SAMOYEDS

Samoyed owners were offered an excellent opportunity to publicize our breed recently when, prior to the San Mateo Kennel Club show August 1st, Mervin Rosenbaum of San Francisco requested our assistance in decorating one of the windows of the famous City of Paris in San Francisco. Mrs. Levant Brown of Ross, chairman of publicity for our Pacific Coast Division, took over the task of collecting items for exhibit. These she turned over to Mr. Unger, window decorator of the City of Paris, who chose and arranged the window in his usual excellent taste.

I stopped at the window early one morning on my way to my office and as I stood admiring the attraction before me—suddenly lights were turned on the exhibit, producing an interesting display. Directly in full view was Mrs. Brown's spinning wheel (upon which she is learning the art of spinning yarn from the combings of the coats of her two Sams). Against the spinning wheel was Mrs. Mason's lovely tailored coat, made of material woven by the Biltmore hand weavers of North Carolina. There were the ski socks made by Mrs. Helen Harris of Snowland Kennels, Pennsylvania, and two lovely beanies hand-dyed an exquisite shade of blue. Against the gorgeous scarlet background hung the two lovely sweaters of Sammy yarn made by Mrs. Ralph Rowe of San Rafael—one man's slipover sweater—the other a coat sweater. Ina Lawrence's sweater, purse and a newly made though unfinished beanie held a place of attention. Two small shelf cabinets held pictures and pictures of Sam puppies, youngsters with Sams, Sam models, exhibits of yarn spun in several ways, material woven into samples of cloth. A gorgeously beautiful trophy owned by Mr. and Mrs. Wm. P. Duhamel, won by their Ch. Shasta II; another trophy—the engraved memorial trophy donated by Mr. and Mrs. S. K. Ruick of Indianapolis in memory of their Ch. Prince Kofski—won by Mr. Duhamel for having shown his Sasha at more shows than any other Sam in the United States during 1947, were there.

There were pictures of Mrs. Mason's "paratrooper" Sams—and their trainer and sledge driver in the Idaho races—Lloyd Van Sickle, and pictures of the Sam exhibit at the White House taken by Dorothy Lineer last year. There too, was the two-page illustrated article, "The Dog With a Smile," written by Mrs. Edna Mae DeMarc for the June issue of the Extension Magazine—with several of the pictures taken for us by Dot Lineer. There were ribbons and

trophies galore, won by our Sams at shows, and in a prominent spot, a card giving a few of the qualities for which our Sammy breed

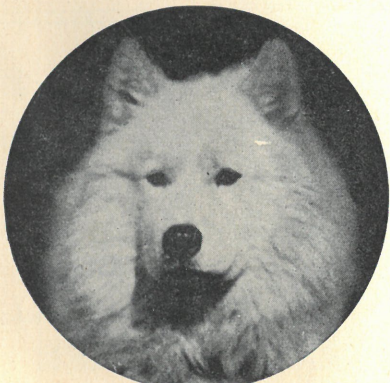

ment made up to the Sams for the poor benching last year by placing them out in the front row, center—overlooking the ring where they were judged. Both Mr. Halpin, who judged the breed, and Mrs. Sherman Hoyt, who judged the group, examined the dogs most carefully and took plenty of time to make decisions.

Mr. Matt Andrews of Lafayette, California, made himself known to us. He, his wife and baby have just arrived from Birmingham, England, to live in the States permanently. He is a member of the British Kennel Club, a former Sam owner and a judge of Sams in England. He has an album of Samoyed pictures of lovely dogs and of shows he has just judged.

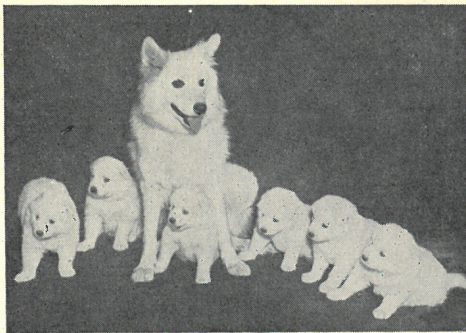

The picture that attracted the most interest was at the Sammy bench where Mrs. Rowe's Taiga Queen, Mrs. Cooper's Princess Tanya, Bori and the Coopers' lovely 20-month-old son were all together all day long. That adorable baby would totter up and down the bench, and then sit down with a thump on the nearest dog. They all adored the baby and if he walked on tails or stepped on necks, it made no difference with them. He would climb on Tanya and slide down, laughing with glee. The San Francisco Chronicle photographer took a picture of Kenny crying—one of the very, very few times he wept—and Tanya consoling him. You couldn't imagine better publicity for the gentleness of our Sams than this. It really was amazing, the beating those dogs took so joyously. Little Tai is so cunning with a baby—she and Bori had never seen the child before. It is amazing how they understand when to be careful!

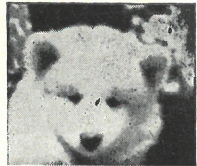
