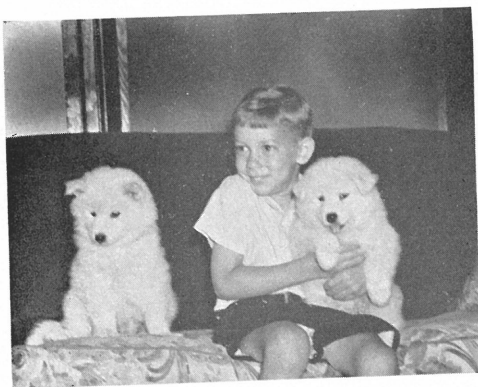

This, we believe brings Zita close to completing her championship.

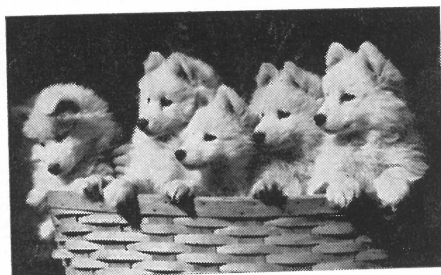

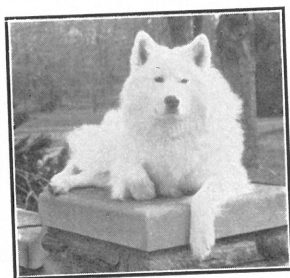


A BASKETFUL OF SAMOYEDE PUPPIES

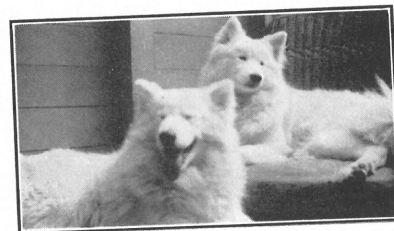

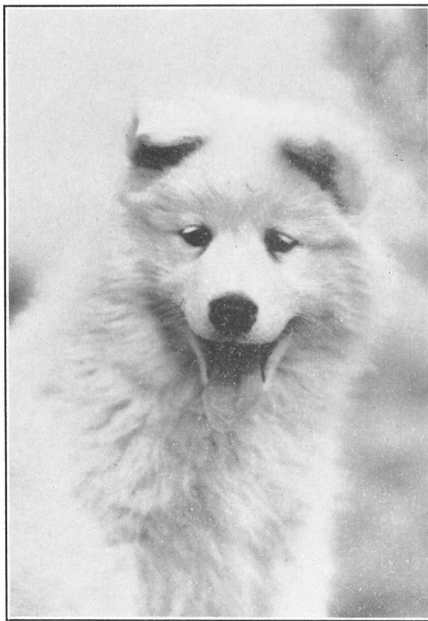

Upon our repeated request, Mrs. Harris has sent us the delightful article which follows, which she calls, "Intelligence of the Samoyede."

"A short time ago, I read an article by a man who had been making a round of visits to kennels of various breeds, looking for a puppy. He came home fed up and disillusioned, because, at every kennel, the owners had told him fantastic stories about the amazing intelligence and startling accomplishments of their dogs. He thought that they did this solely to promote a sale and that they must take him

for a moron to imagine that he could credit their tales.

I laughed gleefully as I read the article, for I knew this gentleman would have heard tales just as remarkable and just as hard to believe, if he had stopped in at Snowland—and all true! A dog owner just cannot resist telling about the exploits of his favorite breed. If he exaggerates a bit, it is just because he loves them so—like a fond mother telling everyone she meets of "little Johnnie's" latest accomplishments. If he had come to our place today, he would have heard Faith and I, and Ernest, the Kennelman telling a group of visitors all about the wonders performed by the Snowlanders—and yet there was not a puppy on the place for sale! But that did not deter us. Faith had to tell all about Kurgan, her pet with the human brain, who can play ping-pong with her and get the ball five times over the net without missing. I know it is hard to believe, but you can come to Snowland any time and see him do it. 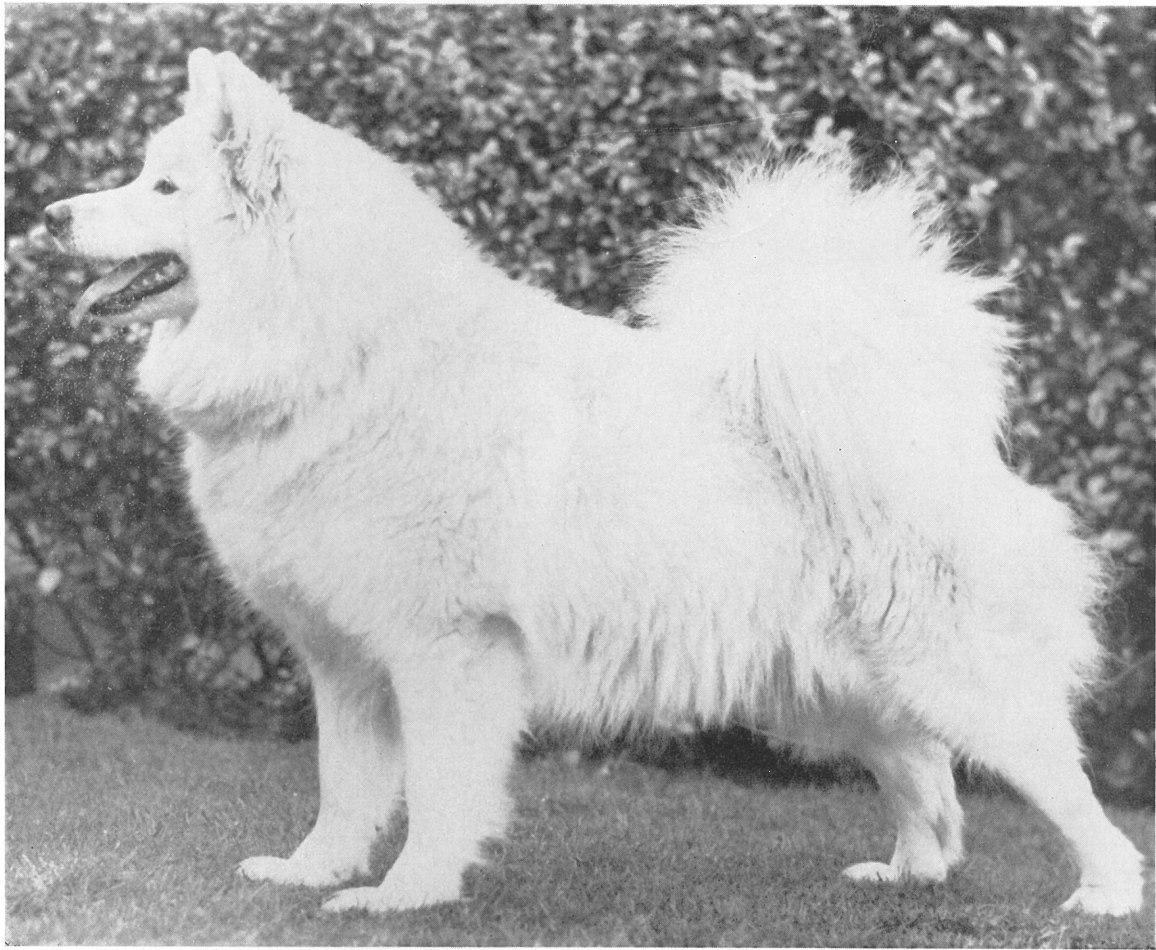

During the day it was announced over the loud speaker at least twice that the first annual specialty show would be held at 4 o'clock. There was a great deal of interest shown in the event, and even other judges tried to so arrange it to have ring-side seats—and two of them did!

At exactly 4:00 o'clock, Mr. Chamberlain entered the ring, and the judging commenced. Winners dog, went to J. T. Roth's typey Drujok—in the most beautiful coat and showing like a million. Winners bitch and best of winners went to the St. Aubin's Antarctic Zaza. Reserve winners dog was the Taylors' young Snow Clipper—reserve winners bitch was the MacBain's Suraka.

Then came best of breed, with four specials entered, the gorgeous Ch. Prince Kofski owned by Mrs. Berta M. Ruick, finally walked off with the best of breed trophy, a very popular decision. Later "Ski" in beautiful coat and condition placed fourth in the working variety group.

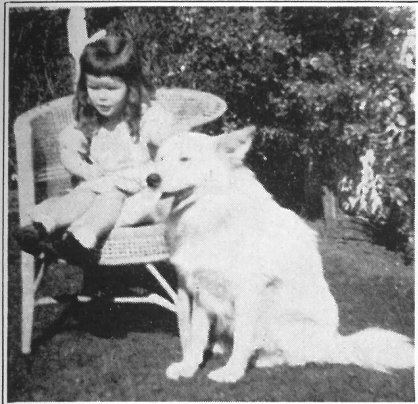

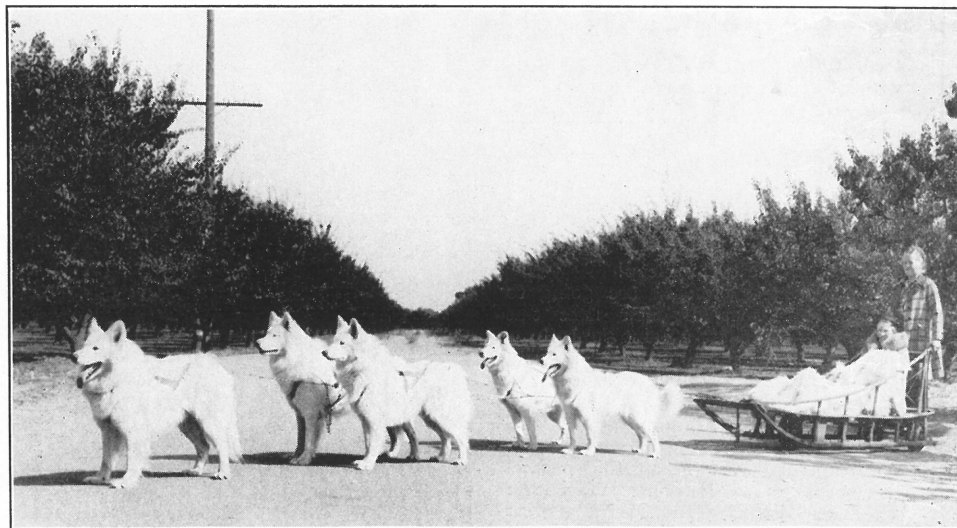

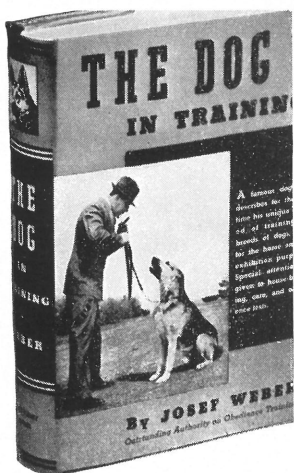
