# Photographic Album

Album: Miss Lena T. Brooke.

Photographic album: A photographic album which belonged to Evelina "Lena" Tucker *Brooke* LUCAS. The album contains paper ephemera collected by Lena Brooke, Lena Brooke Lucas after her marriage to Daniel Bedinger Lucas in 1869, from the 1860s to the 1890s. Most of the collection relates to Daniel Bedinger Lucas and Virginia Lucas. Items relating to Lena Brooke consist of handwritten notes and letters from both relatives and friends expressing their regards to Lena. Among those letters is one written by her father, Henry Laurens Brooke, in reply to Daniel Bedinger Lucas' granting Lucas permission to marry his daughter Lena. There are also several handwritten poems in the album, some in the handwriting of Daniel Bedinger Lucas. The first of these is Lucas' poem *The Land where we were dreaming* (1865)<sup>2</sup> illustrated with cut out engravings of Confederate Generals Thomas Jonathan Jackson and Robert Edward Lee and CSA President Jefferson Davis. The collection also contains poems written by Virginia Lucas as well as two watercolors done by her.

years older than her youngest sibling, Laura Beverly Brooke. Evelina married Judge Daniel B. Lucas. For many years she was the gracious and hospitable hostess of Rion Hall. In most all records her given name is spelled Evelina, not Evalina, as is carved in stone.<sup>3</sup>

## Obituary:

Frederica Holmes Trapnell "Ricky" Of Wilmington, DE passed away July 13, 2004 after a brief illness.

She was born in Bluefield, WV July 6, 1909, the eldest of 4 daughters and a son born to the Rev. Richard W. Trapnell, II and his wife, Evelina Tucker Trapnell. The family moved to Wilmington and Ricky attended Misses Hebbs' School and Wilmington High School before graduating from Chatham Hall School in Chatham, VA. She graduated from Randolph Macon Women's College in Lynchburg, VA, and held a graduate degree from Columbia University School of Library Service.

She spent her working career at the DuPont Company as the head of the legal library, retiring in 1974. She was a lifetime member of the Virginia and the Jefferson County (WVA) Historical Societies.

Ricky is survived by 10 nieces and nephews; as well as 26 great nieces and great nephews, who will all remember her great wit and family storytelling.
