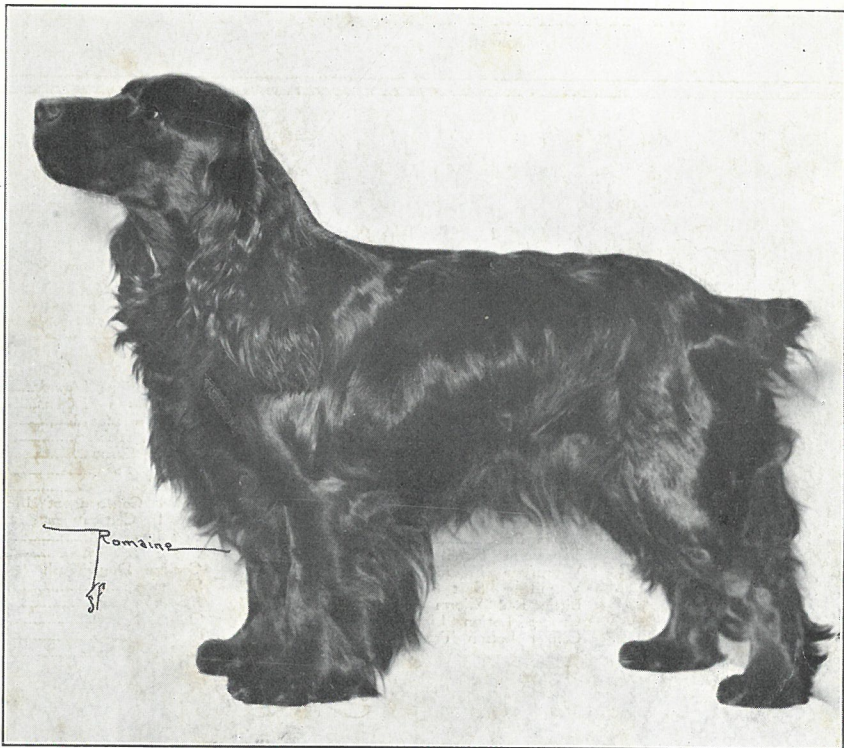

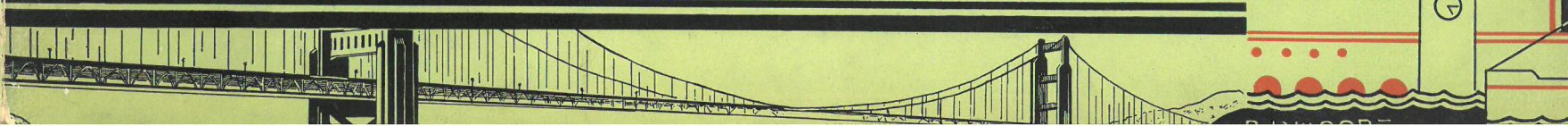

## SAMOYED NEWS

In our recent "Sammy" news, we spoke of Mr. and Mrs. Kelley's "Patsy," their young bitch by Ch. Snow Frost ex Patricia Obi. Have acquired further information regarding this promising young bitch, including her kennel name, "Lady of Tula." Patsy is a beautiful white with biscuit ears; stands 19 inches at shoulder and weighs 37 pounds. The Kelleys had planned to enter Patsy and Nico in the recent Los Angeles show, but Mr. Kelley was called away at the last moment, making it impossible to attend the show. Better luck next time, we hope.

Word comes to us of a particularly splendid and useful team of Samoyeds operating up in Jackson, Wyo. This team is owned and used by Mr. O. J. Murie of the U. S. biological survey. Mr. Murie is strong in his praise of the value of these dogs in his duties with the survey.

The writer is of the opinion that Samoyed news of the recent L. A. show was submitted by another party, so will omit any repetition.

## LOS ANGELES SHOW

(Mrs. J. C. McDowell)

And now for the Los Angeles Kennel Club show where the largest entry of Samoyedes were benched December 2 and 3. This was the McDowell's home show. Previous shows the McDowells have dispensed open handed hospitality to fellow Samoyede owners, and how easy it was to make a four-point show, and with Palm Springs just another few weeks off. Another four points and Golden Gate, followed by San Diego, we will soon be reading, "Championship Gained Between December 2, 1933, and January 27, 1934." You won't get another chance like this until the next Western Circuit in 1934-35.

Within a few feet of the public entrance to this vast auditorium eight beautifully-groomed Samoyedes were benched, backed against a solid background, offset with a touch of red, with name plates over each individual dog. The dogs won their share of admiration and attention of the show-going public. This time the public knew their dogs, for California people are "dog-wise."

First to greet me was "Barrie," a young puppy brought down from Fresno. His particular charge was "Baby Jack Jones," who was celebrating his eight-month birthday. Then there was "Taz," a litter brother of "Barrie" (sired by Ch. Snow Frost of the Arctic ex Yancey's Daughter). Both these dogs show the "Barin" breeding with the dense outer coat and a cast of biscuit. Still another puppy, "Elsie's Nickoloff," by Nico of Creve ex White Countess of the Arctic. "Nicky," as he is called, is going to be a very large one. He now stands 22 inches at the shoulder, weighs 54 pounds, and just past the year mark. His coat is almost entirely white, has very dark eyes, excellent

bone and splendid head. He gives one the impression of a suitable lead dog for the racing teams. All three pups were scared to death and showed timidly, but pups are allowed much latitude given their elders, but all three entrants look like good show dogs for the future. Yancey's Daughter (by Eng. and Am. Tiger Boy of Norka ex Yency) is a large bitch and has chalked up victories at other large shows. Drujoke of Haslemere (by Ch. Snow Frost of the Arctic ex Ch. Patricia Obi) is a well balanced dog; superb coat, splendid ring manners; will attract the eye of the judge in any show by his well-feathered legs and excellent feet. Here is another instance of where Tobolsk breeding is noticeable. Drujoke's win was a most popular one, and we know the Kerns will need no coaxing to be among the "regulars." Nico of Creve was benched in the best condition I have ever seen him. Nico is always popular. He has his honors, he has had his day and future losses will in no way detract from his laurels of the past. Nico has the true Samoyede expression and smile, which is lacking in many of our present-day dogs.

There is one thing very noticeable among the Samoyede fanciers. The spirit of sport prevailed. Everyone wanted the other fellow to win.

A most fitting climax to the closing day of the show was a lengthy visit to the Samoyede bench made by Mr. and Mrs. Elliott Roosevelt.
