REPORTS OF OFFICERS

PRESIDENT'S REPORT.

In making for the club a summary for the year, it seemed wise to give to those who had in charge especial branches of the club work, the privilege of reporting on their work; you have heard these reports, and Ebell is to be most sincerely congratulated upon this showing of prosperity and growth.

This closes our ninth year of club life, and we have surely justified our right to exist. We have met together with a desire to give to each other the best that is in us. We have each wished to make her will and desire subservient to the will of the whole, to come together in harmony and love, to discuss without acrimony, to learn with rejoicing, to work not only for the good of ourselves, but for the betterment of humanity. If we have done these things, surely it will be well with us now and in the future.

The Ebell Society was organized with a broad aim—"Advancement in all lines of general culture." Wide is our field of labor, and the laborers are many. Our interest divides into many lines. Official work, study sections, open entertainments, civic improvement and social intercourse.

The officers of this year entered upon their portion of the year's work and responsibility in a spirit of humility, and a desire to make their own, the club

motto, "I serve." Their reports show that they have served you well and faithfully, and to the president they have been a very present help in all times of doubt and perplexity.

The sections have been well attended and their curators gratified by the interest shown in the work and by the work itself.

The Music section has given you a concert, the French section will give you a play as evidence that they have not been idle. The Bible literature section has shown that members of all creeds and religions can meet together in tolerance and harmony, to study the greatest of all books. The Tourist section has so enjoyed its travels in spirit, that its members will probably be inspired to follow the example of our worthy treasurer, and seek a still broader field of culture in the countries of which they have studied.

The only criticism we can make of our sections is that they are too few in number and we would like to know that every member of Ebell was a member of at least one section.

Of the lectures on Current Events we can not speak too highly; they fill an evident want and are fully attended by most interested audiences.

The Program Committee in preparing the programs for the open Fourth Mondays, aimed to make them varied in character, representative of as many lines of thought and activity as possible.

We have had music, art, science, literature, the drama and philanthropic work, presented ably and in

most interesting form. We have listened to our own members, to those of other clubs, to distinguished citizens of our own and other cities. It has been a matter of great regret to the Executive Board and to the club members that we have heard so few of those distinguished visitors in our own club, but several causes prevented such enjoyment. The chief of which is, that Ebell being primarily a study club has for that reason its time occupied by its regular weekly or monthly work, which can not be easily put aside.

We stepped somewhat aside from our beaten paths this year in presenting to the public, under Ebell auspices, Dr Yamei Kin in her series of brilliant lectures and her charming symposium; these were a great success in every way; in intellectual enjoyment and financial returns.

One other line of new work has been undertaken by the club, a work which has taken a large part of our time and thought; a work which we hope to carry to a successful completion, and which, when done, we hope will be done for all time—this the building of a permanent club home. For this object the Ways and Means Committee, the Organization Committee and the members of the club have worked untiringly and have reported to you most gratifying progress, and we feel sure that another year must see us in our own home and we can say “well done.”

Our social life this year has been most enjoyable; our Charter Day reception, our Christmas children's party, our monthly teas, our after-meeting teas, and

our Federation reception have all given us the opportunity to meet and really know each other. Of these social events, our club luncheons will be the crowning event of the year; all these pleasures have been made possible to us through our good house committee and its efficient chairman.

The chairman of the Membership Committee has shown you how we have grown, seventy-seven new members and a total now of three hundred and eighty-seven; we are sorry we have had to accept any resignations, but those who have left us have left us in friendship and have gone to fulfill other and more pressing duties. A deeper note of sadness moves us when we think of those who have been called from us into the higher life. Of Mrs. Staples, who served us so faithfully, while she had charge of the office, of Miss Wisewell, who joined us when we first began to grow into a large club, and who gave and received so much while with us. We mourn for they are no longer with us to enter into our pleasant fellowship, but we rejoice also, for with them "It is well." But if sorrow has come to some of us, joy has come to others. Several of our members have this year received that blessing which is a well-spring of joy to the home—a little child; We rejoice with them. Some of our members have married and we enter into their happiness, glad that new homes are being built to strengthen the foundation of the nation.

We have been remembered, too, by both our travelers and our stay-at-homes. Two charming glimpses

of Japan, a beautiful copy of "The Hermes," of Praxiteles and a choice intaglio have been added to our possessions by their generosity. Since reading this report to the club, we have had the greatest social event of our club year, our annual luncheon. This was a most delightful and enjoyable feast of reason and flow of all good things. Our toast-mistress was mistress indeed of the occasion and announced the toasts in her own inimitable way, and the responses gave us a new knowledge of the talent in our midst, which only needs an occasion to develop.

This gives but a glimpse of our year's club life, but I hope it has served to remind you of what we have done and what we hope to do. I thank you all, officers and club members, for your sympathy, your thoughtful kindness, your hearty co-operation, and for myself I will promise to try, with your help to make our next year's work another step in advance.

SECRETARY'S REPORT.

This year may be considered a peculiar one in the history of the club. It took us some time to get adjusted to our new location; so strong are our local attachments, it was really months before we could feel at home in these pleasant, commodious quarters, and there were many longings for the cosy home of "Auld lang syne." Yet I believe few years have been more profitable.

A survey of the programs of the year would not be complete if I did not embody the report of the Ways and Means, and Building Committees. These earnest women who were present at each meeting and eloquently urged the club to realize the importance and necessity of decided action in this matter, who

The Ebell

Organized, 1894.

The Ebell of Los Angeles was organized in 1894, being one of several Chapters on the Pacific Coast which bears the name of the founder of these societies, Dr. Adrian Ebell. Dr. Ebell was a German scholar of note, who, realizing that women had limited opportunities for developing their minds along scientific lines, planned the line of club work which bears his name. While traveling in America in 1876, Dr. Ebell formed the first Chapter, the Oakland Ebell, the oldest club on the Coast. After the model of this finely organized mother club, the Ebell of Los Angeles was formed, consisting of a central organization with study sections.

Incorporated 1897.

Incorporated according to the Provision of Title 12, Part 4, Division First, of the Civil Code of the State of California.

Articles of Incorporation

Know all Men by these Presents, That we, the undersigned, a majority of whom are citizens of the State of California, have this day voluntarily associated ourselves together for the purpose of incorpor-

ating under the laws of the State of California an association, and in pursuance of said purpose we do hereby adopt these articles of incorporation, and

We do Hereby Certify:

First—That the name of this corporation shall be

“THE EBELL OF LOS ANGELES.”

Second—That the purposes for which it is formed are for advancement in all lines of general culture.

Third—That the place where the principal business of this corporation is to be transacted is in the City of Los Angeles, County of Los Angeles, State of California.

Fourth—That the term for which said incorporation is to exist is fifty (50) years from and after the date of its incorporation.

Fifth—That the number of Directors of said corporation shall be shown and that the names and residences of the Directors who are appointed for the first year and who are to act until their successors are elected and qualified, are as follows:

Sixth—That the said corporation has no capital stock.

Seventh—That pursuant to a call therefor, this association was organized at a meeting duly held at 1054 Flower street, in the City of Los Angeles, County of Los Angeles, State of California, on the twenty-sixth day of June, A. D. 1897; and it was then and there resolved to proceed to incorporate this said association; and an election was then and there duly held for the election of Directors of this said corporation; that a majority of the members of the said association were then and there present, and voted at the said election, which said election resulted in the choice of the above named Directors of the corporation; all of which is more particularly set forth in the certificate and verification by the officers conducting the said election, hereto annexed, and made a part and portion of these articles of incorporation.

By-Laws

ARTICLE I.

The incorporate name of this society shall be the Ebell of Los Angeles.

ARTICLE II.

The object of the society is advancement in all lines of general culture.

ARTICLE III.

The officers of this society shall be a President, three Vice-Presidents, a Corresponding Secretary, a Recording Secretary, a Treasurer, a General Curator and Librarian. These officers with its Board of seven Directors (one of whom shall be the President) shall constitute the Executive Committee.

ARTICLE IV.

Powers and Duties of Directors.

Section 1. The powers of this corporation, except as herein otherwise provided in the By-Laws, are vested in the Board of Directors.

Sec. 2. The Board of Directors shall consider and control all permanent matters, i. e., financial investments, disbursements and all established matters that pertain to the life, welfare and methods of the Society.

Sec. 3. The Directors shall appoint their own Secretary from their number.

Sec. 4. Resolutions passed by the Directors shall be handed in writing to the Executive Committee to be acted upon and entered on the minutes.

ARTICLE V.

Section 1. The Executive Committee shall arrange and control the current affairs of the Society, receive the reports of all committees and act upon them. The chairman shall report matters of general interest at the business meetings and at the annual meetings of the Society.

Sec. 2. The Executive Committee shall incur no indebtedness beyond the necessary current expenses of the Society.

Sec. 3. Five members shall constitute a quorum.

Sec. 4. Any vacancy occurring in the Executive Committee shall be filled by the Board of Directors.

Sec. 5. The Curators of the Sections shall constitute an Advisory Board to be called upon when required by the Executive Committee.

ARTICLE VI.

Duties of Officers.

Section 1. The President shall be chairman of the Board of Directors and of the Executive Committee; shall preside at all meetings, call all special meetings, appoint all committees, sign all bills authorized by the Executive Committee, and make an annual report.

All appointments of committees made by the Presi-

dent shall be subject to the ratification of the Executive Committee.

The President shall exercise supervision over all the affairs of the Society and shall be an honorary member of all committees. In the absence or disability of the President, her duties shall be assumed by the Vice-Presidents in the order of their rank. In the absence of the presiding officers, if a quorum is present, a temporary chairman may be appointed.

Sec. 2. The Corresponding Secretary shall be ex-officio chairman of the Printing Committee, and shall attend to the correspondence of the Society, and issue all notices except notices to proposed members. She shall see that each new member signs the By-Laws and shall keep a list of the Charter Members. (Amended April 7, 1902.)

Sec. 3. The recording Secretary shall keep the minutes of the meetings of the Society, and of the Executive Committee, furnish a report of the membership to the Corresponding Secretary when called upon, and shall submit a report at the annual meeting, sign all bills and corporation papers, shall call the roll of the entire membership at the beginning of the year, and of the members in good standing at the annual meeting. She shall hand to all committees their instructions in writing.

Sec. 4. The Treasurer shall have charge of all the funds of the Society; shall pay all bills audited by the Executive Committee; shall submit a report of all receipts and expenditures monthly to the Executive

Committee and annually to the Society and to the Board of Directors when called upon; shall send notices to proposed members and issue membership cards.

Sec. 5. The Curator and Librarian shall have charge of all the books and papers of the Society and keep an inventory of all the property belonging thereto, which inventory she shall deliver to her successor in office, requiring of such successor a receipt for the same. She shall keep posted upon the Bulletin Board in the rooms of the Society a statement of the time and place of all Section meetings, and any information which may be of general interest to the members of the Society. She shall ascertain which section a new member desires to enter. She shall receive application for the formation of new sections, and shall keep herself informed of the general character of the work of each section, reporting the same to the Executive Committee monthly, and make reports of the same at the annual meeting of the Society. She is also ex-officio chairman of Committee on Sections.

ARTICLE VII—(Amended April 7, 1902.)

Standing Committees.

Section 1. Chairmen of the Standing Committees shall be members of the Executive Committee:

The Standing Committees shall be:

1. Committee on Membership.
2. Committee on Printing.
3. Committee on Programs.

4. Committee on Sections. (Amended April 7, 1902.)

Sec. 2. The Committee on Membership, upon receiving the properly endorsed names of applicants for membership from the President, shall act upon the same and report at the next regular meeting of the Executive Committee.

Sec. 3. The Committee on Programs shall see that a program is provided for each regular meeting of the Society. (Amended April 7, 1902.)

Sec. 4. The Printing Committee shall attend to the publication of the annual report, the necessary printing of notices, membership cards, blanks, bulletins, etc.

Sec. 5. The Committee on Sections shall assist in the organization of Sections and advise the Curator of Sections in arranging their course of study.

Sec. 6. It shall be the duty of all committees to assist the Executive Committee. They shall meet on the first Monday of each month and shall report in writing to the Executive Committee. (Amended April 7, 1902.)

ARTICLE VIII.

Members.

Section 1. An applicant for membership shall sign blank provided. Her name shall be endorsed by three members in good standing. This application handed to the Chairman of the Executive Committee at any meeting shall pass to the Membership Committee. Upon receiving the endorsement of this committee, it

shall be voted upon by the Executive Committee at their next meeting.

The notice of acceptance shall be sent to the proposed member by the Treasurer, together with bill for admission fee and half yearly dues.

No member of the Society may sign more than five applications for membership during one year. (Amended June, 1903.)

Sec. 2. Members may be elected for one year who shall be known as complimentary members and who shall not be required to pay admission fees or dues, but who shall have no interest in the management, property or assets of the corporation.

Sec. 3. A non-resident may become an associate member for one year by having her name duly presented and upon the payment of five dollars, but she shall have no interest in the management, property or assets of the corporation.

Sec. 4. Election to membership shall be forfeited unless confirmed by the payment of the admission fee within one month after notification of election as a member. A lapsed or forfeited membership may be restored by the Executive Committee upon the unanimous vote of the Committee on Membership.

Sec. 5. Any member may resign at any time upon the presentation of such resignation in writing and the payment of all back dues.

Sec. 6. Each member of the Society must sign the By-Laws before she shall be entitled to any of the rights or privileges of membership.

Sec. 7. Honorary membership may be conferred at the discretion of the club. (Amended June, 1903.)

ARTICLE IX.

Dues.

Section 1. The admission fee shall be \$10.00.

Sec. 2. The annual dues shall be \$5.00, payable in advance, one-half on the first day of October, and one-half on the first day of March of each year. Non-payment of dues for one year shall cause forfeiture of membership, but such members may be restored upon regular application and payment of back dues, if such application is made within eighteen months of lapse of membership. (Amended April 7, 1902.)

Sec. 3. Any member paying \$100 shall receive a certificate of life membership and shall be exempt from payment of dues. (Amended June, 1903.)

Sec. 4. The Executive Committee shall have authority to remit the fees and dues of any member when it shall be deemed for the best interest of the Society.

ARTICLE X.

Section 1. Excepting during the months of July, August and September, a regular meeting of the Society shall take place on each Monday at 2:30 p. m., at which Sections may report, papers be presented or business be transacted.

Sec. 2. On the first Monday of each month shall be held a business and social meeting of the club for

members only, at which time the Executive Committee may report on business transacted and bring new business before the Society.

Sec. 3. A regular meeting of the Board of Directors shall take place on the Thursday preceding the first Monday at 9:30 a. m.

Sec. 4. A regular meeting of the Executive Committee shall take place on the Thursday preceding first Monday at 10:30 a. m., and on each Monday at 2 p. m.

Sec. 5. The annual business meeting of the Society shall take place on the first Monday in January.

Sec. 6. The annual meeting of the Society for the election of Directors and Officers for the ensuing year shall be held on the first Monday in April at 2:30 p. m. Elections shall take place by ballot, and those elected shall enter upon their duties at the close of the year.

Sec. 7. Two Directors, to hold office three years, shall be elected at each annual meeting. Officers shall be elected for one year. The President, by virtue of her office, is elected a director for one year. (Entire Article amended April 7, 1902.)

ARTICLE XI.

Section 1. The Society shall be divided into Departments for the study of special subjects or the carrying on of different branches of work. Such Departments to be Art, Science, Literature, Language and

such others as from time to time the Society may deem advisable. (Amended April 7, 1902.)

Rule 1. All members of Sections must be members of "The Ebel of Los Angeles."

Rule 2. Members wishing to form Sections must apply to the Executive Committee through the General Curator.

Rule 3. Curators shall preside at the meetings of their Sections and plan a course of study and make an annual report of the work of the previous year when called upon to do so by the Executive Committee. Section Curators shall notify the General Curator of the dates when their Sections are to meet and when they adjourn for vacation. A Curator may appoint a secretary to assist her in the Section.

Rule 4. Sections have no power to organize or disband, nor to dismiss or appoint Curators, but may express a preference to the Executive Committee.

Rule 5. Sections may limit their number and close admission, by showing ability to keep their number complete. New sections may then be formed based on the same line of work, bearing the same name and numbered according to order of formation, 1st, 2d, etc.

Rule 6. All members of Sections are required to perform their portion of work assigned by the Curators.

Rule 7. All Departments are open and free to all members of the Society. (Amended April 7, 1902.)

Rule 8. No Section or any officer thereof shall

have power to incur any indebtedness or liability binding upon the Society, but shall defray all its expenses not properly authorized in detail by the Executive Committee.

ARTICLE XII.

Section 1. Copies of all papers read before the Society and in Sections shall be placed on file with the Curators and at the end of one year shall be placed under care and charge of Librarian.

Sec. 2. All papers shall be written on legal cap, on one side of the paper only and fastened securely at the top.

(Former Article XIII repealed and subsequent Article renumbered, April 7, 1902.)

ARTICLE XIII.

All communications on business must be made in writing.

ARTICLE XIV.

Ten members in good and regular standing may in writing at any time request special action by the Executive Committee, which will include amendments, complaints concerning neglect of duty, or transcending of privilege by any officer or member, or concerning any other matter pertaining to the Society. The Executive Committee shall at once refer the Communication to the Board of Directors for immediate attention, after which it shall be referred

back to the Society for final vote. In the case of amendments to the By-Laws a two-thirds vote of the Society is required. (Amended June, 1903.)

ARTICLE XV.

All meetings of the Society and of the Executive Committee shall be governed by Roberts' Rules of Order.

ARTICLE XVI.

The twenty-seventh day of October of each year shall be known as "Charter Day," commemorating the organization of the Society. A reception shall be given on this day, when the President of the previous year shall present the members of the Society to the newly elected officers.

ARTICLE XVII.

Whereas, the provisions of these By-Laws require the signature of each member of the Ebell Society, we do hereby, in signing the same, pledge ourselves to abide by these laws and regulations.
