'Queen's Delight' pattern

This coverlet is a relatively early and rare find for the collection. I recall (?) that it was found at a Potter Auction in Napanee, in the mid 1980s. (While in Napanee visiting family. I had previously purchased the Samuel Fry coverlet in a similar pattern from Lincoln County Niagara. While located many-kilometers apart, they use an early pattern perhaps related to early Loyalist immigrants to both Niagara and Prince Edward Counties)

This coverlet is a simpler variation of Queen's Delight - variation in ROM #236 + #237. The pattern is refined and crisp with high contrast between the blue wool weft and the natural white cotton warp.


It has an unusual centre seam with a displacement seen on the reverse. This preserves the symmetry at the front. Was this a miscalculation by the weaver?


Condition: Very good - obvious age and use with little trypart.





Indigo blue wool on natural white cotton. In no. 236, the dark and light areas are broken by pairs of warp threads; here the use of single ends produces a more solid design. Patterns of this type appear to have been popular in Prince Edward County: more have been seen there than in any other part of Ontario. The design of the narrow border is unusual and interesting.
