At the Louisville football games, club members are busy working at their money-earning projects. The colorful football programs, which give information about the schools and teams participating, are sold annually by the Tri-Hi-Y. The programs cost 15 cents and the proceeds each year go toward a worthy project chosen by the club. Last year the group sponsored an orphan in Korea.
