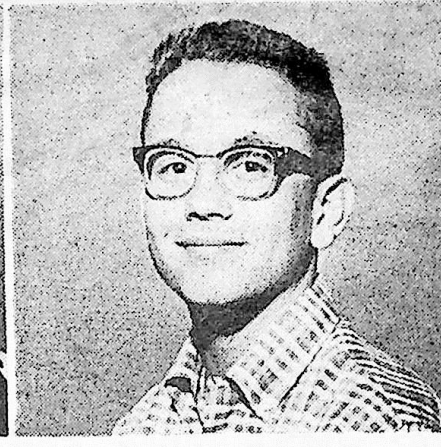


Sheila Robertson Selected Editor of Next Year's Mirror

A program is being planned for the near future which will feature talent from the speech department and the rest of the student body.

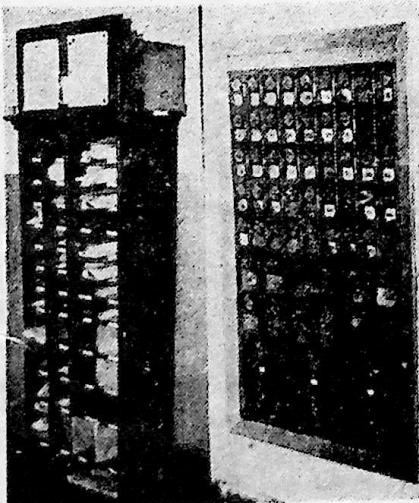
LHS Senior Choir Receives New Robes
