

## Leopards Trounce Visiting Eagles

Friday the 13th held no fear for the Leopards as they downed the Glenwood Eagles 18-6 in the first game of the season for both teams.

Glenwood kicked off to the Leopards to start the game. After several plays Louisville worked the ball down to the Eagle's 30-yard line. The Leopards then tried their first pass attempt which was intercepted. The ball switched hands several times before the quarter ended.

In the early minutes of the second period, Louisville took possession of the ball and slowly worked down to Glenwood's 14-yard line. Bill Keyser then scampered across the goal line for the Leopard's first touchdown. The attempted conversion was no good.

After the kickoff, the Eagles steadily worked the ball down to the LHS 12-yard line. In the late minutes of the quarter, Glenwood attempted a pass which was intercepted by Bill Keyser. Louisville then ran the clock out.

Louisville kicked off to start the third quarter. After three plays, the Eagles were forced to kick. David Miller downed the punt on the 30. Gradually the Leopards worked the ball to the Eagles 3-yard line. Butch Peer then raced across the goal for Louisville's second TD. The try for the extra point was no good.

Midway in the fourth period, Bill Keyser again crossed the goal line for the Leopard's last touchdown. Again Louisville failed in the try for the extra point. In the remaining minutes of the quarter Coach Morgan substituted quite frequently. With 30 seconds remaining, Glenwood completed a pass in the end zone for their lone touchdown. Their attempt for the extra point failed.

## Louisville Wins Over Leetonia

Despite the wet playing field Friday night the Leopards easily won over the Leetonia Bears by the score of 20-0. The win was the second for the Leopards against no defeats. The game also was Louisville's first Tri-County victory.

Louisville had the honor of kicking off to start the game. After several ground plays Leetonia completed a pass for 7 yards. The second pass attempt of the Bears was intercepted by Bill Keyser who was downed after a 10 yard run. This helped to set up the Leopards first touchdown as Keyser made it across the goal a few plays later. Shank's attempt for the extra point was good.

In the second quarter of play Keyser ran 30 yards before he was stopped by an opponent. A few plays later Keyser again crossed the goal for Louisville's second TD of the night. Shank's extra point try was good. This made the score Louisville 14; Leetonia 0. Louisville then kicked off to the Bears who were forced to punt after 3 plays. Gary Gladieux made good a 30 yard run before he was stopped by a Bear. The ball was resting on Leetonia's 5 yard line at halftime.

Leetonia opened up the third quarter by kicking off to Louisville. After 3 plays Louisville was forced to kick. The Bears attempted to pass which was again intercepted by Keyser. Louisville failing to pick up needed yardage, again punter and the ball came to rest on Leetonia's 10 yard line. Louisville recovered a Bear fumble but was unable to cross the line and Leetonia took over on their own 2 yard line. After a few 1 and 10 for the Bears, the quarter ended.

Leetonia was forced to punt early in the fourth quarter. Louisville gradually worked the ball down the field until finally Gladieux scampered into the end one for the Leopard's final tally. The try for the extra point was no good. Shank then kicked off to Leetonia who fumbled the ball. Louisville had possession of the ball only a short time as they also fumbled and Leetonia recovered, but after a few plays the game ended.

## Leopards Take Sandy In Preview Tilt

The Leopards won their first game of the '57 season as they defeated Sandy Valley 6-0. They performed before approximately 11,000 spectators at Massillon stadium on Sept. 7.

Louisville took possession of the ball on Sandy Valley's 28 yard line. After several plays, they worked the ball down to the 4-yard line. On the next play Dan Zoba scampered across the goal line for Louisville's lone touchdown of the 10 minute battle. Kuhn's attempted conversion was blocked.

Following the kickoff, the Leopards defense kept the Sandy Valley team from reaching mid-field. David Miller intercepted the opposing team's only pass but was downed before he could pick up any yardage. Bob Anania completed 2 of 3 passes. One was for 43 yards which helped lead the Leopards down to the S.V. 3-yard line where the game ended.

## Freshmen Begin Football Practice

This year the freshman football squad consists of 43 members from three schools — Louisville, St. Louis, and Washington Twp. There are 3 seventh graders, 10 eighth graders, and 30 freshmen. Mr. Andy Marko, coach of the team this year, says, "The little kids

have all the ambition and never miss practice, but the big boys who have the ability and could play the game, are hanging around the halls, missing practice and have a very poor attitude."

Coach Marko said that the freshmen could have a good team if more would come out. He also pointed out that it's not too late to try out.

The following week practice was held once a day, and a scrimmage was held with Salem on the local football field. The next week the reserves, consisting of sophomore and junior squad members, received a chance to prove their skill as they scrimmaged the Alliance reserves on the Leopard field.

By Sept. 7, the squad had been reduced to 50 members. Of these 50, only 30 boys dressed for the Massillon preview game.
