It is with a great deal of happiness that I tell our readers of WKW, that our National President of the Samoyed Club of America, Mr. Wayne Gillette of Indianapolis, Ind., is recovering nicely from the terrible highway accident that took the lives of two of his dearest friends, and caused serious injury to two others early in August. Miraculously, Mr. Gillette was not too seriously injured—that is, physically.

In a recent communication from the National Secretary, SCA, Mrs. Evelyn Anderson of Melrose Park, Illinois—we are advised that the Nominating Committee for the 1960 National Election of officers will consist of Miss T. Goodrich, chairman and the entire 1958 Board of Governors. The 1960 Annual meeting of the Samoyed Club of America will be held between February 10th and 20th—the exact date and location will be announced later.

The letterhead for the National Stationery will carry the picture of the late famous Ch. Prince Kofski. This will serve not only as a tribute to a truly great dog in Samoyed history, but also, as a tribute to our late National President, Mr. S. K. (Polly) Ruick of Indianapolis—who gave so many years of his time to the betterment of the breed and our club. It will also serve as an honor to our beloved Berta (Peggy) Ruick—now an Honorary Life member. (Personally, I shall be eternally grateful to Mr. and Mrs. Ruick for their wonderful sponsorship through ads, etc., of our Sammy news section of the Western Kennel World.—vl)

In the President's message, Mr. Gillette wrote: "I am greatly enjoying the privilege of serving the Samoyed Club of America in the capacity of president. It is indeed a pleasure to become better acquainted, thru correspondence with so many members of our wonderful organization. I have purposely postponed this message until such time as I had something definite to report. I regret to announce the resignation of our Publicity Director, Mel Fishback, because of an overload of outside commitments. Mel has done a very conscientious competent job during her term of office and we are sorry that circumstances beyond her control necessitate the resignation. We will miss her. However, no cloud is so black but that it has a silver lining and I am happy to announce the appointment of Mrs. Robert H. Ward to serve in Mel's place as National Publicity Director. I first met "Dolly" almost 20 years ago—she is qualified in every respect, and I know she will receive the cooperation from everyone that is so necessary to the successful operation of this important office. It is a pleasure to welcome Dolly to office." (That goes for us, too, Dolly.—vl)

Another item from President Gillette's message reads: "It is little known to the majority of members, but we do have and have had for a number of years, a National Parliamentarian for the Samoyed Club of America—Mrs. William C. Bridges. She is the sister of one of the authors of our Constitution—the late Catherine Quereaux—and is also the National Parliamentarian for the Associated Garden Clubs of America. Mrs. Bridges is a consultant of Mrs. Whiting (who collaborated with Mrs. Roberts in writing "Robert's Rules of Order"). Her counsel was sought and her opinions were heeded in regards to the proper procedure to follow in the matter of the appeal—as reported in the minutes of the meeting."

In closing, Mr. Gillette submits the following: "I have only one suggestion to offer at this time. Our National Treasury is in good condition and I understand that some of the Divisions are not so fortunate. I intend to submit for discussion to the Board of Governors prior to the next meeting, the possibility of the National Board again financing publishing and distributing our National Bulletin. This would

It was her first show since March when she pushed Roxanne for Best of Breed. Mr. Schneider adds: "Lucy is feeding our bunch just now—each gets its individual feeding pan—and they are just biding their time, lying around until the pans are set down for them. There are 14 here in the kitchen—It's 20 by 20 feet—so big enough for all."

There's an air of expectancy hanging over "Billy" Tucker's kennels in North Hollywood—it will be the first litter bred there since January. When the pups come they should be really nice and entirely free of any taint of displasia, for Kobe's Komak of Encino, better known as "Koko," is the sire, and White Way's Silver Bunny, their dam. "Bunny" has been shown just five times, always in stiff competition—she has two Reserves and 12 championship points—including two five-point majors. In fact Bunny, bred at Mason's White Way Kennels, took five points for Winners Bitch at the Pacific Coast National Specialty show held in February with Mr. Major Godsol judging. (If I remember correctly, she was handled by Mrs. Wayne Denzler at the time, as Mrs. Tucker felt it best to stay home with the young January puppies.

Koko has been shown four times and has five points including a major. He is a son of Mrs. Tucker's Rogue (Winter Trail's Rogue) out of her imported Alaskan Queen of Kobe. Bunny is sired by Ch. White Way's Silver Streak out of White Way's Starctic Jill, bred by Mrs. Agnes Mason of Sacramento.

Mrs. Tucker says she recently had a nice visit with Mrs. Marie Gillette and Virginia Belikoff of the mid-west division. Peggy Gillette is in Santa Monica to teach school this year—and her mother had come out to help her get settled. Mr. and Mrs. Belikoff visited their married daughter, Shirley, who is also a teacher, so it was a great opportunity for good Sammy folks for pleasant "get-togethers."

Shona, pictured in our July issue of Western Kennel World, is the 3½ year old daughter of Ch. Kobe-Sur-Raff of Encino out of the late White Jade, sister to Ch. Rainier, Belenki and Mrs. Rowe's Taiga Queen.

Yes, folks, we wish to advise that all of that litter of pups sired by Ch. Silver Streak of White Way out of Ch. White Way's Sicero's Buttons, were sold by Mrs. Agnes Mason, their breeder-owner, many months ago. Mrs. Mason says that this litter sold faster than any previous litter. In fact, four were sold in Sacramento with no ad appearing in the daily paper. The picture shown in Mrs. Mason's new ad was a snapshot taken by Ed Adams a couple of years ago, is of White Ways Sassy Fras, as a young bitch not yet in full coat. Sassy Fras is by Ch. Silver Streak of White Way out of Ch. Star-chak's Warnistura. She is the bitch that went Winners Bitch with two points at the recent Salinas show under Judge Charles Swartz. I was privileged to see this young lady on that pleasant visit from Mrs. Mason and Billy Tucker following the show.

Incidentally, Mrs. Mason is one of those who expressed interest in the pictures of Jason and Ch. Tobolsk shown in our Pacific Coast Story started in the September issue of WKW. I was delightfully interested in the many pictures shown in an article called "Snow Dogs Move to the Desert"—which appeared in the May issue of the Arizona Days and Ways magazine—article loaned by Mrs. Mason. One picture titled "Mama and Papa Samoyed and nine little puppies." Lining them up for the photographer (Al Ruland) takes several pairs of hands. Attempting the job were the two youngsters of

Mr. and Mrs. Philip Gaudet of Phoenix, Arizona—ten-year-old Mary Beth and 14-year-old Philip Jr. Gaudet—and ten-year-old Penny Ruland. The final results, Papa Sam has his back to the line of pups, while Mama Sam looks over the line from the other end, in a very quizzical manner. Another picture shows seven of the pups in a wagon being pulled by their papa-Sam Alexis. The item reads in part—"Gaudet (Philip J.) of Phoenix, received his first Samoyed, Duchess Nicolette, from his brother in Massachusetts three years ago. Alexis was sent to him last fall. "At first apprehension about the dog's ability to adapt to the desert climate (where the temperatures are read on the plus rather than the minus scale of the thermometer)—Gaudet found that in summer they shed their woolly undercoat and the long hair protects them from the sun. Also, absence of a "doggy" smell and their naturally clean habits, make them easy keepers. "Although very stout and strong, the Samoyed is not a large dog. The male may measure up to two feet high and weigh in at 60 pounds (our Standard says maximum 23½ and maximum weight 67 pounds). The female will usually average about 2 inches shorter and 10 pounds lighter. "One of the most unusual features of the breed is the slight amount of food required to keep them in top condition. They will average only a little over a pound of food per day—or about the same quantity consumed by a fox terrier." (Even a pound of food is often too much for them at a meal).

"Another inviting and surprising feature of the Samoyed is that it does not require a great deal of exercise to stay in condition. Generations of privation and hard work somehow make it possible for the dog to stay in shape with little more than a daily walk at the end of a leash. It's a long way from the snows of Siberia to the deserts of Arizona, but like many a world

Stormy is one of White Fir's five California-bred Sams. She is out of Spathold's Ch. Silver Crest's Sikandi, and sired by Mrs. Gertrude Adams' Ch. Suzanne's Petrof Suraine.

Some of the show placements are as follows—August 23 at Bellingham, Wash., under Mr. Alva Rosenberg, Stormy was Winners Bitch, three points, and Best of Breed. Best Opposite Sex at the same show was Zaysan of Krisland.

Sept. 4 at Redding, Calif., Mr. R. A. Cross, judging, gave Stormy another Winners Bitch point and Best of Breed, with Mr. and Mrs. B. P. Dawes' Meteor of Lucky Dee going Best Opposite.

Sept. 5 at Klamath Falls, Oregon, Sams were judged by Mrs. Frances Holland. Best of Breed was Percy Matheron and Jean Blank's Ch. Yurok of Whitecliff—with Best Opposite and Winners Bitch going to Miss Polar Storm. Sept. 6 at Medford, Ore., Mrs. L. Zingler gave Best of Breed to Miss Polar Storm and Best Opposite to Dawes' Meteor of Lucky Dee.

Sept. 7 at Eugene, Ore., Mr. Robert Waters judged, with Best of Breed going to Ch. Yurok of Whitecliff and Best Opposite to Miss Polar Storm of Drayalene. Congratulations to White Fir for the fine showing and seven points won by this young bitch—and to Helen Spathold, her breeder.

More About Sammy Wool

Samoyed wool in its many uses is part of an art exhibit held by Civilian members of the

Corps of Army Engineers in San Francisco. Ina Lawrence, a member of the group and employee of the Corps has the Sam exhibit which is drawing much favorable attention. All the knitted articles shown were made by her several years ago with the exception of the lovely "Ski" socks made and sent to me by Mrs. Helen Harris, for many years owner-breeder and importer of many fine Sams at Snowland Kennels in Merion, Pa.

Also in the exhibit is a long sleeved coat-style sweater, a purse, and two blue caps which I had tinted in ordinary Rit dye. These caps are so intriguing in their soft fur-looking texture, that Ina has been asked to make others for purchase by several of the office group—however, lack of time and not enough wool, makes this an impossibility at present. Among items in the exhibit is a ball of spun wool ready for immediate use—a large hank of wool ready to be wound into a ball for use—and several small squares of woven yardage. There are also photographs of the exhibit held in Berkeley some ten or more years ago—also of one held at the White House of San Francisco by members of the Bay Region Samoyed Club members. Also in the exhibit is a sheet of letter paper bearing the pen and ink drawing by Margaret Chapman of our late beloved Lensen's Snow Chief. Oh yes, there is also a handful of clean raw wool groomed from my Crissy on one of her recent beauty treatments.

Altogether, the effort has drawn much favorable comment. Had the exhibit not been limited to members of the Engineer Corps office personnel—other Sam owners could have provided short coats—long coats, shoulder shrugs and scarves, mits, skirts, etc.

When we consider the interest shown, and folks' desire to purchase finished items—we wonder if the Samoyed couldn't be included in the many efforts toward Conservation of Natural Resources. In other words, folks, your Sam could be worth its weight in wool, along with all its other fine qualities.

A Page from the History of Our Pacific Coast Sams

We had planned to submit Chapter 2 in our Pacific Coast History—but ran across these items in our scrapbook—which I offer here.

I wonder how many of our Sammy readers of this column realize just which of our No. California shows has been the real booster of our breed, and has offered us the best opportunities during the past years. I ask you to read the truth here.

It was an Oakland Kennel Club summer show held at Neptune Beach (a summer playground) in Alameda, on September 8, 1935—the annual one-day out-of-doors show. There was an entry of seven glistening white Samoyeds, a delega-

tion from the south coming to share honors with the Northern California entries. There was Mrs. J. C. McDowell's Am. Ch. Snow Frost of the Arctic (Eng. Ch. Loga of the Arctic ex Ch. Zahrina); Snowdrifter (Ch. Snow Frost ex White Countess of the Arctic), and Yancey's Daughter (Eng. and Am. Ch. Tiger Boy of Norka ex Yancey); Mrs. Elsie Reynold's Elsie's Nikaloff (Nico of Creve ex White Countess) and a young bitch whose name I failed to learn.

Mrs. Bev. H. Jones brought her Kara Kol (Ch. Snow Frost of the Arctic ex Yancey's Daughter) from Fresno. The lone entry from the north was Mel Harris' Maelchek (Ch. Yorza ex Ch. Gorka's Sneg), from Mrs. Horace Mann's Kennels in Trenton, N.J.

It was after 5 o'clock with the sun dropping low in the west when these Sams went up for honors under Judge Julius Dupon. Of the four entered in the Amer. bred dogs class, Elsie's Nikaloff went first and Winners Dog, with Maelchek placing second and RW. Best Amer. bred bitch was Yancey's Daughter, who also was Best Opposite Sex. Elsie's Nikaloff went Best of Winners.

Best of Breed was Ch. Snow Frost of the Arctic, who was in his usual good form. But the win of which we were all very proud was made that day by Ch. Snow Frost who placed FIRST in the WORKING Group that evening. And that folks, is a matter of record—Ch. Snow Frost of the Arctic was the Pacific Coast's very first Sam to place First in the Working Group!

It was at the Spring Oakland Kennel Club show held at the Oakland Auditorium, May 24-25, 1941, that the Samoyed Club of the Pacific Coast turned out in full force for its very FIRST Samoyed Specialty show on the Pacific Coast. I quote from my story of that show—"Folks, it was great, it was thrilling, it was eye-arresting, it was tops! 'Scuse us please if we seem to rave, but remember, this was the first Specialty of which we had ever been conscious, and second, it involved our beloved Samoyeds, so with your kind permission, we'll continue.

Sponsored by the Samoyed Club of the Pacific Coast, with many kind suggestions and ideas from Mrs. Helen Harris and Mrs. Catharine Quereaux of the Sam Club of America, and Helen Rosemont 2nd, superintendent of the Oakland Kennel Club, it was under the direct chairmanship of Mrs. A. E. Mason, President of the Pacific Coast Group. The lovely bench arrangements, which won us the prize for best decorated bench, were created by Marcel and Madge Juilly of Mill Valley. Mel Harris of Oakland had charge of trophies for the show, and what a list was provided. Publicity for the papers was arranged for by Mrs. P. A. Stang with the help of members of the Club who submitted pictures and information for publication.

Plans for the success of the show had been formulating for months in advance—everyone owning a Sammy out here was contacted by Mrs. B. R. Dye of Lafayette, secretary of the Club with the result that 45 glistening white Sams were entered for competition under Judge H.

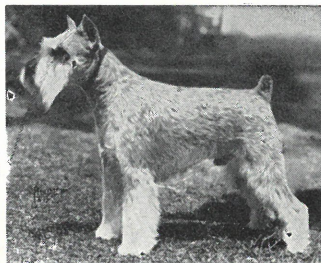

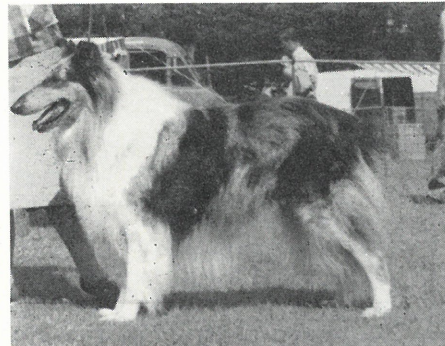

B. Kobler who had come out from Philadelphia, Pa., for the purpose. And was he delighted to see the task presented for him! Ask any judge who has been given a record entry and you will know the answer.

A word regarding the benching—45 dogs are a lot of dogs, so it was found necessary to make use of more space than had been allotted to us—as a consequence, a second benching across the aisle was arranged for us—and that particular section of the Oakland Auditorium was definitely for Sammies, their owners, their friends and visitors.

We were told by one visitor—"these dogs could put us humans to shame—here they are, nearly half a hundred, mostly strangers to each other—minding their own affairs, living in peace and nary a partition to separate them." It was truly beautiful to see the gorgeous white dogs lying out on the stretch of blue bench padding, against a background of midnight blue sky studded with miriads of silver stars. This same "sky-line" could be seen from any spot in the hall, and across its length stretched the glittering legend—"SAMOYED SPECIALTY SHOW."

by the Capitol Chevrolet Co. of Sacramento."

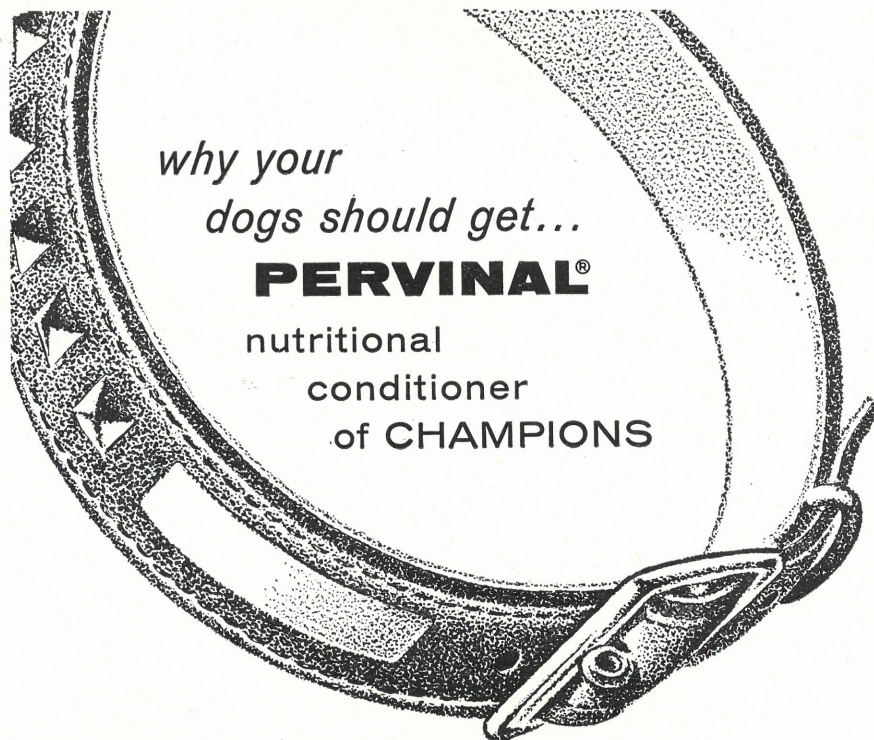

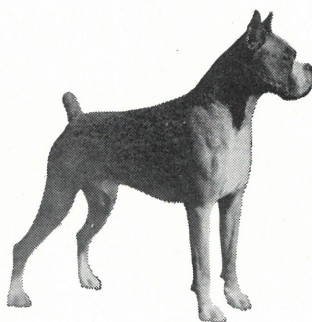
