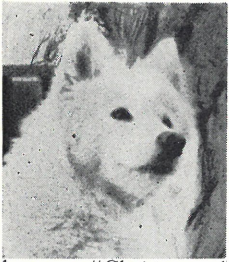

SAMOYEDS ON THE PACIFIC COAST

In this chapter, we give you for your records, the pedigree of the great Ch. Tobolsk, shown in the September WKW. It has been said that most sources of information, feel that Tobolsk's greatness has been attributed to his nearness to the main source of the breed—that being the great Antarctic Buck—and those other two greats, Musti and Russ. The pedigree follows. Tobolsk: born at Mrs. Kilbourn Scott's famous English Farningham Kennels, July 20, 1919. A son of Fang and Vilna. Fang, by Antarctic Buck and Kviklene—Vilna by Rostoff and Hecla. Kviklene by Nansen and Pearlene — with Nansen a son of Musti and Whitey Petchora. Pearlene by Russ and Kvik. Rostoff, sire of Vilna was by Southern Cross (a litter brother to Fang) out of Zemla, daughter of Nansen and Alix, she, a daughter of Jacko ex Pet—the latter by Nansen. Hecla, dam of Vilna was by Houdin out of Pearlene by Russ ex Kvik.

A letter to me from Mrs. Kilbourn Scott, written October 26, 1937, refers to Antarctic Buck, as the one to build up the breed in England, and so many of the famous dogs now in America have to thank Antarctic Buck for their size and perfect quality.

"Jacko," was bred by Major Frederick Jackson from two of his Expedition sledge dogs—Nimrod and Jenny—while on the famous Jackson-Harmsworth Expedition. When he returned to England, Major Jackson presented Jacko to Queen Alexandria of England. It was some time later that the Queen allowed Mrs. Kilbourn Scott to use Jacko at stud.

Jason, also shown in the September WKW, was imported by Miss Alma Bennett of San Francisco from Mrs. E. Brierley's Kennels at Rockdale, England, early in 1927. Jason, fondly called Boris, came to Miss Bennett by way of the Panama Canal. On the trip over, he occupied the Captain's cabin—and enjoyed the freedom of the ship's deck—beloved by all the crew.

When Miss Bennett had to part with him some four years later, because of illness, she was fortunate to sell him to Mr. and Mrs. Richard W. Strong of Berkeley, where he enjoyed many years of happy life—with a companion, Sonia of Laika, bought from the famous Laika Kennels of Mr. H. M. Pinkham of Ipswich, Mass.

(I shall never forget the day that Mr. and Mrs. Strong visited us in Berkeley, and our Nannuk made Mrs. Strong fall in love with

her so that if she couldn't have her, she must have one like her.)

Jason's pedigree will be of interest to many, especially to any of our folks who own sons or daughters, or grandchildren of the late well-known Ch. Jack Frost of Sacramento, who was owned by the E. L. McCleary's of Sacramento. Jack Frost was a son of Jason out of Mitzi Aura Laska, a daughter (1932) of Ch. Snow Frost of the Arctic ex Ch. Patricia Obi—but that comes later.

Born April 18, 1926, Jason was the son of Osten out of Snaresbrook Olga. Olga was by Zahra ex Snaresbrook Beauty. Beauty, by Fram ex Bloxam Roska, Zahra by South Pole ex Volchitza. Osten by Ch. Kieff ex Ivanoff—by Mezenit ex Aaren II. Kieff, by Viking and Princess Feodorovna.



Ch. Yuratado of Snow View Ray Bennett, owner

In this issue we present Ch. Yuratado of Snow View, the very first Samoyed champion on the Pacific Coast. He was owned and carried to his championship by Raymond Bennett, now of Antelope, California. Mr. Bennett, who was at that time living in southern California, travelled the length of California with his dogs. The picture of Yuratado was taken in 1927. He was sired by the imported Yurak's Trip of Farningham out of Yurak's Bjeliaska of Coronado, a daughter of Ch. Tobolsk out of the imported Yurak's Fox Laika.

Yuratado was first shown at Glendale, April, 1927—where he was entered in Novice from where he went on to place Best of Breed. From there he went to San Mateo where he took four points—following this with wins at Culver City, Santa Barbara, Santa Ana, three points—and Long Beach and another three points. Added to these was a two-point win at Los Angeles in November which completed his necessary points towards his championship.

Mr. Bennett's Zanato of the Snows, and his litter brother Tobozan of the Snows, born at Mr. Frank Vinton's Kennels in Ohio, Septem-

ber 25, 1925, and owned by Ray Bennett, were sired by Tobolsk out of Yurak's Zanada.

Our second picture this month is of Ch. Patricia Obi. I first saw Patricia Obi when Mrs. Imogene McDowell, her owner, brought her up to one of the Bay Region shows in 1931, at which time we had entered our "Lad"—Karan Sea—son of Mrs. McDowell's Nico of Creve out of Patricia Obi.

(Without reservations, Lad was superior to his somewhat smaller though typey sire—but this was Lad's first show—he was a youngster—we were show novices—and Lad was a handful—his chief ambition being to make friends with the judge—but there, we're ahead of our story.) So back to Patricia Obi, as we have said, she was born September 25, 1925, a daughter of Ch. Tobolsk out of Yurak's Zanada—bred by Frank Vinton of Youngstown, Ohio; bought by Mrs. McDowell early in 1926. Our records show that Patricia Obi lived to be over 16 years old.

In a letter written to me in 1931, Mrs. McDowell wrote—"I bought my first Sam in 1926, had planned to buy one in San Francisco from a doctor there—but before I could buy her, she came down with distemper, chorea, etc. Afterward found she was a litter sister to Patricia Obi. Nico of Creve, the first one came from Creve Couer Lake, Mo., followed by Patricia Obi. My first showing of a Sam was at Santa Barbara in 1927—then in the fall at Los Angeles, where "Pat" went from Novice to Best of Breed, and I decided then I was sold on Sams. I went through the usual distemper siege with both dogs. The first litter arrived to Pat, sired by Nico in September, 1928. Kurgan Obi, the outstanding pup of this first litter did some nice winning and won considerable favorable comment from judges and Easterners visiting here who knew the breed in the East. Shown

consistently, Pat and Nico won Best Working Brace at Long Beach K.C. show in 1930.

And now, may I offer the pedigree of Ch. Patricia Obi as it appears on the pedigree of her son, Karan Sea.

Sire, Ch. Tobolsk out of Yurak's Zanada. Tobolsk, by Ch. Fang ex Vilna; Fang by Antarctic Buck ex Kviklene; Vilna by Rustoff ex Hecla.

Dam of Patricia Obi: Yurak's Zanada by Polar Sea ex Ch. Olga of Farningham; Polar Sea by Danmolis ex Sasha; Olga of Farningham by Antarctic Bru ex Oka.

I remember Patricia Obi as a quite nice looking bitch of about medium size of those days—a nice quality white coat and if my memory serves me right, a bit of biscuit on her—but for sure, biscuit colored ears—which marking, so essential within a three or four generation pedi-

gree to prevent the unwanted albinism. This biscuit marking on ears, in a deeper shade, she passed on to Kurgan Obi and another litter son, Karan Sea, and he, our Lad passed it on to his daughter, Snow Sprite (out of Lassen Shalopie by Ch. Snow Frost ex Patricia Obi)—Sprite's ears were a very deep shade of Biscuit—not entirely desired—but she also had biscuit colored eyelashes and freckles on her nose, which gave her a really Sprite appearance.

As for Nico of Creve—he was a bit on the small side, but he accumulated 14 championship points during his show career. He was a pure white Sam with good black points and a very nice stance. He also carried a very friendly disposition. His pedigree reads: sire, Imported Nico of Farningham out of Semstra; the latter a daughter of Ch. Tobolsk out of Lady Olga. Nico of Farningham was by Antarctic Nico ex Kama. Kama by Polar Light ex

White Fang; White Fang by Kosko ex Sascha; Polar Light by Jacko ex Olgalene; Antarctic Nico by Russky ex Rhina; Rhina by Prince Zouroff ex Bucklene; Russky by Kaifas ex Rus-solene.

That's all for now folks—next month the Christmas Annual—and if your Sams are not a part of it, well, you've lost a big part of their Christmas birthright for them—for don't we know them as the "Dog of the Ages"—the Christmas dog, the dog with the smiling face and the friendliness of the Christmas spirit in their hearts? Well, here we are back again, and ready for all the shows that are coming into view this fall. The Cal-Oregon circuit attracted quite a lot of entrants from this area and although our records are not at all complete, we have a few wins to record here. Ch. Rosetown Bravado did a very excellent job, bringing back to Northern California no less than three BBs. He went BB at Redding, Klamath and Medford, where he also took first in the Working Group. Fay Owyong, his handler, laboring under a severe handicap of a badly bitten leg, suffered when he separated two "Attack" dogs who were mulling over a difference of opinion, then took him on the Canadian circuit and finished his championship there with flying colors in four shows with seventeen points. At Vancouver, B.C., on September 8, he took first in the Working Group, Vancouver, B.C., on September 9, second in Working Group, at Victoria, B.C., on September 11, first in Working Group and Victoria, B.C. on September 12, third in the Working Group. Congratulations to the now Amer. and Can. Ch. Rosetown Bravado. Nor-Lane's Perri, owned by Karlbergh's Kennels won his first point at Klamath where he went WD.

The second Annual Specialty was held on

September 20 at Menlo Park by the GSDFC and was a huge success. The spectacular intermission really drew applause from the crowd of spectators and a vote of thanks from all the owners of German Shepherd Dogs. The German Shepherd Dog Club of Sacramento Valley gave us an exhibition of Obedience, single and team work, Attack and Guard Work, which was a joy to behold. It was especially good that the spectators, some of them not yet dog owners, were shown that an "Attack or Guard Dog" properly trained, is as loving a companion to its master and family as any poich alive. As the finale, a gracious lady took her baby for a ride in the park, and when an over-ambitious intruder appeared on the scene, the "baby" leaped from the buggy to the rescue . . . from the sidelines I couldn't make out who the lady was . . . but he, I mean she, had beautiful knees! The bicycle thief, was effectively caught in the act, so effectively that he couldn't get off the bike . . . he caught his pant's leg in the spokes or something . . . which just goes to show how fast those dogs moved to the defense of their master's property.

In the conformation section of the show, Grimm Von Der Burg Kendenich went BB coming from the Open Dog class to WD, BW and then Best in Show. Art Strametz is the owner and handler of Grimm and this was his day, although we have to wait for confirmation, we were happy to see him make his championship.

Gernot Riedel's Heike Von Der Burg Kendenich went WB and BOS and his Briska Von Der Burg Kendenich went Reserve Bitch. Briska is the dam of both Heike and Grimm, so this was a terrific example of selective breeding.

The Reserve Dog was Kola Marc's Comanche owned by Bessie Stratton Neufeld of Los Angeles.—cdl
