

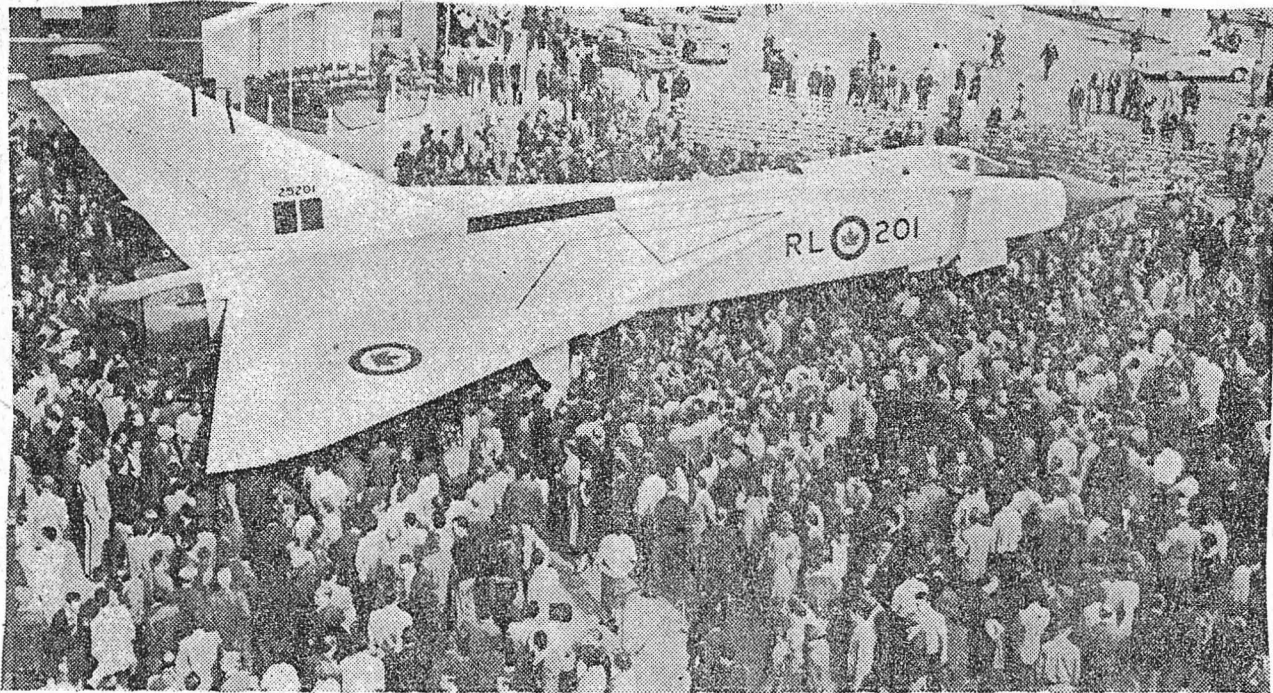
ARROW'S HEIR, the U.S. Bomarc missile, is shown here being worked on by technician. Decision to sup-

HAPPIER DAYS. Back in October, 1957, enthusiastic Avro workers crowded around the first Arrow as it made its initial public appearance at

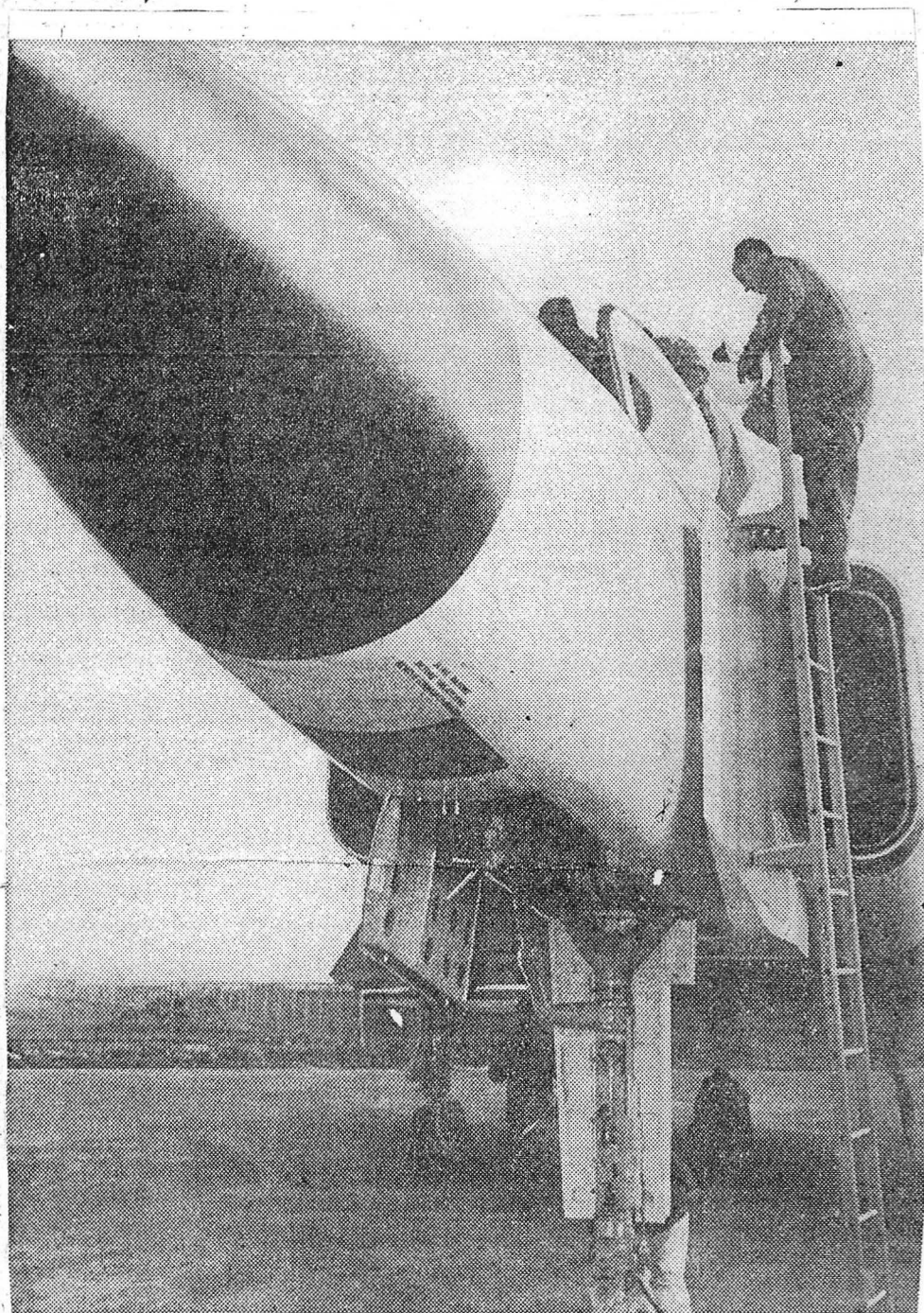

7,000 Metro Jobs Scrapped With Arrow

Avro layoffs, as shown by the following table will mean more than 7,000 persons in Metro Toronto will be unemployed. Peel county communities, in proportion to their size, will suffer even severer blows.

Figures, which were compiled at the end of December, include employees of AVRO aircraft, Orenda Engines and Canadian Steel Improvements Ltd., all subsidiaries of A. V. Roe, Canada Ltd.

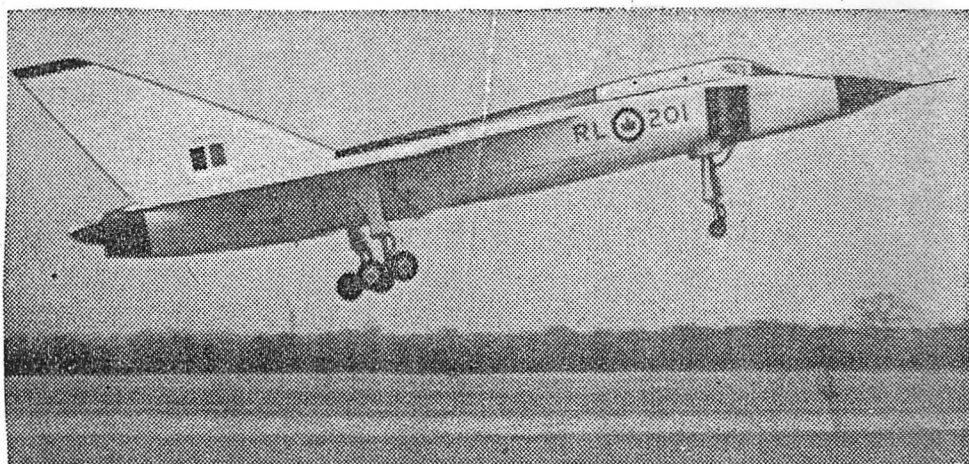


Test pilot Zurakowski climbs 14 feet 6 inches to cockpit.

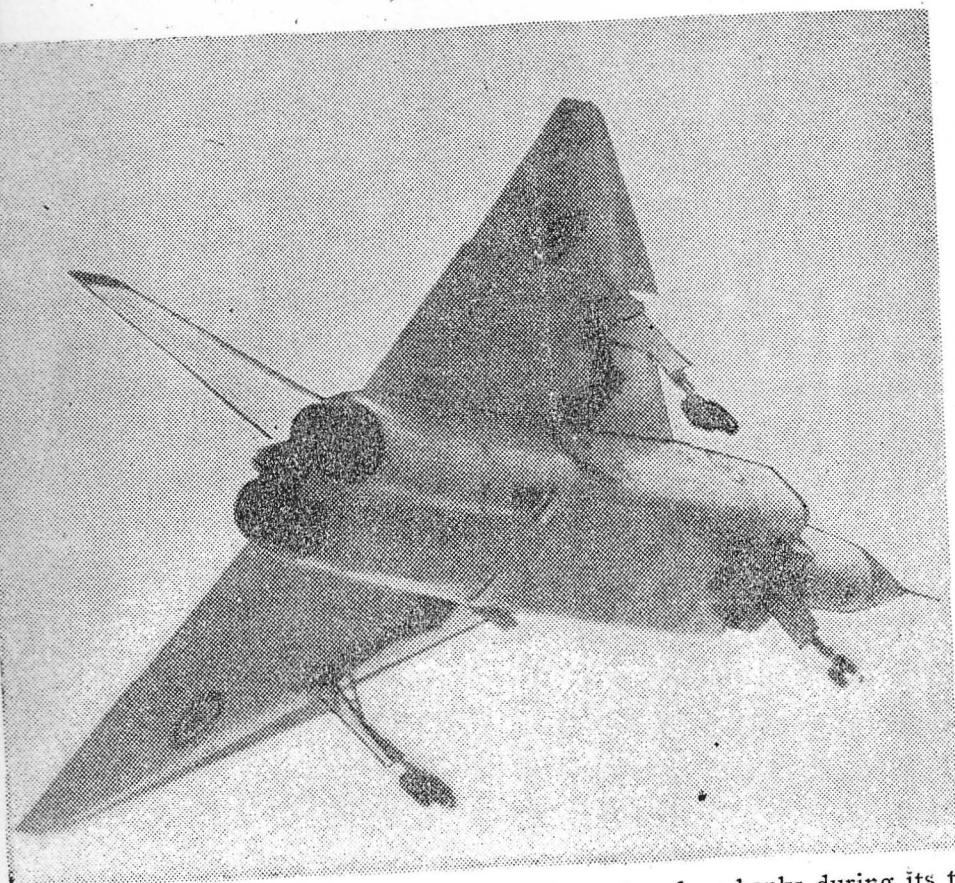
