"The Northern Division of P.D.C. has announced plans for a sponsored show in their area. The show selected by them is the Eden

Kennel Club Show, September 11th, to be held at the Alameda County Fairgrounds in Pleasanton, California. This is an unbenched show. Those wishing entry blanks may contact the show superintendent, Bernice Behrendt, 238 Fillmore Street, San Francisco, California.

"Mary Breatchel, who recently contacted the membership in an appeal for trophies, has done a great deal of work to make the show appealing to exhibitors. She tells us that there will be trophies to 4th place in the Open Dog and Open Bitch classes, trophies for first and second in all other classes. In addition, there will be trophies for winners bitch, best of winners, reserve dog and bitch, brood bitch and stud dog and of course Best of Breed. As we said above, the show is unbenched and will be held at the County Fairgrounds. The grounds are beautiful, with lawns for the rings and plenty of trees to provide shade. Mary says the rings are about the most spacious they have ever shown in. Sammies will be judged in the morning. The Northern Group is planning a picnic lunch immediately after the judging. The picnic area on the grounds will be reserved for the Sammy exhibitors. Exhibitors coming from a distance are invited to be luncheon guests of the Northern Group. Motels that accept dogs will be announced later.

"As you know, with California's raised point system it is very difficult to have a "major" show. We in the South have been more fortunate than the North as they have had only small shows recently. They will need all the support they can get to make the above show a success. We do hope many of our Southern members will attend this show and also hope that all the Northern members will make a sincere effort to attend so that all the work that has been done will have been worthwhile. At this writing, they expect the judge to be Derek Rayne, but this will be announced more definitely later.

"If any of you wish further information regarding this show, please write Mrs. Mary A. Breatchel, 21931 via Regina-Pierce Road, Saratoga, Calif., as Mary will be most happy to assist you if she can.

"Again we wish to remind you of the Samoyed National Specialty Souvenir Booklet now ready to print. It is true you have an October deadline to get your ads in, but there is so much work to do on the booklet and it is such a help to plan for the overall size of the booklet ahead of time, that we urge you to let us know about how much space you plan to take. The booklet will be like last year's in appearance, 6x9 on glossy paper. There is such an enormous amount of last minute work on a National Specialty that all your committees would like to have things in shape before the deadline. Your trophy chairman, Larry Soper, has not had nearly the response he should have for a National Specialty. 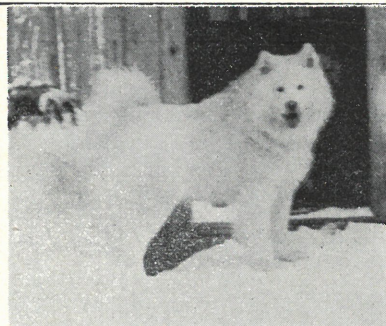

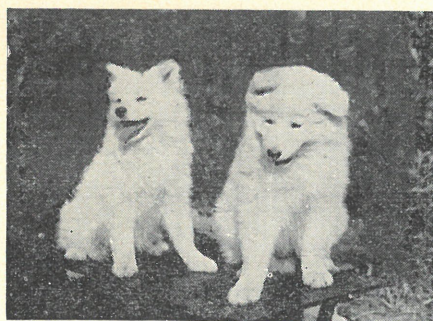
## HUGH ROY CULLEN

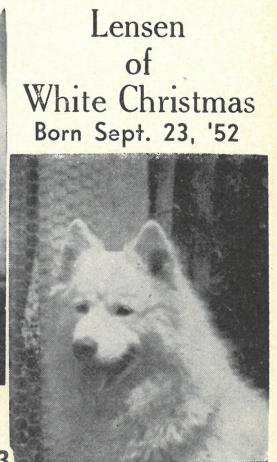

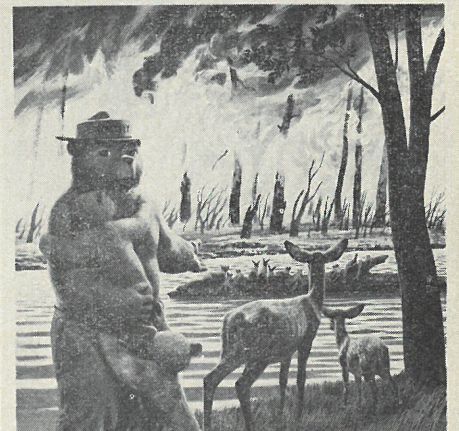
