FRANK BARBER SHOWS OFFER OF CREDIT Dairyman Art Armstrong, Right, Gave Lift to Avro Workers Because he "couldn't stand to see the wives cry," dairyman Art Armstrong is giving unlimited credit to families of 3,500 former Avro-Orenda workers to keep them in milk. Armstrong, who operates Woodbridge dairy, said he made up his mind after several wives "broke down and cried. I just didn't know what to say."

Many of his customers, he said, had expressed fears that merchants would begin operating on a "cash only" basis with Avro workers.

A note he gave his Avro customers read in part: "We feel that you have helped to sustain our business, now it is our turn to reciprocate. Take what milk you need, pay for it when you can. Look after first things first and the best of luck. Your Driver."

"It's the least I could do," said Mr. Armstrong. "I started this business 12 years ago from scratch and whatever business I have now is due in large part to the loyalty of these people in the face of increasing competition from city dairies. "Avro and I started about the
