SAMOYEDS

THE SAMOYED SPECIALTY SHOW CHICAGO, OCT. 19-20

The following report comes to us from Mrs. C. H. Quereaux, Chairman of Publicity for the Samoyed Club of America:

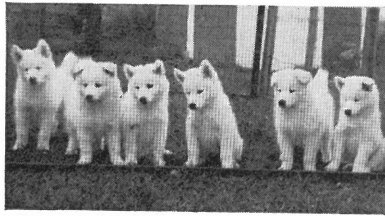
The Samoyed Specialty Show held by the Midwest Division of the Samoyed Club of America, in conjunction with the show of the International Kennel Club in Chicago on October 19-20, 1946, brought the largest entry of Samoyeds ever shown in America, and brought, for the first time, dogs from the Pacific Coast, Atlantic Coast, Canada and far south, in one show. Samoyeds were the second largest entry in the show, with Boxers first. Many exhibitors travelled by car from Los Angeles, Sacramento, Canada, Northport, Long Island; others came from New York and Albuquerque, New Mexico, by air. Many dogs came by air express.

Winners dog and Best of Breed was owned by Joseph Marshall of Palos Park, Illinois, and was Frolnick of Sammar, born October 9, 1945. He was sired by Ch. Yenesei Czar Nicholas II, owned by P. L. Bajus of Milwaukee, and his dam was Frola of Snowland, bred by Snowland Kennels, Merion, Penn. Frolnick was handled by Mrs. Marshall.

Reserve winners dog was owned by Roy Brott of South Euclid, Ohio, named Zoveek of Snowland, born Feb. 12, 1939, sired by the imported Ch. Sprint of the Arctic out of Ch. Nadya of Snowland, bred by Snowland Kennels.

Winners bitch, who finished her championship

this show, we believe, was Dushka of Altai, owned by Mr. and Mrs. Willard Todnem of Seattle, Washington. Dushka was born Nov. 21, 1944, by

Reserve winners bitch was Belita of Altai, owned by Mrs. Wayne Gillette of Indianapolis, Ind. She is litter sister to Dushka.

Best Brace in Show, owned by Mrs. A. E. Mason and Miss Aljean Mason of Sacramento, California, shown by Miss Aljean Mason.

The judge was Alva Rosenberg, the Samoyed people's favorite judge.

A banquet, attended by 87 Samoyed fanciers, was held October 19 in the Stockyard Inn. Invocation was by Father Wm. Fogarty of Goshen, N. Y. There were speeches by Joseph E. Marshall, committee chairman for the show; Colonel Ed-

ward Wentworth; William E. Ogilvie, secretary of the International Kennel Club, and by Fred Dunck, president of the Midwest Division of the Samoyed Club of America, and Mrs. Robert Ward of Los Angeles, president of the Pacific Coast Division. Father Fogarty represented the Eastern Division. The meeting was opened and introductions were made by Sampel K. Ruick of Indianapolis, national president. Every person present wore the green badge of the Samoyed Club. A great painted wooden structure 50 feet long showed a sledge team of Samoyeds with driver, and gave a short sketch of the background of the breed; a magnificently planned Specialty where everything went like clockwork.

The following story comes from Mrs. S. K. Ruick of Indianapolis, whose Sam did his part for the breed representing the Breezewood Kennels. Strog's story is called: "Strog of Altai Goes to the Specialty Show!"

When I heard my mistress Peggy and my master Polly talking about me, before we left home, was my face red! They said, "No, he's too big, we can't show him. He's a big horse." It hurt my feelings, for after all, it's something one can't help. My mistress isn't big, but she's darned plump, and I'll bet it makes her face red, too. Well, since my gal friend Tish was indisposed, if you know what I mean, and Novik and Kim had an accident with red clay or something, by elimination I was the only one left to represent us at Breezewood. So we picked up the Gillettes (Belita of Altai's master and mistress) and set forth for the show. Belita is my litter sister, and we get along quite well, so we



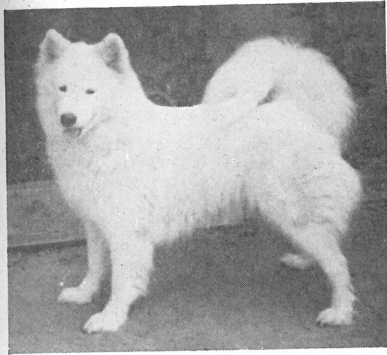
Mason's Samoyed Dog Team dining at Hotel Senator

had our bed in the back of the station wagon up high enough to see all the sights. About 50 miles from Chicago a truck ran into us in some smoke

from a train, and tore all our front fender and lights off. Jolted the very stuffing out of Belita and me, and tore Belita's mistress' nylons, and scratched her legs, and skinned my Peggy mistress' knuckles. But anyway, they said a bad beginning makes a pleasant ending. I'll tell you about that later.

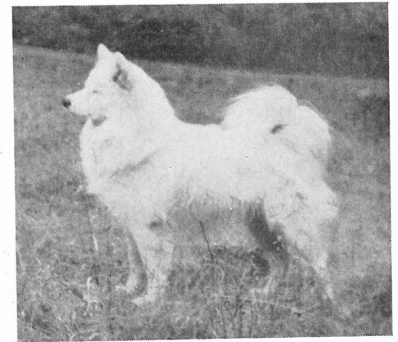
We arrived all in one piece, and went to the big Stock Yards Auditorium. (I learned all these names by keeping my ear cocked up, in the station wagon.) Now, I was so scared I started to shake, and my teeth just rattled. I am so big that when I shake you think it is an earthquake; but do you know, in about 15 minutes, when I got accustomed to all that horrible barking and confusion, I remembered what my mistress told me: "Now Strog, keep your tail up and look happy." I wasn't by a long shot, but I was terribly interested, and I de-

ecided that I would show her I could keep my tail up—and I did! We went a long way, and finally came to a great long bench (no boards or anything between me and my sister Belita), and white Sammies all cut out of white cardboard over each dog. The bench had a purple background and on the wall, up high, a beautiful picture they called a mural. It had almost a life-size painting of a white dog team and some snow mountains and a big sign telling all about the Samoyede. It was so life-like I started to bark at the dog team, but decided not to be so green.

They put me up on the bench, and chained me to a ring. I hated this, but decided to wait for developments. I met some neighbors. Of course, my sister Belita was alongside, and Ch. Valka and Blizzard of Star Dust were on the other side of Belita, and some perfectly gorgeous dogs on my other side were from California, and back of me were Ch. Chinde of Caspar with his owner Lois Rayner of California, and Ch. Starchak with Mrs. Ward from Los Angeles. And still further down was Snowland Stara. I never expected to meet so much "society," and I'll bet there were Junior League Debs and D.A.R.s, and everything all along. I met a lot of them, and always with my tail up, and my best manners. There were 77 in all. So that night, they told me, they had a swell party at the Stock Yards Inn—cocktails first, and a turkey dinner. (I got some of that.) Then they had speeches and my mistress presented every single dog with a pretty ribbon and rosette with his name on it, and also a picture on it of a beautiful Sam. They had talks from all the officers and distinguished guests, and I heard them say it was the finest banquet and the most fun they ever had.

They say they missed Vera Lawrence, who couldn't come, and they were going to ask her to make a little speech. Mrs. Quereaux, who also writes all about us Sammies, was there, and she made a little talk, and Dolly Ward, who is the cute little president of the Pacific Coast Division, made a speech and introduced the nice Mrs. Mason, who drove all the way from California with her three nice dogs, who, they said, enjoyed the trip. (Snow Cap, Nick of White Way and Toby of White Way.) I wish I could travel like

that some day. And then we had another guest, who was president of the Interstate, and he said a few words, and Mr. Fred Dunck, the president of

the Midwest, made a nice speech, and he sang songs with the orchestra, which played all through the dinner, and I thought his voice was swell. He sang "I'm Sorry Dear" and others I've heard my mistress Peggy play lots of times, although I usually howl when she plays 'em. And then they introduced everybody and everyone got acquainted.

That night my folks took me to the hotel and deliberately dunked me in a tub of suds. They said: "At least, Strog (my name is pronounced with a long O), you will be pure and clean." This hurt me again, by the way, because I did hold my tail up all day, no matter if it was an effort, and looked happy, even if it was painful.

My master Polly climbed in the tub with me, and they mauled and soaped and rinsed me until I had a notion to resent it, but decided all I wanted

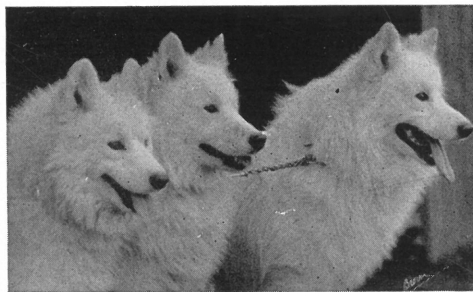

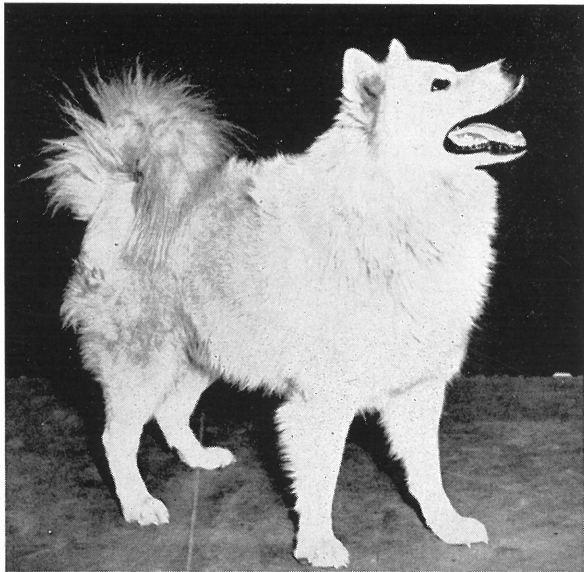
The next class, called limit, was won by Gene and Bob's Blizzard of Stardust, that C.D. dog. The

Then along came some swell gals, they called this the Open Class, and another of my sisters, Duschka, won that. She came from away out in Seattle. Then they paraded all the gals who had blue ribbons, together, and Duschka won Best Gal, and her sister, Belita of Altai, was what they called Reserve.

Then they brought out Dushka and that nice chap, Frolnick, and he was Best of Winners, and then all the Special Class came in and the chap Frolnick went Best of Breed. Don't you think I was smart to learn all these names in such short order? I did my best to remember. Oh yes, and the Masons' Brace won, and Mr. Roth's Ch. Kodru won Bred by Exhibitor Class, and Mrs. Davies' Nicholas won Best Veteran. There was one dog there, Ch. Czar Nicholas II, who had ten children in the show. Wasn't that sumpin'? And that big, good looking man they called Joe Marshall, who managed the whole show, was running around the whole time helping someone or attending to things, and answering questions, and I'll bet that night he was let down in his stifles, or down in the brisket, or whatever they get let down in. So it was all over but the shouting when Frolnick went first in the Working Group, which they tell me is a wonderful honor.

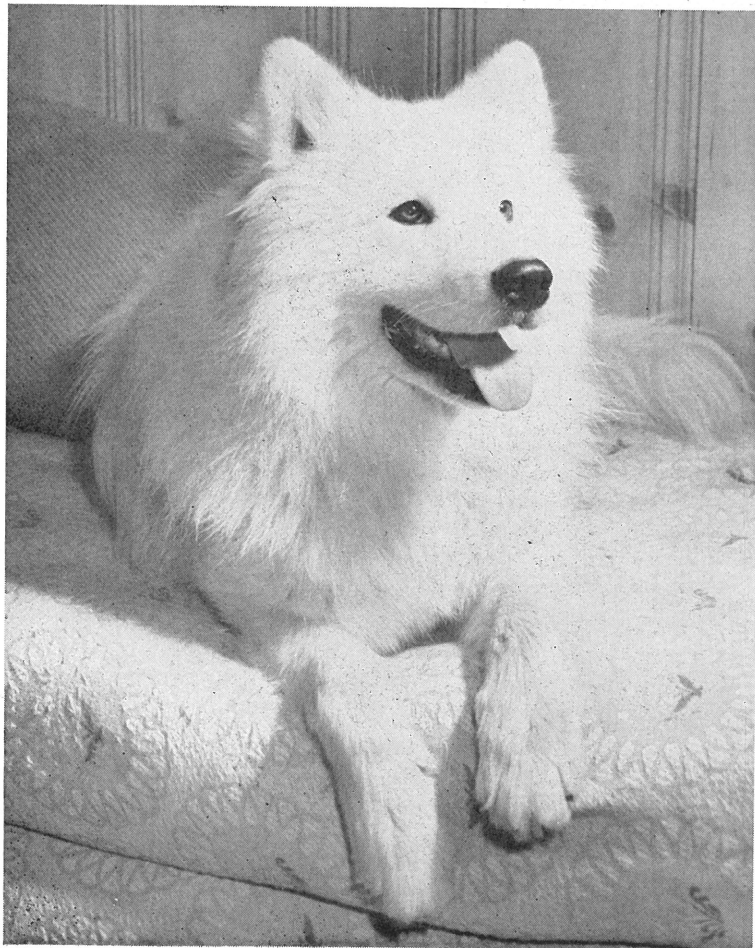

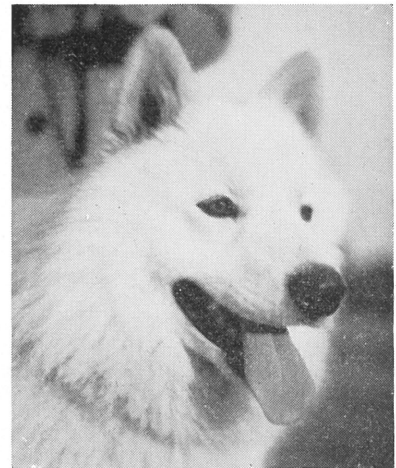

47 pounds. All honor to Jack Frost of Snow Shoe Hill!



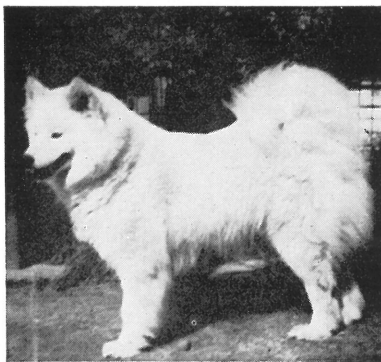
