Dave's future plans include attending Malone College and becoming a physical education teacher here at Louisville. Dave also plans to marry when he's about 25 years old and start a family three years after that.

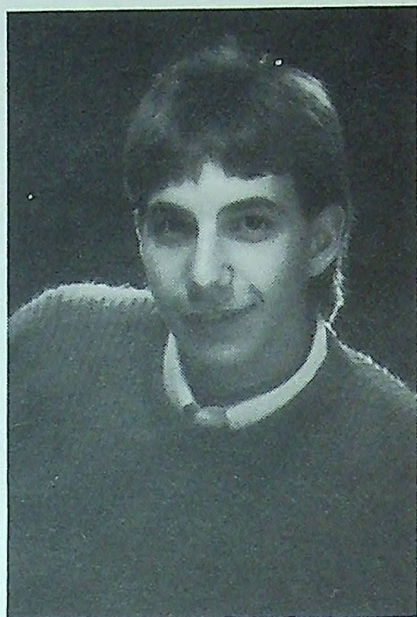

Mr. Reese, teacher of psychology, sociology, and economics here at LHS, is not just an avid Beatles' fan. He is also a former speech competitor and National Forensic League president in 1974-75.

When he participated in speech, Mr. Reese competed in boys' extemporaneous speaking, oratorical declamation, radio broadcasting, and original oratory. As Mr. Reese reminisces, he states that original oratory was his favorite category because writing your own speech forces you to organize your thoughts and also relate your ideas to other people. Of course, his original was based on a song by Cat Stevens called "Oh, Very Young."
