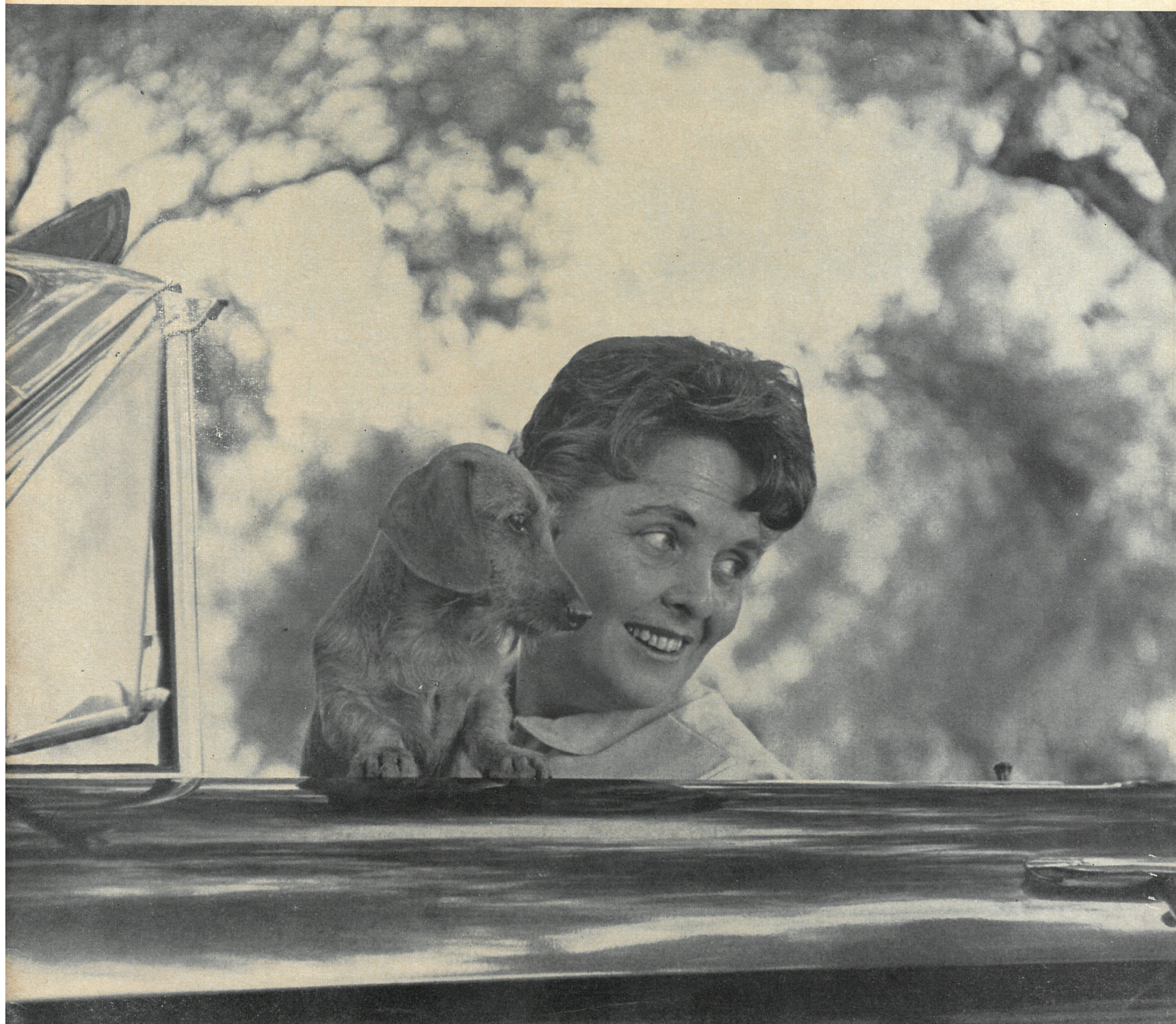

... SAMOYEDS ...

A delightful letter has come from Larry and Nira Volz of Campbell, Calif., who own a Sammy bitch named "Nira's Blizzard O'Zena." Through the assistance of Mrs. Leona Powell of San Rafael, she was bought from the Allens in Murphy, Calif. Although bought as a pet, with Mrs. Volz hoping to show her in Obedience classes, the plan now is to have Leona help in training "Blizzard" for conformation classes as well.

Mr. and Mrs. Volz desire information as to how "show points work" and "what all these 26 different initials in show reports stand for."

Perhaps we shall be able to help Mr. and Mrs. Volz and other amateurs in the show ring by giving the following. The classes for Samoyeds in any regular American Kennel Club show in which dogs and bitches may be entered are as follows:

Puppy Dog—6 to 9 months, Puppy Dog—9 to 12 months, Novice Dog, Bred by Exhibitor Dog, American Bred Dog, Open Dog; each class may have wins in first, second, third and fourth place, Winner's Dog, Reserve Winner.

Each FIRST place winner in each class competes in the Winner's Dog class; the one going best becomes the winner of the points toward his possible championship. He may win from one to five points at a show according to the number of dogs entered.

The second place winner in the Winner's Class is known as the Reserve Winner—he receives no points.

Duplicates of the above classes are also held for bitches—with the bitch taking First place in the Winner's Bitches' class taking the points as Winner's Bitch and the second place winner as the Reserve Winner's Bitch.

The next is for Best of Winners in which the Winner's Dog and Winner's Bitch compete

for B.W. (Best of Winners). The B.W. then comes up for competition in the Specials class—comprised of Champions, both dogs and bitches. The Winner in this group (either dog or bitch) becomes Best of Breed (B.B.) at that show—with the best of the opposite sex going Best Opposite Sex (B.O.S.).

A dog or bitch becomes a Champion when it has won 15 points, of which two shows must have produced major wins of at least three points each. A dog or bitch may go on and on from show to show, picking up wins at each show, but two of the shows must produce three point majors before the dog becomes a champion.

This possibly sounds all confused but through attendance at a show or two it is easy to comprehend the judging procedure.

In reporting shows for our WKW readers, only the major wins may be given due to lack of column space. For instance:

The Santa Clara Valley Kennel Club show held February 21 at this Fairgrounds had an entry of 27 Samoyeds for Judge Mr. George Schroth—10 dogs, 14 bitches in the classes, and three in Specials only. W.D., B.W. and on to Best of Breed was Mr. and Mrs. Wilbur Miller's Snokandi's Tybo of Drayalene (Ch. Prince Tyson of Snow Ridge ex Ch. Patrice of Snow Ridge.) This was a five point major for "Tybo."

W.B. and Best Opposite was Silver Snokandi, also owned by the Millers of Union City, Calif. R.W.D., Margaret and Bernard Kyling's Prince Alba of Snowland (by King Lief of Calsand ex Madorita Nakshatra. R.W.B. was Kenneth O'Brien's Kobe Verene of Encino (by Ch. Kobe's Komak ex Kobe's Silver Floss of Encino).

Congratulations to the Millers whose Snokandi's Tybo of Drayalene has now completed

his championship at two years of age. His breeders—the late Helen and Layard Spathold.

"Newcomers" to our area are Captain and Mrs. L. R. Barr of Beale Air Force Base, Calif., who have owned a Samoyed for just about a year and a half, by the name of Cotton. She was bought from Mrs. Elta Lane of Fairbanks, Alaska, where they entered her in her first show May 1964. "It was a tremendous thrill," writes Mrs. Barr—"I had never even been to a show before, but Cotton performed beautifully and went from puppy class to Best of Breed, and then on to fourth in the Working Group.

"Later we showed her in Southern California where she placed second at San Fernando, where we were told her dew-claws should be removed. When she was shown later at Riverside, although her legs were not quite healed, she took first in her class and Reserve Winner's Bitch.

It is no wonder that Mrs. Barr writes—"We are very proud of Cotton and feel that we are ready to breed her. She is a marvelous companion to our three small children. Everyone here seems to fall in love with her. She is a regular 'Lassie' when it comes to performing good deeds. A couple of weeks ago she drove a herd of cattle back to pasture. The fence was down and they had strayed near housing. She had never been trained for this. "(Sams ARE natural reindeer herding dogs in their far north homelands).

"Cotton guards children from the streets and stray dogs—she's quite a girl!"

Cotton is by Salcha Storm out of Lady Belle of Chema, with Mist of Cedarwood, Ch. Frost King II, Ch. Tod Acres Tanga, Irish and Amer. Ch. Snowland Stara, Ch. Snomish of Ocean-side, Ch. Nadya of Snowland, and Ch. Sprint of the Arctic being most prominent in her background. These dogs are in her line breeding. She has 48 champions within the six generations, many of them of English lines. "We hope to find a mate for her with the Ch. Frost King II or Ch. Tod Acres Tanga background, as there is a strong in-breeding on Salcha's side—through Mist of Cedarwood. Her full name is Salcha's Cotton Ball—she is 22 inches tall and at present weighs 50 pounds. She ordinarily carries a heavy coat, but at present has dropped it, preventing her appearance at Santa Clara show by choice of her owners.

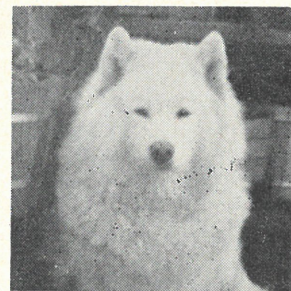

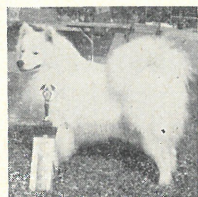
