





Dedication

Harrison R. Thyng was born in Laconia, N. H. on 12 April 1918. He was reared in Barnstead, graduated from Pittsfield High School in 1935 and the University of N. H. in 1939. Immediately after graduation, he enlisted in the Army Air Corps as a flying cadet and received his reserve commission and wings in March of 1940. With the entry of the United States into World War II, Lt. Thyng was assigned as Commanding Officer of the 309th Fighter Squadron and transferred to England.

He led his Squadron and subsequently his group, flying Spitfires, over Europe and Africa. Wounded twice and returned to the U.S., Thyng was assigned as Commander of the 413th Fighter Group and fought in the Pacific Ocean area until the end of the war.

A full Colonel at 25, he was commissioned as a regular officer and served in various command positions in the U.S. until the outbreak of the Korean War. Thyng was assigned as Commander of the 4th Fighter Wing and fought in the skies over Korea.

He retired from the U.S. Air Force in April of 1966 after a short tour in Viet Nam.


During his career, Gen. Thyng has flown over fifty different types of military aircraft. He is one of six men in the world who are both conventional and jet air aces. He has been decorated 57 times.



Trustees Expect Freshman Class Here

Explains Proposal

Speaking for the trustees, Atty Warren B. Rudman, chairman of the board, stated:

"The trustees of N.E.A.I. have initiated steps to insure the issuance of a charter for Daniel Webster Junior College which we hope will be a sister institution of N.E.A.I. There is a real need for this type of institution in the Nashua area, the need having been echoed by the community's

civic, industrial and political leaders. When we evaluated the curriculum at N.E.A.I. we found that our course offerings in the Liberal Arts area were quite substantial and, as a matter of fact, needed only limited supplement to offer a full liberal arts junior college curriculum.

"With the substantial expansion program we are now undergoing at N.E.A.I., it becomes quite apparent that with the high cost of education, it is incumbent upon all educational institutions to fully utilize their facilities and operation capabilities.

"N.E.A.I. new facilities, which are in the advanced planning stages, will be more than adequate to conduct both the engineering and aeronautically oriented subjects of N.E.A.I. and the broader fields of the arts and sciences which we plan for Daniel Webster Junior College. Our plans call for the further development of N.E.A.I. into the aerospace-engineering area and the development of Daniel Webster

Junior College into the area of more general education, which is so urgently needed by many young persons today.

The present course offerings of N.E.A.I. include the following liberal arts subjects: physics, algebra, trigonometry, analytics, differential calculus, accounting, industrial management, economics, business statistics, business law, modern government, English, psychology, sociology, French and history. We plan to add a number of subjects to round out this curriculum at Daniel Webster Junior College and establish two basic fields of study, first, mathematics and sciences and second, social studies.



Mr. Baake, General Thyng, Reverend Clergy, Members of the Faculty,
Members of the Class of 1967, Students and Friends of
New England Aeronautical Institute:
