The Air Force officials estimated that of the more than 10.000 unidentified flying objects reported in recent years, only about 100 were photographed and fewer than 200 were observed on radar. All of the radar cases have been solved, they said.

Brown assured the committee the Air Force wants a thorough investigation "so that this situ-ation won't get out of hand."

He maintained that the Air Force itself has not ignored such reports or ridiculed people who said they saw unidentified objects in the sky. And he promised that the intended panel of civilian scientists would study

each case "in depth."
Chairman L. Mendel Rivers,
D-S.C., indicated that the committee would not adopt Ford's suggestion for a congressional investigation, at least until the Air Force panel looks thoroughly into the matter.
