Mr. and Mrs. Adams had been spending a few days with their daughter and family in Palo Alto, and it was indeed a treat that they could take a few hours to visit with us — the only drawback — time was all too short to get in all the picture viewing etc., that we would like to have done.

Later, on January 12, Ruth and Larry Soper came to see us from their home in Santa Clara. Larry is the President of our Pacific Coast Division S. C. A. They are owners of the Rulares Sams—they too have some early season puppies for sale—though I believe that the males have already been taken. The sire of the puppies is their "lead dog," Ch. Startinda's Chimen-Tagh.

The Afghan also has the ability to withstand any temperature—hot or cold. Summers in Afghanistan are terrifically hot, and winters are severely cold. The Afghan is not mature short of 2½ years, and he does not have his full growth of coat before he is 4 years old.

In Mohammedan countries horses and dogs are regarded as members of the family, and to sell them would be to sell a member of the family into slavery, against the tenets of the Mohammedan faith. Thus the dogs can be acquired only through gift or other less legitimate means. It is also for this reason that blooded Arabian horses are so difficult to obtain.

All Mohammedans believe that the Afghan was especially blessed by Mohammed to be the companion of mankind. One especially interesting fact in this regard is that the Afghans have no doggy odor, and that I can vouch for.

According to legend, it was the Princess Fatima, the daughter of Mohammed, who brought the first Arabian horse and Afghan hound into Afghanistan. The Saluki Hound is supposed to be from Arabia. The natives say it is just an
